American Bible Society Studies Use of Bible

A study on the use of the Bible in the United States has been undertaken by the American Bible Society. This program is part of the United Bible Societies' world-wide, five-year study of the use of the Bible in the churches, to stimulate thought on this important subject, to discover ways in which the Bible is used creatively in the life of the churches, and to secure exchange of experience among the churches.

For this important work the Bible Society has appointed the Rev. Carl W. Larson, secretary of its North-western District, as Study Secretary. The world-wide program is under the direction of the Rev. Edwin H. Robertson, Study Secretary for the United Bible Societies in London. In the course of the past two years, Mr. Robertson has made three visits to this country in an effort to get as many case studies of the American churches as possible. At this point, however, it became quite evident that in order to get an accurate and complete study of the American scene, it would be necessary to appoint someone as a Study Secretary for the United States to follow up the work started and initiate new case studies.

WOMEN OF RUANDA LEARN TO BE HOMEMAKERS

GITWE MISSION, AFRICA—
"Mwiriweho, Madami." (Good afternoon, Madam.)

"Mwiriweho, Deborah. Mwiriweho, Eline. Abagore barihere?" (Good afternoon, Deborah and Eline. Where are the women?)

"Baraje. Barinyuma." (They are coming. They are behind.) With these usual words our two-hour women's class begins every Monday and Thursday afternoon.

Last year's decision to conduct a class for women at Gitwe Mission Station was met by a disappointing lack of enthusiasm at the start. Husbands feared their wives would learn so much they would refuse to hoe the gardens and do their other daily chores. The poor attendance at first soon improved as the women were taught principles of health, personal hygiene, home cleanliness, how to care for children, and such practical topics.

The women kept asking for sewing classes, but lack of funds and equipment delayed these until the gift of a sewing machine provided a start. Beginning work on their first project, tablecloths, the women brought measurements for their tables. Time revealed that for most of them, the measurements were for the tables they hoped to own someday!

Many of the women had never held needles before, so it was really an arduous task for three women to teach, correct, and hand out materials for all fifty students during each two-hour session.

There is still a great work to be done for the women of Ruanda, most of whom are uneducated and bound by customs that make them prematurely old. The average girl marries between the ages of fifteen and seventeen and usually bears between eight and fourteen children. Hers is a life of hard work, but her future looks brighter today than ever before.

Let us pray that these students will put into practice in their homes the things they are learning, and also that they will be willing to share with other women

in their villages these things which can make life better for all of them. (Condensed from "Southern African Division Outlook")



HE WANTED TO SEE GOD'S KINGDOM COME

LUSHAI, INDIA—From Mrs. W. G. Lowry comes the following incident concerning a Lushai tithe payer.

"The Lord has been good to us this month, and I have brought some tithe," stated the bewhiskered old man as he seated himself in the chair I had offered. "We sold our 'nula' [young lady]."

"You what?" I asked amazed, forgetting my manners.

"We sold our young lady, and I have brought the part that belongs to God's kingdom." From his pocket he withdrew a soiled and ancient knot of cloth, which he untied with care, then counted out six crumpled rupee notes. "And this," he said, unknitting another bit of rag, "is the Sabbath school offering for the past quarter." Four rupees, nine annas, and six pies were counted out. "This is Sabbath school expense offering." One rupee.

"We sold our young lady." Was there ever a stranger offering brought before the Lord? Was it an acceptable tithe? Yes, indeed, for the man's statement meant only that the daughter had been married according to Lushai law and custom. There was no slavery involved, no heartbreak, only a happy bride and proud bridegroom.

"You have done well to bring the Lord's part. May your daughter be happy," I said, handing him his receipt.

While we do not wish to advocate the dowry system as a means of income, we would remind you that God's tithing plan calls for "one tenth of all our increase"—even if it is only a matter of eleven rupees, nine and one-half annas carried for five days over rugged mountains and across swollen rivers by an old man who wants to see "God's kingdom come." BIBLE BRIEFS

A Bible in every Christian home became the goal of the Bible Society of India and Ceylon in 1955. This project is carried on in close cooperation with the churches, and so far 18,869 homes have been supplied with Bibles and New Testaments. When families are genuinely too poor to pay the ordinary selling price of a Bible, the local church comes to their aid. When the need is beyond the capacity of the church the Bible Society helps still further with additional grants and subsidies.

