Dear Friends,

An old Chinese proverb states: "The longest journey is begun with the first step." Some people just need to get started. There are those who need to hitch their wagon to a "start". I'm a firm believer in the fact that "stepping up the stairs will get you farther than staring up the stairs."

What a wonderful time in which to live and work! Let me again invite you to join me in working and praying for a thousand souls a day to be a reality and that Mid-America will do its share—and more. Remember, unless Christ is Lord of all, He is not Lord at all!

Children's TV Program Slated for '82

Faith For Today is planning a children's television program to be released later this year, according to Dan Matthews, director. The program is part of a total children's ministry concept which also includes a kids' health magazine and Bible courses and games.

The aim of Faith For Today's children's ministry is to "Give Kids a Chance to Meet Jesus," which is the theme of their current annual offering campaign.

A children's program is not a new idea for Faith For Today. A few years ago they developed a children's series, but ran into some difficult problems with it, so it was shelved. The proposed program ideas, which Faith For Today is not yet ready to release, are entirely new. Matthews says the kids' program will reflect a philosophy of positive lifestyle.

"When you realize that most people who ever become Christians actually accept Christ before they're 12 years old, then it becomes important that we minister specifically to children," says Matthews.

"Television makes it possible for us to meet them right where they spend a lot of time." And he adds, "Too much of what they see on tv isn't all that beneficial."

As a step to get the children's ministry started, last October sample copies of *Bodywise*, a health magazine for children, were mailed to all of Faith For Today's donors. Adults were asked to sponsor the magazine for the children they know. During the current annual offering campaign that offer was extended to every Seventh-day Adventist who receives a union paper.

Another part of Faith For Today's new children's ministry is a set of three Bible games called *Project: ORION Kit.* These were first made available through selected Vacation Bible Schools last summer. To date more than 2,000 children have received *ORION* kits from Faith For Today.

"We're getting into children's television because we see a need for quality kids' shows, programs that teach something about lifestyle and values as well as entertain," says Matthews. "A lot of parents are concerned about their children's health and well-being. It's our aim to provide kids with a program that will help them grow up healthy in mind and body."

When all the parts of the children's ministry work together, they provide opportunities to children that many of them might not otherwise have, opportunities to meet Jesus. Faith For Today asks you to remember this ministry with a special offering on Sabbath, February 13. You can help give kids a chance to meet Jesus.

Youth Volunteers To LaVida Mission

Young people from two Lincolnarea Adventist churches learned about mission service the practical experience way recently when a group of 25 spent a week at LaVida Mission in New Mexico.

According to Wayne Beltz, project coordinator, some 17 youth from Piedmont Park and College View Churches, in addition to about eight adults, made the estimated 1,000-mile trip from Lincoln to the Indian mission to share their work skills, spiritual enthusiasm and to learn about a different culture.

"Our main purpose for the experience was to help our youth realize others need their help," Beltz explains, who was assisted on the project by College View Academy Chaplain Jim Brauer. "There is a real need at LaVida. We helped finish work Maranatha started not too long ago."

Work included construction—block laying, drywalling, ditch digging, maintenance—and repairing a 1939 road grader. The young people also conducted a student week-of-prayer for the 60 Indian students, ages 4-15, who attend the mission.

Not only did the youth work while in Colorado, but many of them worked in Lincoln prior to the trip to defray their expenses to LaVida.

"Eight students worked enough to pay for their trip, while another earned half his fare," Beltz says. "Projects ranged from painting to car washing, yard work to tree cutting and any other miscellaneous errands the young people could procure."

Beltz also praises those who allowed the young people to work their way to LaVida.

"The trip meant a great deal to the youth. Besides learning about a different culture, they also discovered what mission work is all about."

Community Service Report From Newton

They were given an opportunity to build their own homes in exchange for an amount of clothing. The result was they not only had better homes, but clothing, too. This is helping people help themselves.

Oak Grove Church is sponsoring the Pathfinder Club to get them started. The baptistry in the church was improved with new curtains and a mural on the back wall. An award is presented annually to a worthy person in the community. They are also planning a Five-day Plan to Stop Smoking.

The St. Joseph Church supplied furniture for two families. They receive calls from people who are in need and supply food for them.

The Lees Summit Church is a new church, and they are sending letters to the businesses in their area to let them know of their intentions in the community.

All of the Community Service organizations have participated in making mattress covers and curtains for Camp Heritage.

Cancer Prevention Seminar

Three physicians from Big Horn Family Medicine, all members of the Powell, Wyoming Church, recently conducted their first Cancer Prevention Seminar for the community. Using slides, films and overhead projections, Drs. Dave Lounsberry, Dan Engeberg and Duane Dodd lectured on common types of cancer, the symptoms, treatment and major risk factors involved with each type, and the preventive measures that should be taken.

Of the 21 people registered for the two-night session, only one was a church member. For a follow-up article for the local newspaper, several registrants were interviewed, and all were enthusiastic about the program. Some commented on their surprise to learn that smoking was a major risk in other types of cancer besides lung, and some expressed interest in learning more about nutrition.

"For a long time I've wanted to see our community more involved in health education," one man said. "This was time and money well spent and has made me determined to take better care of myself and my family." Those interviewed thought the seminar was "excellent" and said they would recommend it to others.

