## a norwegian salute to the Bicentennial

The internationally renowned Sandefjord Girls' Choir, directed by its founder, Seventh-day Adventist Sverre Valen, will present a number of concerts in the Lake Union area at the end of June.

Under the patronage of Her Royal Highness Crown Princess Sonja of Norway, the 96-member choir will appear in a three-week series of more than 20 concerts and radio and television appearances as "A Norwegian Salute to the Bicentennial."

The girls, aged nine to eighteen, have appeared in numerous concerts in London, Paris, Rotterdam, Copenhagen, Helsinki, and other major European cities, and on their first American tour in 1973, which was headquartered at Loma Linda University, the choir sang a Fourth of July concert with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in the Hollywood Bowl.

The choir was founded by its present director, Sverre Valen, in 1956. Together with his wife, a well-known voice teacher, Mr. Valen conducts, under the financial sponsorship of the city of Sandefjord and the provincial government of Vestfold, a choral program that leads from a musical kindergarten and beginner choir to Sandefjord Girls' Choir and the select adult mixed choir "The Valen Chorale."

Referred to by the Oslo daily newspaper *Verdens Gang* as "the conductor genius" of Norway, Mr. Valen won in 1974 the grand prize of the Norwegian Recording Industry for the best professional recording of the year in the field of serious music. In 1972 he was awarded the Cultural Prize of the City of Sandefjord, and in 1975 he was awarded the same recognition by the provincial government of Vestfold.

The repertoire of Sandefjord Girls' Choir consists of more than 300 different compositions, ranging from the Renaissance masters to folk songs and contemporary music. The girls sing in five languages and have made nine professional recordings.

# Music . . . to Serve a Holy Purpose

**M**usic was made to serve a holy purpose, to lift the thoughts to that which is pure, noble, and elevating, and to awaken in the soul devotion and gratitude to God."—*Patriarchs and Prophets*, p. 594.

Among the speculations of contemporary society, gnawing away at the love of God for lost humanity, is the disparaging thought that man is unworthy of salvation. Contributing to this idea is his submersion into any escape mechanism which partially or totally reduces his ability to cope with pressures over which he has little or no control. Furthermore, his depraved condition is constantly being bom-

barded with sound, disjointed melody, insidious beat, raucous voice, oppressive loudness, sensuous affection, and deceptive emotionalism, spiritual or otherwise. This only further baffles the imprudent and boggles the unwary. Thus the fine edges of discrimination and sensibility offered by our Creator are fast being eroded by man's callousness, indifference, and carelessness.

Might this be the condition of our own lives? Is there no freedom from boredom, no immunity from monotonous, static living? Is the music we listen to fast making us unconscious of our spiritual responsibilities and moral development? Do we not have an inner potentiality for being raised above the bondage of depravity?

Listen to a directive from Jesus: "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth

will make you free" (John 8:32). "I am the way, the truth, and the life (John 14:6).

What an opportunity! Latent within the believing soul rests the Christ-given power to become a child of God. John 1:12. Therefore on registering our determination on the side of Christ, our minimal effectiveness is strengthened and supported by the omnipotence of the Almighty. (*Christ's Object Lessons*, p. 333.) Life no longer needs to be a dull round of ordinary physical processes, but rather a series of unique, elevating happenings which continually create steppingstones of incalculable value and rewarding advantage. Therefore, as the power of the Holy Spirit continues to work we cease to regard life as a repetitive waste and begin to capture the essence and beauty of God's creative power.

For not only has the Lord demonstrated His omnipotence through the visible realms of nature but also by means of inspired achievements of man's mind.

Let us take for example the Doxology, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." Three different experiences could be cited. One worshiper may passively let these words ungratefully drop from his lips and, by so doing, assent to a dreary, negative experience which makes worthless his act of worship. His thankful neighbor in the adjoining pew sings from a heart overflowing with praise and gratitude. A third person does not venture participation. His understanding and musical growth have prevented an intelligent response. To one, great music wedded to sublime words has caused a noble spiritual response. To the other two the challenge of the power of the Holy Spirit must become meaningful and active. If their minds are open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, interest in dignified, profound music will be awakened and an extra spiritual ingredient will expand and elevate their consciences and inner drives. One level met will be the encouragement to surmount more noble and elevating themes.