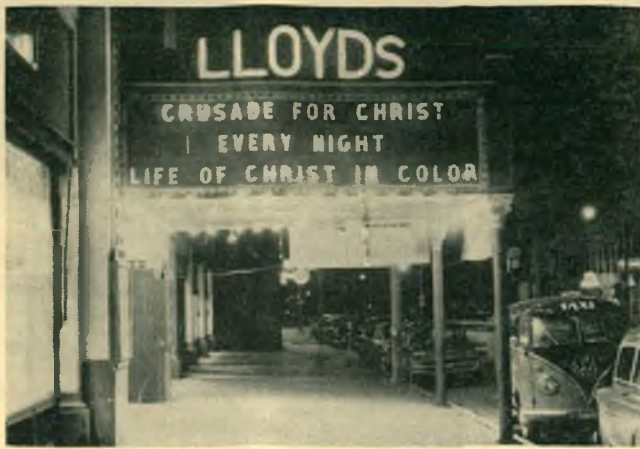

A theater is not generally regarded as a place for Christians to congregate, but this, however, is a case of conversion. Where once a fare of violence and lust was presented, now the message of a saving Christ goes out to a needy citizenry.

OBITUARIES

Wilbur Stewart Barclay was born in Detroit, Mich. on April 3, 1888 and died in the Hinsdale Sanitarium, March 26, 1959. Brother Barclay was a secondary school teacher for thirty years, and served as treasurer in the Moline Seventh-day Adventist Church for many years.

Surviving their loved one are his wife, Mrs. Bessie Barclay of Western Springs, Ill., his two sons, James S. of Western Springs and Dr. Paul S. of Highland Park, Ill.; five grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Blair Quick of Moline, Ill., and one brother, John Barclay of Paoli, Ind.

Services were held in the Hinsdale church. Interment was in Bronswood Cemetery, Hinsdale. R. D. Fearing

Dr. John Elbert Cooper was born Feb. 18, 1877, in Hutchinson, Kansas, a son of Simeon M. and Nancy (Carrothers) Cooper. After completing his early schooling in that area, he came to Battle Creek in 1898 as a student at the old American Medical Missionary College, from which he was graduated in 1902. He left this community at that time, but returned again in 1913 and had since continued his practice here.

For many years he directed the obstetrical ward of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, resigning in 1932 to enter private practice. Dr. Cooper served as president of the Calhoun County Medical Society in 1942. In 1952 he was honored by the Michigan State Medical Assn. upon having completed 50 years of practice. He is listed in Who's Who in America and was a fellow of the American College of Surgeons in Obstetrics; a life member of the county, state and American Medical societies and a former chief of obstetrics at Leila and Community hospitals.

He was an active member of the Battle Creek Tabernacle church. Dr. Cooper was married on July 1, 1903, in Iola, Kansas, to Olive M. Jones. Mrs. Cooper was critically injured in a traffic accident on Dec. 31,

1951 and died at the age of 72 on Jan. 3, 1952. Four of the five children survive. They are: Mary, wife of Dr. Edwin L. Hansen of Battle Creek; Lynn F. of Neenah, Wis.; Hugh W. of Collegeville, Pa.; and Mrs. LaVern (Olive) Smith of Holland, Mich. A son, John E. Cooper, Jr., Army Air Corps pilot, was killed in Australia in December 1942, in a plane crash and is buried in North Platte, Neb.

Funeral services were held in the Battle Creek Tabernacle church and interment was in Memorial Park Cemetery at Battle Creek, Mich. Mark L. Bovee

Mrs. Myrtle Cottrell was born April 8, 1876, in the town of Poy Sippi, Wis. In 1890 she was married to Carl Cottrell. Sr. Cottrell died peacefully at the home where she was born, March 27, 1959. She is survived by one son, Forrest, of Oxford, Wis., three daughters, Mrs. Henry Nelson of Pine River, Wis., Mrs. Ruth Lunz of St. Johns, Mich., Mrs. Robert Linden of Milwaukee; 17 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband and one son, Sterling.
