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# WHAT AN OPPORTUNITY!

What an opportunity! Sabbath School Community Guest Day, March 20! Here is an opportunity to invite relatives, neighbors and friends to be your guests at your Sabbath School. On this day in a very special way the entire Sabbath School and worship service should be geared to non-Adventists. Out on the streets and in the homes of our Mid-America cities there are literally hundreds and thousands of people who if invited in a proper way would be more than happy to be guests at a Sabbath School and

worship service.

Community Guest Day presents a challenge to every Sabbath School member, Sabbath School officer and pastor to be so friendly and to put on such a program that guests will come back again and again. Hopefully they will keep coming until they become regular members. Programs are to be planned to make favorable impressions upon the non-church member. Community Guest Day presents an opportunity to break down prejudice, create good will and make friends for the church.

Have you longed for the joy of leading a soul to Christ? Try the Community Guest Day approach. In nearly every church there are those who can testify that the first contact with this message was when they responded to an invitation to attend the Sabbath School service. Many have accepted Christ and embraced the truth as a result of first being invited by a friend to Sabbath

School. Here then is a real opportunity. First, make out a list of neighbors, friends or relatives you would like to invite as your guests on Community Guest Day. Visit them in their homes and invite them personally. Explain that you would like them to be your guests in Sabbath School on this day. Do not rely on letters or phone call invitations—make personal visits. Start now to make up your list of those you intend to invite. Start this week to make your visits. Don't put it off. Don't wait until just a day or two before Community Guest Day. It will be too late then. Start now.

Remember to ask God to impress by His Holy Spirit the hearts of those you intend to visit. It should not come as a surprise if the majority of those you visit offer excuses as to why they cannot come. Keep visiting. Perseverance always wins. G. R. Nash, a former world Sabbath School leader, tells the story of one member who called on all of the people on her street inviting them to come as her guests on Community Guest Day. Everyone had an excuse why he could not accept her invitation. She went home disappointed. Then she remembered another home that she had not visited. She immediately went to this home and to her joy the woman accepted her invitation. Today that woman with her husband and daughter is rejoicing in the church as a direct result of Sabbath School Community Guest Day, and this faithful Sabbath School member's perseverance. What a tragic thing it might have been if she had not persevered.

Remember that those who accept your invitation are your guests. Where possible arrange to call for them at their home Sabbath morning and take them to Sabbath School with you. They will feel much more at ease. Introduce them to the teacher of your class and sit with them. Should you have duties in the Sabbath School introduce them to a friend with whom they may sit. How hospitable it would be to have them come to

your home for lunch, should the church not have a luncheon on this day.

It is our prayer that on Community Guest Day all guests will find in every Seventh-day Adventist Sabbath School an atmosphere of reverance, friendliness and hospitality. Every guest should receive a personal welcome and an invitation to continue to attend Sabbath School. Sabbath School teachers may tactfully request the name and addresses of guests for future contact, or a guest registry may be used.

What an opportunity Community Guest Day provides for follow-up activity. A social call should be made as soon as possible by the Sabbath School teacher or a designated person. Visitation may be planned in coordination with the Personal Ministries Department of the church. Each Sabbath School class member may

share in the follow-up by including the names of guests on his individual prayer list.

Community Guest Day—What an Opportunity! What an opportunity to break all attendance records—to have the largest attendance ever in the history of your church. Community Guest Day is not just for the adult divisions. It is for all divisions in the Sabbath School. It provides a marvelous opportunity for our boys and girls to invite their playmates and friends to Sabbath School. Teachers of all divisions should arrange for members of the class to visit personally all those who are non-attending Sabbath School members. A special invitation should be extended for them to be present. Printed invitations and welcome folders are available from your conference Sabbath School director.

"The object of Sabbath school work should be the ingathering of souls." Counsels on Sabbath School Work, page 61. Community Guest Day is another opportunity to make you a soul winner and your Sabbath School a soul-winning one.

What an Opportunity! Community Guest Day, Sabbath, March 20! Take it and use it!

