Well over a thousand people chose to spend part of their Easter Sunday at the official opening of the Berrien Springs branch of the Michigan Book and Bible House. On March 29 the Bible House opened its doors to friends and offered them good books and records at special sale prices, free orchids for the ladies, and lollipops for the children.

Many who could not attend the opening sent their congratulations by telegram or letter. Flowers from denominational publishing houses, sister Bible Houses, and friends in the community added to the appearance of the new store.

The building itself, located at 1309 St. Joseph Road (U.S. Highway 31-33), has been completely remodeled inside and out during the past few months. The Bible

House now has the largest showrooms of any similar building in the Lake Union. The five rooms include a large red-carpeted showroom, a record and music room, a children's room with games and books, a Sabbath School supply room, and a small room to contain books and materials on sale.

The staff really appreciate all the extra room, for the Bible House was formerly located in just one room at the Lake Union Conference building at 125 College Avenue. (The space they formerly occupied will be used for new union personnel.)

The exterior of the new building has been painted a reddish brown, and yellow shutters have been hung. Later this spring flowers and shrubbery will be planted around the building, and the parking lot will be black-topped.

On hand for the grand opening were Douglas Anderson of Lansing, manager of the Michigan Book and Bible House and the two Michigan branches; J. L. Clements, Hugh Forquer, and George Taggart of the Review and Herald Publishing Association, all former managers of the Michigan Bible House; and Elder and Mrs. C. C. Groomer and Mrs. Stuart Snyder of the Michigan Conference, who were on hand to answer questions in the Sabbath School supply room.

Mrs. J. W. Proctor, branch Bible House manager, reports that during the Sunday open house over 500 orchids were given away to the ladies who visited the Bible House. Not anticipating such a large turnout, the Bible House staff ran short of the orchids by midafternoon. Those who came later in the afternoon received a small book instead.

Store hours, beginning April 5, will be weekdays from 9 to 5:30 (9 to noon on Friday) and Sundays from 10 to 5. Mrs. Proctor invites all who have not yet visited the new Bible House to stop by. A warm welcome awaits you.

In addition to his scholarly activities and ministerial duties, Elder Tuland has found time to take an active part in the American Red Cross work, teaching classes in first aid. He has also taught the nurses at Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital.

In all, Elder Tuland has given almost 50 years of faithful service to the Adventist denomination. He and his wife Maria have recently moved to Brookfield, where he is recuperating from pneumonia. They will be greatly missed by their Beverly Hills congregation.

Large Attendance at Ionia Prayer Meeting

DETROIT ADVENTISTS VISIT HOLY LAND

TROY CHURCH DEDICATED

A recent issue of the *Herald* carried the story of the dedication of the new Troy church. However, pictures of the church were inadvertently omitted from the story.

The attractive building on Crooks Road, one block south of Big Beaver (16th Mile), has ample room for parking on the outside and ample meeting space for Sabbath School and normal church functions inside. The main sanctuary and youth chapel are of similar design.

MENDON CHURCH HISTORY

Note: The following article was written as an assignment for the American History course at Cedar Lake Academy. The church mentioned is of special interest to the writer, Starr Rasmussen, because she has been a member there for the past five years. The writer is indebted to Mrs. Juliette Davis, the oldest living member of the Mendon church, for much of the historical information.

In 1860 a church was organized in Parkville, Michigan, under the title Christ's Second Advent. Within three years the group had confederated with the Seventh-day Adventist church there. At this time the title and deeds were turned over to the West Michigan Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

Not much is known of this early church because nearly all records were destroyed by a fire in 1916; but, according to some of the old records, John Byington, who became the first General Conference president, was one of the early ministers there.

Mrs. Davis recalls that it was 1900 or 1901 when the members finally decided to build a church in Mendon, not far from Parkville. For about 40 years the members around Mendon had driven their horses through the snow and cold to the Parkville church. Neither Mrs. Davis nor the writer is sure who the minister was when the members decided to move, but some of the members were John Langdon, Amos Butler, Clair Roberts, and Dan Sidler. These are a few of those who set about building the new church.

The pulpit, seats, and a small table were moved from the old church to Mendon and were to be used until they could be replaced; however, these same valuable pieces of furniture are still being used. The pulpit was one of the many church pulpits that God's messenger spoke from, and she also sat in these seats.

The new church was built along contemporary lines with two front entrances. As one entered either of the two foyers, his eyes would meet janitor equipment which was hanging on the back walls of both entries. There was no other place to store these things, since there was no basement. Near the rear of the sanctuary

was a potbellied stove, the central heating system. At that time the seats were arranged in three rows, but now they form just two rows.

Elder Bryon Hagle was church minister in 1903. In an old *Review and Herald* there is record of his holding meetings six miles north of Mendon. At the time he felt the attendance to be slack, but was amazed at the eagerness of the people to learn.

In 1957 the church got a new look: the outside was changed to one entrance with steps, and the partition between the foyers was removed. In 1967 and 1969 more remodeling was done.

During 1967 Elder E. A. Crane, the pastor, held meetings in nearby Three Rivers. Because of these meetings, the members from Three Rivers decided to build their own church. While these two groups were affiliated there were more people in attendance; but with the new Three Rivers church, Mendon is left with only 33 members. They are trying, with prayer and God's help, to increase this number and keep alive what God gave them way back in 1869.

ANDREW FEARING FEATURED IN BERRIEN SPRINGS REVIVAL

One of the largest crowds ever to attend a service in the Berrien Springs church filled it to capacity and overflowing on Sabbath, February 14. The occasion was the culmination of a week-long revival held for the Berrien Springs area churches by Elder Andrew Fearing of the Ministerial Department of the General Conference. The meetings were part of a coordinated plan to hold revivals for every church in the Michigan Conference during the month of February.

Elder Fearing, who has visited and preached in more than 50 countries, recently returned from a one-year series in the large New Gallery Center in London, England, and seven months of evangelism in Germany.