Thus gradually the common, temporary, disposable music of the day (be it sacred or secular) loses its luster and a

brilliance begins to emerge around a superior, lasting quality. As new musical and spiritual heights are achieved by the Christian, more supreme attributes of God are revealed. When this sincere search after truth makes the response to God's love stronger, the purity and richness expressed in sacred song illuminates and makes more joyous our journey to heaven. In this manner we are achieving a fullness of fellowship with Jesus which is reciprocal in our fellowship with those on earth. For the consecrated one music does just that. Music "has power to subdue rude and uncultivated natures; power to quicken thought and to awaken sympathy, to promote harmony of action, and to banish the gloom and foreboding that destroy courage and weaken effort."—*Education*, p. 168.

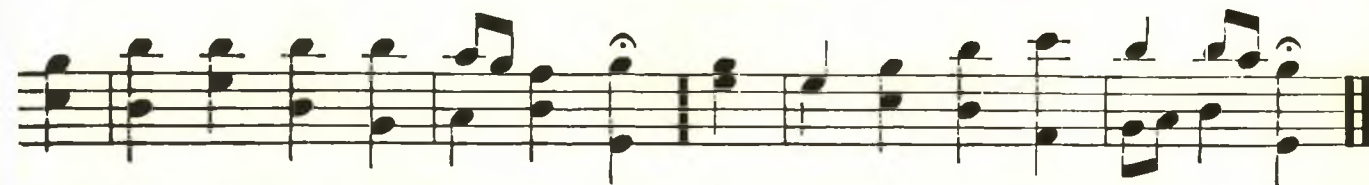
Then let us sing the great themes of redemption to the inspired melodies of the masters: "God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform," "Speak Lord, in the stillness while I wait on Thee," "My faith looks up to Thee," "Jesus keep me near the cross," "The Lord is my Light," "Hallelujah, for the Lord God Omnipotent reigneth."

One is thus enriched when, in cooperation with the Lord Jesus, he expands his soul with the sublime melodies of the great hymns (new and

old) of the church, with the profound orchestration of a Beethoven symphony, or the elevating ecstasy of a Mendelssohn oratorio. God has used individuals thus as He did when building the early tabernacle; He commissioned that men be chosen to execute the arts who would be filled "with the Spirit of God, with ability and intelligence, with knowledge and all craftsmanship, to devise artistic designs" (Exodus 31:3, 4, Revised Standard Version).

God has created mankind so he will search out and discover possible ways of transmitting His truth through music and the other arts. In fact, the arts develop one of the most successful avenues by which the mind may be edified with divine truth.

To be sure, it is difficult to keep to the right path; temptations are legion. And as we observe our culture around, it becomes painful to see the breakdown of moral integrity. Nevertheless, we are living in exciting times. God has called us to bear witness to the divine purpose of music, to accept the privilege and responsibility of carrying a message of hope and salvation to a sin-sick world, looking forward to the imminent time when, as Isaiah (51:11) envisioned, "the redeemed of the Lord shall return, and come with singing unto Zion; and everlasting joy shall be upon their head."

## EMG TESTING NOW AVAILABLE AT HINSDALE HOSPITAL

Electromyography (EMG) and nerve conduction velocity (NCV) tests are now available through the electrophysiology department of Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital, according to Maurice Hoppe, chief technician.

In March the new piece of equipment arrived and testing began. "Last month 30 patients were given the test which lasts approximately one hour," says Hoppe. The EMG registers how long it takes a stimulus to travel from one part of a muscle to another by means of needles inserted in the muscle.

The EMG is useful in the diagnosis of primary muscle disease, myopathies, such as polymyositis or muscular dystrophy.

The NCV is useful in the diagnosis of acute or chronic neuropathies and nerve compression syndromes.

#### **TWO CLINICS HELD BY DOWNERS GROVE CHURCH**

Two Five-Day Plans to Stop Smoking were sponsored by the Downers Grove Church in January. One was the first clinic held in the church and was attended by 14 smokers.

According to the new pastor, Elder Rodney Dale, "This was a tremendous response, as a few years ago the general public wouldn't even consider stepping foot inside an Adventist Church."