Big Horn Family Medicine has previously conducted cardiac risk programs and stop-smoking clinics in Powell and plans more community health education that will include nutrition, exercise and stress management.

New Church In RM Conference

The Korean church is the largest group of believers ever officially organized in the conference. The charter membership is 58. The present Korean population in the Denver area is about 9,000 and shows a continuous increase of 500 per year. The large and constant growth of the Korean population has created a strong interest among Korean Adventists to form a church in the Denver area.

In June of 1979, a group of about 12 Korean members, under the leadership of the late Dr. Fred Pang, and later joined by Elder David Oh, started having their own services at the youth chapel of the Denver South Church. Pastor A. G. Ratcliffe and the leadership of Denver South gave strong support and encouraged the establishment of the church. By the end of 1979 the Korean group membership had doubled in size to 24. In 1980 the membership continued to grow and reached 40. The conference executive committee approved the formation of the Korean Company and this was accomplished March 28, 1981. Since the time of the Korean Company formation, the membership increased from 43 to 58.

During the last two and one-half years, 16 persons have been baptized and two persons joined the church by profession of faith. In addition to 58 baptized members, there are 15 Sabbath School members who are studying and looking forward to church membership.

Hospital Receives State Approval for Third Floor

A Predevelopment Certificate of Public Necessity for Financing was approved for Brighton Community Hospital on January 7. The governing organization, the Colorado Department of Health Facilities Review Council, made the approval to permit BCH to proceed with obtaining financing to construct a partial third floor on the new hospital.

The 9,510 square foot addition to the hospital now under construction will provide 15 more beds than the 43 already approved, bringing the total to 58, at a cost of \$2,465,000. Financing is to be arranged through tax exempt bonds issued by the City of Brighton and backed by Porter Memorial Hospital, a sister hospital in the Adventist Health System.

In the staff's recommendation, travel distance to metro Denver hospitals was cited, where the nearest metro hospital is 30 minutes away. Few Brighton physicians regularly practice at other hospitals, making referrals to other physicians practicing in the overbedded hospitals necessary.

The third floor is expected to be ready for occupancy by late 1982.

BCH Launches New Year Of Wellness Programs

Brighton Community Hospital has released its schedule for wellness programs for the first part of 1982. Programs free of charge or at a nominal fee for the community include stop smoking plan, weight management and prenatal classes.

A Five-day Plan to Stop Smoking was held at Fort Lupton in January, and additional Five-day Plan seminars will be held in Brighton February 8-12 and March 8-12.

The Wa-Rite weight management programs are currently being held at the Brighton Seventh-day Adventist Church. The afternoon series began January 20, and the evening series began January 21. Both series are continuing for 12 consecutive weekly sessions. With the optional exercise program, each session lasts two hours.

Wa-Rite program director Betty Brinkmann, R.D., emphasizes a plan of regular diet and exercise, giving special attention to maintenance of the weight loss. Based on sound principles of nutrition, Mrs. Brinkmann's plan can be used for life in achieving and maintaining the desired weight. With her guidance, each participant designs their own eating plan to avoid the feelings of deprivation that often accompany crash dieting.

Four weekly Prenatal Classes were also held in January for expectant mothers and their families. The classes featured discussions, films, lectures and exercise sessions designed to prepare expectant mothers for normal and Caesarean deliveries, prenatal and postnatal care of mother and infant, and information on the expenses of childbirth. First-time parents find this four-week session especially helpful.

A seminar on Stress Management will begin March 4, 7:00 p.m. and continue through April 8 in the hospital dining room.

The book will be distributed by Adventist Book Centers throughout the United States and is also available through the Andrews communication department. According to Netteburg, 150 copies were sold before the book was published.

Adventist Writer's Market, printed by Patterson Printing Company of Benton Harbor, contains four articles to assist the writer in the quest for professional quality. The helps include manuscript preparation, finding time to write, helpful books to own and suggestions on overcoming writer's block.

The book may be revised every five years, but will not be an annual publication.

A new evangelistic thrust for Hispanic people is the radio service being developed and titled "Perspective," according to Dr. Humberto Rasi, editor-in-chief of International Publications at Pacific Press. This service is primarily for non-Adventists. Although the programs are nonsectarian, each one deals with a great theme in the Bible. The five-minute tapes, for weekly airing, will help to develop a wider distribution of the missionary journal, El Centinela, for Spanish speaking people. Each tape is professionally recorded, and contains an editorial comment and a discussion of current events in the light of Bible perspective.

Nine tapes have been completed for use during the months of November

Battle Creek Sanitarium Adopts New Name

On December 10, 1981, the Board of Directors of Battle Creek Sanitarium Hospital, Battle Creek, Michigan, voted to change the institution's name to Battle Creek Adventist Hospital.

The vote was the culmination of nearly a year's investigation into the need for a change of name for the hospital. Continued use of the sanitarium designation for the 155-bed acute care facility has resulted in misunderstanding among service area residents about the hospital's programs and role in the community.


Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, who went to Battle Creek a few years after its founding as the Western Health Reform Institute, changed the institution's name to Battle Creek Medical and Surgical Sanitarium. The word "sanitarium" was meant to connote a place where individuals suffering illness might come both to be cured, and to learn to care for their bodies in order to prevent illness. The sanitarium at Battle Creek, one of more than 400 Seventh-day Adventist health care facilities around the world, was the first to be called by that name.


