DUKANE 28A1B - The A-V Matic unit is a 35-mm single frame filmstrip with cassette for audio. Some have called this little machine the "holy television".





Goldsberry Church Observes 100th Anniversary

In honor of the 100th year since the founding of the Seventh-day Adventist Church at Goldsberry, Missouri, a diamond anniversary service was held November 7, 1981. During the worship service, the church's history was read by LaVerne Turner Zumbaum. It was written by her father, Herschel G. Turner.

A church of 12 members was organized as the result of evangelistic meetings in 1881, held at New Boston by Pastors C. H. Chaffee and Donell. Services were held in a local school house for several years, and the membership increased. A church building was erected in 1893 on the present location in a country setting about three miles north of Goldsberry. Because of increasing need for more room, the building was enlarged in 1916 to its present proportions. The basement fellowship room and adjoining kitchen were completed in 1978.

In 1909 the church erected a twostory frame school building known as the Goldsberry Intermediate School. This building burned in 1925, and was replaced with a tile building. Because of the conviction that Christian education was ordained of God, dozens of young people have gone from this church to hold responsible positions in the organized work of the denomination.

The church reached its largest membership in the early 1930's. Some families have moved away, and many young people left for school, and then went on to other duties. Though the membership has diminished, the congregation retains its devotion and zeal for support of the gospel work. R. W.

Gepford, pastor of the Marceline District, challenged the church to renew its consecration and dedication to the finishing of the work.


Stop Smoking Seminar Held

Union to Host Art History Tour of Mediterranean Areas

The Union College Humanities Division will sponsor an art history tour of Israel, Egypt, Greece and Italy this spring, hosted by Richard Burton, as-

sistant professor of art.

The tour extends from May 5 to May 29, leaving and returning from Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. After a two-day stopover in London, the group will spend about a week and a half in Israel, to be followed by shorter stays in Cairo, Athens and Rome

Professor Burton has conducted the same tour before, and plans to tie art and history together in an interesting way for tour members. Cost is approximately \$2,500 per person, with an exact price to be set in early February.

The tour is open to the public.

'Prairie Valley' Distributorship Launched

A new development has dramatically multiplied the potential of Union College's already prosperous health food enterprise, Peanut Hill Market. Manager Robert McEndree reports that in mid-June of 1981 the store acguired a health food distributorship previously located in Norfolk, Nebraska. The operation, known as Prairie Valley Distributors, transforms the college's health food operation from retail to wholesale.

As a wholesale distributor, Prairie Valley can buy products directly from growers and manufacturers. A middleman is thus avoided and products are purchased 20 percent more

cheaply.

McEndree is highly enthusiastic about the potential of Prairie Valley Distributors. In the few months since the distributorship was acquired, "sales have increased phenomenally," he says, adding that "the potential for future growth is unlimited."

Prairie Valley currently distributes to some 30 stores in Nebraska, Missouri, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana and Texas. International distribution will begin from an agreement to sell foods to Caribbean Union College in Trinidad, Tobago. Prairie Valley is also distributing to stores at Southern Missionary College and Southwestern Adventist College and there are tentative plans to deal with stores at other North American Adventist colleges.

Wholesale foods, such as nuts, dried fruits, grains, flour, beans and carob, are received in huge 40-pound bags. Student employees then bag the products for individual sales in retail outlets. About 35 Union College students are employed by Prairie Valley and Peanut Hill.

MRMC X-ray Department Views, Purchases. Improvements

The purchase of two new x-ray machines and the adoption of a new imaging system which reduces the radiation to the patient are recent developments for the x-ray department at Moberly Regional Medical Center, according to Ward Childers, registered x-ray technologist and department chief.

The first new machine is a General Electric AMX portable x-ray unit. Costing approximately \$26,955, this instrument will be used to do radiographic studies on patients unable to come to the x-ray department. Approximately 75 patients per month will have x-rays

taken by this unit.

The second new x-ray machine is also made by General Electric and is called an RFX Table and Spot Filmer, used for general radiographic and fluoroscopic studies. Ward Childers estimates this machine will be used for about 100 studies per month. Cost of this unit is about \$62,000. Funds for both of these machines came from public contributions to the MRMC Progress Fund which totalled more than \$790,000 in gifts and pledges to help equip the new medical center.

A third innovation at the MRMC x-ray department is the new radiographic film imaging system. This new system produces an x-ray film of improved quality using approximately one-half the radiation exposure dose of most conventional film-screen imaging systems. The film-screen system can be applied to all aspects of radiographic imaging.

This machine is adaptable and may be updated to accept new technology such as a digital imaging system, or a type of filmless x-ray process, a service the medical center hopes to be offering within the next couple of years. A key benefit will be the ability to do arteriography studies on an out-patient basis, thus saving patients the time and expense of staying in the hospital overnight.

Happenings At Porter Memorial

Approximately \$75,000 was raised for Porter Memorial Hospital's new coronary care unit at the hospital foundation's first annual awards dinner November 21. Denver broadcasting personality Pete Smythe received the foundation's Henry M. Porter Award, represented by a handsome gold medallion struck for the occasion. Steve Allen starred in a music

and comedy performance with his wife, Jayne Meadows. Former astronaut Wally Schirra was master of ceremonies for the event. The coronary care unit is now under construction on the hospital's second floor (north wing). When completed it will house 17 beds.

- Porter Memorial Hospital was recently notified that the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (ICAH) has renewed its accreditation for a term of two years, the maximum now permitted. The decision follows a visit to Porter by a team of inspectors from the ICAH.
- A child development center. which will be available to children of Porter Memorial Hospital employees, will soon be under construction. The 5,500-square-foot facility will be located to the west of the hospital, and will have a capacity of 90 children, infants through school age. A licensed director is to be hired by early 1982, and it is hoped the center will open in late summer or early fall. The center is not envisioned as just a baby-sitting service. It will feature instructional and skill developing programs. Projected hours of operation are 6 a.m. to midnight. The center will be operated by an independent corporation in consultation with the hospital.


Gift Bible Memorial Named After Cross

Soil Testing at PUC To Aid Mission Program

An agricultural missionary of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Zimbabwe Africa, will thrust a shovel into the soil beside a row of brown-spotted, withered bean plants. He will put the soil into a package addressed to Pacific Union College.

PUC's agriculture department will soon start a soil testing service for Adventist missionaries seeking to develop agricultural progress in their areas, according to Ralph Wood, department chairman.

The new service will help missionaries develop the most productive crops possible by testing the three major chemical elements in the soil: nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium, as well as some minor elements. A 100-gram sample will be needed to conduct the tests.

PUC's agriculture department will then send written advice on how the soil could be improved by adding specified amounts of chemicals and fertilizer. This will not only provide for better agricultural commerce, but will help feed people who do not have access to or money for the grains, vegetables, and fruits they need to thrive. By first meeting these physical needs of the people of Zimbabwe the missionary gains access to their hearts for the message of God's love.

According to Mr. Wood, only PUC and Loma Linda University offer classes in soil testing.

In an effort to detect glaucoma in its early stages, Christian Record Braille Foundation has introduced a mobile glaucoma screening unit to travel to camp meetings and other sites to offer

free screenings, according to B. E. Jacobs, general manager.

The mobile unit, a converted Trailways bus, made its initial run last summer to conference camp meetings in Oregon, British Columbia and Central California. "Some 750 Adventists were screened at the three sites, 27 of whom were referred to an ophthalmologist for further treatment," reports William Lawson, Foundation

treasurer and coordinator of last summer's screenings.

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
