## Miami Baptists Release Hospital So It Can Accept U.S. Funds

The Miami Baptist Association has voted to release the Miami Baptist Hospital from its control so that the hospital can accept federal aid. The action came at the end of prolonged debate on the issue. The association voted to end its control over the hospital rather than to set a precedent of accepting federal funds for a church institution. The hospital will be controlled by a board of trustees. Charter provisions require that the hospital be operated with the same Christian principles on which it was founded. But the trustees will now be free to accept federal funds for expansion of the hospital.

## Students Were Active This Summer

Julia Howard worked 427 hours in 10 weeks, selling a total of 5,819 single-copy magazines. She withdrew \$250 in cash, leaving a \$1,326 scholarship to be sent to the Oakwood College. She left for home August 3, to relax with her family until school begins.

Five other students working in Chicago with Julia earned the following scholarships: Naomi Robinson, \$992; Nancy Moore, \$968; Donna Young, \$908; Renata Thomas, \$902; and Joyce Lewis, \$749.

Thomas McNealy, student assistant, earned a \$1,420 scholarship.

The combined total single-copy magazines distributed by this group was *These Times*, 3,370; *Life and Health*, 9,421; *Message*, 17,223; for a total of 43,014 single copies in the Chicago area.

We rejoice over the success given these students who have followed Heaven's council given through the Lord's messenger, E. G. White, "When school closes, there will be opportunity for many to go out into the field as evangelistic canvassers. The faithful colporteur finds his way into many homes where he leaves precious reading matter containing the truth for this time. . . .

"If canvassers will do this, using their ability which God has given them, seeking council from Him, and combining the work of selling books with personal labor for the people, their talents will increase by exercise and they will learn many practical lessons which they could not possibly learn in school. The education obtained in this practical way may properly be termed higher education."—*Colporteur Ministry*, pp. 31-33.

## School Building Started As Earth Is Turned

A ground-breaking ceremony was held Sunday, July 24, for the new Waukegan elementary school. Participating in the ceremony were Elder C. M. Willison, educational superintendent; Elton Dessain, treasurer; Elder W. A. Nelson, president; Elder B. H. Green, pastor of the Waukegan district; and Paul Koppen, building committee chairman.

The nine-acre site, located in Gurnee, Ill., was selected by the church in 1962 during the ministry of Elder Clarence Gruesbeck. Since that time the members of the Waukegan Church have been anxiously awaiting the ground-breaking and erection of the much-needed new school building. Until the new building is prepared for classwork the 45 students and their teachers will continue to use temporary classrooms in the Waukegan Church.

Present plans call for three classrooms, a kitchen, rest rooms, and a large room to accommodate small children in a day nursery. The operation of the nursery is expected to relieve the financial burdens of the school.

Teachers for the school include Charles Cook, principal and teacher of grades six, seven, and eight; Mrs. Esther McIntyre, grades three, four, and five; and Miss Joyce Wery, grades one and two.

Waukegan has the potential of a much larger school with over eighty children of school age in the area. It is expected that the majority of these children will be in our new school which will be large enough to accommodate them.

Upon completion of the three rooms, plans call for an extended program which will include a gymnasium and additional classrooms as needed.

A large number of the church members were present for the ground-breaking service and to give their approval to the undertaking.

Having graduated with a master of business administration from the University of Florida in 1960, Phillips continued work there toward the Ph.D. with specialization in statistics. From 1960 to 1962 he was also instructor in principles of management at the University of Florida.

In a letter to President Richard Hamill announcing Phillips' completion of requirements, W. V. Wilmot, chairman of the department of management and business law, states: "We have enjoyed having Dr. Phillips as a graduate student and staff member. His work has always been of high quality. . . . He has shown commendable perseverance in bringing his dissertation to a successful conclusion."

Phillips will be teaching classes in economics, management, and quantitative methods this school term in the College.

## Freshman Orientation Begins September 7 And Classes Start the 15th

Registration processes for fall semester at Andrews will officially open with freshman orientation September 7 to 9.

Beginning September 11 and continuing through September 14, the anticipated influx of students will roll through the enrollment processes, with freshmen entering first.