## Pueblo Conducts Five-day Plan

Twenty people attended one of the "regularly scheduled" Five-day Plans to Stop Smoking held at the Pueblo Seventh-day Adventist Church. One participant said, as she paid the \$5.00 registration fee, "I hope this works. I just paid \$350.00 for an eight-week Smoke Enders course". The Five-day Plan did work for her. Another man came and said, "I was supposed to go to a Father-Daughter Banquet tonight, but my daughter wanted me to quit smoking instead".

Pastor John Martin tried a new

experiment at this Five-day Plan. On the second night, instead of just telling the group to eat a good breakfast, he sent breakfast home with them in a brown paper bag. One cup of granola, one banana and one apple. The next evening, 95% of the group reported that they had never eaten such a big breakfast and also that they had not been tempted to snack and the urge to smoke was greatly reduced.

Don Donato, staff writer for the Pueblo Star-Journal, had heard about the regularly scheduled Five-day Plans conducted by Pastor Martin. He decided to "go and see for himself" if

the plan really worked!

# Dandy Thanksgiving gift from smokers to family would be to quit habit

Now, when the waitress asks, "Smoking or nonsmoking," our younger daughter gives me a big hug, the older one pats my arm and my wife and I smile at each other.

I don't know how they could have been so patient with me for so long. How can you eat in that haze? I sure hope I never go back to smoking

And riding in the car with a smoker! That's torture! How could I ever do that to people I love?

If I'd had any idea of just how choking it really is, even when I was a (excuse the expression) never-saydie smoker, I wouldn't have smoked in the car.

Now, even though I don't smoke, I am reminded of what non-smokers were saying when I did smoke.

For example, sometimes the fog from my smoking co-workers gets so thick that I need to escape; my breath comes harder, and I get closer to comprehending the words "asthma attack."

My colleagues won't like it, I imagine, but that is the way of it. Some days when I get home from work my nose is so clogged up that I breathe wheezing through my mouth. That used to happen at home, too, but it doesn't anymore . . . just at work; the only place that smokers consistently smudge-pot my air

I never thought I'd say that sort of thing myself. But the truth is, as a smoker I hadn't the slightest idea how bad smoke is to a non-smoker. I'm sure that smokers aren't rotten people, at least not just because they smoke; they just don't know what it's like for the non-smokers around them.

If someone mentioned my smoking, I reacted defensively. It was easy to convince myself that the other person was just a complainer or for some reason wanted to deprive me of a pleasure.

Of course, even at the time, I knew my rebuttal was an empty feather pillow.

Every once in a while, I still feel compelled to apologize to Bob Overton, into whose living space in

the office my smoke drifted for some years. And patient Mary Jean Porter,

I chose to quit smoking earlier this year as a Valentine's Day present to my wife and children. It's nice to get Mom off my back, too.

Quitting smoking would be a great Thanksgiving, Hanukkah or Christmas present to give the people with whom you live and work. If you don't believe me, ask them.

Speaking of asking, at about this point in somebody's quit-smoking lecture, I would be asking myself, "Sure, but even if I wanted to quit, how would I? I've quit a thousand times

After hearing about it for years, and poking fun at the idea of people who don't smoke teaching others to quit smoking, I decided to go to a Five-Day Plan To Stop Smoking, sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Why? Because if I had any will-power I wouldn't be overweight, either.

Anyway, I went to the Five-Day Plan with the idea that if what they wanted me to do was too weird, I would just drop out and go on smoking. It wasn't bad at

Pastor John Martin of First Seventh-day Adventist Church, 3910 O'Neal, is a personable fellow who obviously has sympathy for smokers. His approach to the whole thing is very non-threatening and noncondemning.

However, he does let you know he hates smoking. The Five-Day Plan will be offered next week, Sunday through Thursday, beginning at 7 p.m. and lasting about an hour-and-a-half each evening. All you need do is show up at the Adventist Church.

