Andrews University to Hold Field School in Milwaukee

Andrews University will continue its program of practical training for ministers in the Theological Seminary this year by sponsoring six field schools. About 54 men will participate in evangelistic efforts under the guidance of experienced evangelists.

Field schools will be held from June 11 through July 10, and from July 23 through August 21, says Elder Edward Banks, associate professor of evangelism and director of field work. They will be located in Los Angeles, Calif.; Milwaukee, Wis.; New York City; Omaha, Neb.; St. Petersburg, Fla.; and Worcester, Mass.

"The purpose of the field schools," says Elder Banks, "is to combine the theory and practice of evangelism in an actual soul-winning situation."

In the usual day at field school, students will spend mornings in classes taught by the evangelist directing the effort, and the afternoons will be spent visiting people who have expressed interest in the meetings. After the evening meeting, the entire group meets with the head evangelist to discuss the day's events and their own progress.

Evangelist J. Malcolm Phipps will direct the Milwaukee field school.

Dial-a-Prayer Discloses Preoccupation with World Affairs Among Australians

More Australians dial a prayer in times of world crisis than in ordinary times, according to Sydney's Dial-a-Prayer service. At the time of the Cuba crisis in 1962 the number of people dialing the service increased from 14,000 to 20,000. When President Kennedy was assassinated, the number of calls jumped by 25 per cent, then fell back to normal levels. At the height of the Vietnam crisis in 1964 the number of calls rose from 26,000 to 34,000. Dial-a-Prayer in Sydney is sponsored as a public service by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.





Graduation Climaxes Successful School Year

Two hundred three graduates and a host of relatives and friends were challenged by Dr. F. D. Nichol Sunday morning, May 30, during the commencement address at Andrews University.

"The goal of Seventh-day Adventist schools," he stressed, "is to free us from the pathetically small limits of modern thought. We would grasp with one hand the magnificent revelations of science in the natural world, and with the other, the inspired revelations of the world beyond. We believe that only by this twofold revelation can we live the most meaningful lives in this present world, with assurance of an even more meaningful life in a world to come."

In summary he emphasized that Seventh-day Adventists "are totally unwilling to restrict the sweep of our spirit to six feet above ground for seventy years, and then six feet below for eternity."

Nichol, a past recipient of an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Andrews University, is a prominent Adventist writer and editor. An Australian by birth, Dr. Nichol is a world traveler presently serving as editor of the Review and Herald.

An honorary Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred on Dr. Edwin R. Thiele, emeritus professor of religion and philosophy. An ordained minister of the S.D.A. church, Dr. Thiele graduated from Emmanuel Missionary Col-

lege in 1918. In 1920 he went as a missionary to China, where he worked until 1937. He has been on the faculty of his alma mater for 28 years, teaching in the field of religion. A portion of the citation awarded him reads:

"To Edwin R. Thiele, missionary to China, teacher of Bible, departmental administrator, and scholarly author, who through his book, The Mysterious Numbers of the Hebrew Kings, has become recognized throughout the world as the leading authority in Old Testament chronology, we offer recognition with praise and appreciation."

Weekend speakers included Elder N. R. Dower, president of the Washington Conference of S.D.A., for Friday evening consecration; and Dr. T. S. Geraty, associate secretary of the department of education of the General Conference, who delivered the baccalaureate address on Saturday.

Fifteen students graduated "with honors," indicating that they had maintained a superior scholastic record. Of these, eight were awarded to college graduates; five to School of Graduate Studies graduates; and two to Theological Seminary graduates. Two students, Ruth Elaine Atkinson of Little Rock, Ark., and Leo Ray Van Dolson of Angwin, Calif., graduated summa cum laude, the highest honor that can be bestowed on a student for excellence in scholastic achievement.

Of the 203 graduates, 153 were graduates with college degrees, and 50 with masters and professional theological degrees.