After the regular evening's program, a spiritual emphasis of about ten minutes was held. Most of the group stayed and received promises of victory from the Scriptures. On the last evening all 14 stayed and felt they had the victory over smoking.

Those church members who aided in the plan were Mrs. Margo Oldt, receptionist, and her daughter, Sherry, who distributed literature; Marie Dale, greeter; and John

Elbe and Bob Hoffman, who told their experiences of gaining victory over cigarettes.

Medical personnel who spoke were Everett Witzel and Duane Dodd, medical practice associates; Mrs. Donna Justinen, R.N., and Soo Wong Park, cardiologist, Hinsdale San.

Aaron Spitzer, director of public education from the American Cancer Society, had charge of the follow-up one week later when each participant declared that they didn't have one "weed" in their possession and still hadn't smoked.

The 1976 book of the year, *Come Alive!* is being used for follow-up. Two days after receiving it one lady said, "It is so fascinating I can hardly lay it down."

Pastor Dale has visited each former smoker in his home. He plans to keep up the contact by future visitation and by starting cooking schools.

The second clinic drew 35 persons to the Nichols Library in Naperville and was sponsored by the YMCA adult education director. The master of ceremonies was Jay Ulloth, church member, of Westmont. The same local and medical personnel alternated their services for this plan and the one in the church.

Three features that drew the most response were the airway capacity test, demonstration of collection of poisonous substances from tobacco smoke, and the exchange of experiences with persons who quit smoking.

At the last meeting 21 persons were present, and they had all abstained from tobacco for two weeks or more.

One lady said, "My children were delighted that mommy quit!"

#### **COOKING SCHOOL HELD IN WEST FRANKFORT**

Recently a three-day cooking school was held in the home of the pastor of the West Frankfort Church with many of the townspeople attending.

## ST. CHARLES SABBATH SCHOOL USES 100-YEAR-OLD REPORTS

St. Charles Sabbath School members have been hear-

ing reports during this Bicentennial year of Sabbath Schools conducted more than 100 years ago in the same church building being used today.

The Sabbath School secretary, Mrs. Harold Furman, who is also the church clerk, has been reading through old records to find items of interest.

The St. Charles Adventist Church was built in 1862, and the original large door key is displayed under glass in the foyer.

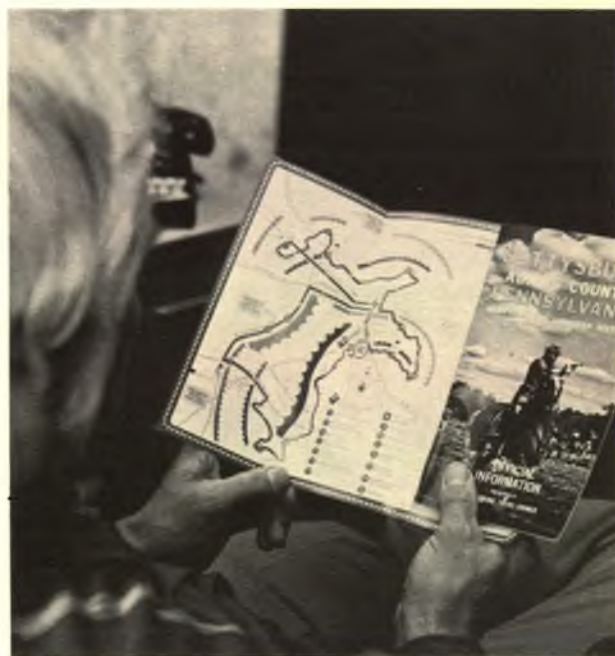
Currently there are 36 members one-third of which are direct descendants from the early pioneers.

Young Scott and Jennifer Crook are sixth generation descendants from Charles Schaupp, one of the three brothers who organized the church. Charles joined the church in New York State 11 years after the disappointment in 1844 and came to St. Charles to farm.

The original bell brought down the river by barge to the first church erected in St. Charles is still rung each Sabbath at 9:30 a.m. calling the members to Sabbath School.

In a recent report it was noted that 46 members were added to the church in 1881 between November and January by being baptized in the river near the church.

On Mother's Day the St. Charles congregation honored their oldest member, 97-year-old Edith Schaupp Rusher, the daughter of Adolph Schaupp, one of the original organizers of their church.