Martin says that hundreds of Puebloans have used the Five-Day Plan to stop smoking, and hundreds of thousands have quit across the nation.

Included in the format are films, lectures, slide programs, question-and-answer periods, a buddy system, a carefully regulated diet and exercise program (no, that's not a good excuse for bowing out, because they're not radical at all)

Martin has been trained by the American Red Cross and the Five-Day Plan International to conduct the stop-smoking clinics. The one next week will be the 24th he has conducted. The Five-Day Plan International says the success rate among those who follow the whole program is 85 percent.



### Conference Report-1981

The baptism of 480 souls highlighted the activities of our conference during 1981. As we give a brief report of our conference, we are grateful for the dedication and loyalty of each member, particularly during a time of transition and merger. Our conference headquarters and operations located under one roof at Topeka in September. Our officers and staff are dedicated to assuring a more efficient operation as the two offices become one. The Adventist Book Center and Elder Walt Howard will continue to headquarter in Lincoln.

Last year, our Literature Evangelists delivered \$588,000.00 worth of books and literature and saw 38 of their customers baptized. One thousand two hundred ninety-five youth attended camps at Camp Arrowhead and Broken Arrow Ranch. New Schools at Golden Hills (Bellevue), Mullen, and Sidney were begun and total enrollment across the conference increased. The Ingathering goal was reached and surpassed. A total of \$183,230.00 was raised.

Financially, the tithe increased \$377,145.88 during the year, making the total tithe \$4,541,040.03. In addition, \$416,717.90 was sent to missions. Believing in the strong support of the local church, members gave \$2,259,281.66 for their local operations, programs, and building upkeep. In a time of unprecedented world financial uncertainty, we can only say, "God is good".

Last September, a special constituency meeting was called for the purpose of adopting a new constitution and merging the Kansas and Nebraska associations. The former Nebraska association will continue as a legal holding corporation.

A lengthy discussion of investments with Dr. Davenport and a question and answer period concerning investment policies of our conference and association proved informative. The openness and honesty of our officers has encouraged members to continue to have confidence in their leadership. The last six months of 1981 saw increased activity and increased dollars invested with the association, almost doubling the figures of the previous six months.

A new hospital was acquired on a lease agreement at Osborne, Kansas. This 29-bed acute care facility, with Don Bradley as administrator, plus the hospital at Mullen, Nebraska, and Shawnee Mission Medical Center, should help spread the SDA health

philosophy.

Dr. Andrew Hynal of Loma Linda University and Mike Ortel, both emphasized the pastors' health and physical fitness. Ortel also conducted a health screening on the pastors to determine coronary risk factors.

Ron Ihrig addressed the ministers, as did Morris Venden. Elder Venden's

messages gave strong emphasis to the aspects of salvation and the individual's personal acceptance of God's gift.

Linda Gallimore, CPA and tax accountant, spent approximately two hours explaining the new tax laws, particularly those rules which pertain to ministers. Her question and answer session and her expertise in the income tax field were greatly appreciated.

The concluding message by Elder Joel Tompkins was a challenge to each pastor to keep the mission of the Adventist church constantly in thought and action. Pastors were encouraged to lead church members into a clearer understanding of the historic principles of salvation and the reason why God has a remnant people.

The pastors' meeting is history, the implementation of the counsel is just beginning.

# Five-day Plan at Columbia

A Five-day Plan to Stop Smoking was held in Columbia, Missouri in January, 1982. Five inches of snow fell the first night, and only two people were able to attend, but ten attended the second night.

Participants received help through lectures, films, group discussions, exercise and diet. One of the films showed that not only smoking damages the body, but also overeating. For every pound of excess weight, there are 200 miles of blood vessels to which the heart must pump blood. Dr. Sid Christiansen explained that once a smoker stops it takes the body eight to ten years to completely correct the damage, although most of the damage is corrected in the first two years. After that the healing process is gradual.

Ann Metzelfelt and Thelma Stelling showed that exercise and a balanced

diet would help prevent weight gain when they no longer smoke.






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
