

- 4. To open doors for personal Bible studies and future visits.
- 5. To give every person an opportunity to support our world-wide mission work.

What motivates church members to go Ingathering each year?

- 1. We love the Lord, and "The love of Christ constraineth us."
- 2. We are homesick for heaven and want to finish the work and hasten Jesus' return.
- 3. We want to send the gospel of love, of healing, of hope, of health, of salvation to people and nations who are waiting on us.
- 4. We want to sponsor and support missionaries on the front lines around the world.
- 5. We want to win souls for there are so many on the verge of the kingdom waiting only to be gathered in.

Let's go Ingathering this year and have a real adventure in power, bearing witness for our Savior. Let's go and be drawn closer to Jesus. The Vitalograph machine was the drawing card which caused long lines to form as individuals waited to have their lung capacity measured. Approximately 8,000 people went through the ABLE booth during the ten days of the fair. Besides taking the time to counsel each person concerning the results of the test, various types of literature were given to each one.

The usual methods of advertising were used to make the community aware of the meetings that were conducted in the large gymnasium of the church school that is adjacent to the church building. The most productive, and therefore most important, "advertising" was done by the members of the church family when they personally extended the invitation to attend the meetings. Church members who were giving Bible studies brought their "students" to the meetings and rejoiced as these fine interests were brought to decision and baptized.

Invitations sometimes come in strange and interesting ways. A young man of the Catholic faith heard about the meetings and invited an Adventist lady with whom he worked to attend with him. She willingly did so! And she was filled with awe as she witnessed the working of the Spirit of God leading him to joyfully accept Christ and His message, and accept baptism.

Sometimes we feel that if a person has not responded to the invitation to attend the evangelistic meetings from the very beginning we should not urge them to come at a later time. The fallacy of this thinking was demonstrated graphically in this series. Several of those persons baptized in the first group were instrumental in bringing friends or relatives from that time on and these were baptized in the second and third baptisms. One husband was baptized, then a week later his wife who had not attended prior to his baptism took her stand and was baptized. After this his mother, who was visiting from Pennsylvania, also followed her Lord in baptism!


Pastor Roundtree's wife, Shirley, has a degree in Home Economics. They have a four-year-old daughter, Shirleetra.

size of Brighton to have its own hospital when nearby Denver has so many large, specialized medical centers.

Local residents should be familiar with the hospital's location and access routes. Brighton Community Hospital provides 24-hour a day emergency room coverage 365 days a year. In addition, the hospital works closely with Platte Valley Ambulance Service, providing skilled paramedics that travel with the ambulance to an emergency site.

Phone numbers for the fire department, ambulance, police or sheriff, family doctor and nearest emergency room (with the address) should be kept beside each telephone in homes.

For legal reasons, hospitals cannot

provide treatment to children under age 18 without written consent of an actual parent except in lifethreatening emergencies. Parents who must leave their children under the supervision of a babysitter, teacher or even a foster parent should sign a consent form ahead of time permitting the child to be brought to the emergency room by the temporary guardian. The release forms are available through the hospital medical records office or emergency room clerk.

Emergency departments are for emergencies. Proper use of the community's medical system saves money and permits the best possible care. Preventive maintenance is most cost effective for people just the same as it is for other things.

Quantity Vegetarian Recipes Available

The last cookbook in a threevolume set entitled *Quantity Vegetarian Recipes* has been published by Andrews University, according to George W. Cummings, editor of the volumes.

The cookbooks contain a total of 431 quantity recipes developed for the lacto-ovo-vegetarian diet. Each recipe yields enough for 100, 300 or 500 people standardized to the needs of an institutional food service.

The recipes were taken from the seven-week cycle used in food preparation at Andrews. They have been approved by the SDA Dietetic Association.

The 716-page three-volume set can be purchased from Andrews University Food Service.

Two New Master of Science Degrees Offered

Andrews University now offers two new master of science degrees, one in nursing administration and the other in medical technology, according to Dr. Richard W. Schwarz, vicepresident of academic administration.

Hasel Is New Dean Of Theological Seminary

Gerhard F. Hasel has been named dean of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University. The action was taken as the board of trustees met on campus September 1.

Former dean of the seminary, Thomas H. Blincoe, has returned to the classroom as professor of theology.

Hasel is professor of Old Testament and Biblical Theology and serves as chairman of the seminary's Old Testament Department and as director of the school's doctor of theology program.

The Theological Seminary at Andrews has nearly 400 students and serves as the primary school for the training of ministers on the graduate level in the church.

A native of Germany, Hasel came to the United States in 1958 and was awarded a bachelor of arts degree in theology and German from Atlantic Union College in Massachusetts in 1959. He received two graduate degrees at Andrews: a master of arts in Systematic Theology in 1960 and a master of divinity in 1962. In 1970 he received a doctor of philosophy degree from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn.

He is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature, the American Academy of Religion, the American Schools of Oriental Research, the Chicago Society of Biblical Research, the International Organization for the Study of the Old Testament and the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters.

How are textbooks and materials selected for our schools? Some subject areas are not yet covered by basic textbooks published by the denomination.

HIGHLIGHTS

Some larger schools have appointed teachers to their own curriculum committees. Each local conference also has its curriculum committee. Ideas and suggestions are discussed and experimented with at those levels, and recommendations are made to the union conference curriculum committee. This last group has representatives from the local conference groups and appoints several sub-committees to examine programs and materials.

Materials are examined in the light of frameworks written by committees at the North American Division level. Those books and materials that come closest to the criteria of those frameworks are adopted and listed in the union conference textbook list. A teacher may use a basic pupil text not in the list only after obtaining special permission and filing reports. This is true of both elementary and secondary levels.

Your prayers are solicited by members of all these committees that the best, purest materials available might be found and placed in the hands of our young people.
