

ENLARGING THE KINGDOM

It has been four years since our visit to the Middle East Division in 1952. How pleased I am to see the progress of the work during these intervening years. Since we were here I find many evidences of growth. It was a pleasure to see the new Middle East Division office and the homes for the workers. And the new administration building at the College is also a credit to the church.

Furthermore, the Press building which was "new" four years ago I now find working to capacity and already too small. Indeed, a second floor has just been built and is being equipped as a bindery. I am told that the Press has been a busy place, working three shifts,

or around the clock 24 hours a day part of the time to supply the demand. In one recent year it is said the literature circulated exceeded the amount circulated in the previous fifty years.

I now see new churches built since we were here in 1952. Other new churches are in process of construction or are on blueprints. A new Bible auditorium and health and welfare center for the city of Beirut is also included in the expansion program for this field.

It is a great pleaser to see the growth of the work of God. It is in harmony with the mind and plans of God. Indeed, we have the explicit command: "Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations: spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes." Isa. 54:2.

This enlargement includes the growth of the individual church member as well as the work around the world. In fact the real growth of the church depends upon the growth and development of the members of the church. It is not enough to build new churches or new schools. It is not enough to enlarge our buildings. And it is not even enough to enlarge the membership of our churches. The real test of the strength and character of the church cannot be measured by numbers alone or by the size of the buildings we build. Indeed, we have been given clear counsel on this point in the Spirit of Prophecy:

"The real character of the church is measured, not by the high profession

she makes, not by the names enrolled upon the church book, but by what she is actually doing for the Master, by the number of her persevering, faithful workers." CS p. 12.

From this statement it is clear that we must measure our success not by how many people we lead into church to worship but by how many we lead out to work. The strength of a church is found in the number of "faithful workers."

While we lengthen the cords we must constantly be strengthening the stakes. While reaching out to help others we must be sure our own feet are not standing on slippery places. While helping others we must keep our own hearts pure and strong. We must strengthen the stakes at home—in our own homes, in our own hearts. How can we strengthen our own spiritual experience? Let us spend more time with the Word of God. There is nothing that will strengthen our minds and hearts like a study of the living Words of the living God. "If God's Word were studied as it should be, men would have a breadth of mind, a nobility of character, and a stability of purpose that are rarely seen in these times." GW p. 249. Yes, and time spent in prayer and communion with God also makes us strong.

"We kneel how weak, we rise, how full of power;
Why do we do ourselves this wrong, and others,

Love The Basis of Tithe Paying

Love must be the basis of all what we do for God or give to Him. We are told that we are to love God with all our heart, and with all our soul, and with all our mind. When the heart is right it is filled with love.

"He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things?" Romans 8:32.

Through the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, God has freely given us all things. Before one can give he must possess that which he gives. The Psalmist tells us that Christ is the creator and the supreme owner of all things. "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein." Psalms 24:1. We also read, "Every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills. I know all the fowls of the mountains: and the wild beasts of the field are mine." Psalms 50:10, 11. But more than that, God says the silver and gold are his.

God has given us in His word a definite plan for the support of the gospel message that is to be proclaimed to every nation, kindred, tongue, and people. That plan is the tithing system. We are told, "The Lord does not come to this world with gold and silver to advance His work. He supplies men with resources that by their gifts and offerings they may keep His work advancing. The one purpose above all others for which God's gifts should be used, is the sustaining of workers in the great harvest field. And if men, and women as well, will become channels of blessing to other souls, the Lord will keep the channels supplied. It is not returning to God His own that makes men poor; it is withholding that tends to poverty." 6 T p. 448, 449.

The paying of the tithe is not a Jewish institution for before the days of the church in the wilderness it was known and practiced. The patriarchs recognized the paying of tithe as a moral obligation. Abraham paid tithe four hundred twenty-two years before Sinai. (Genesis 14:18-20). Jacob paid tithe two hundred sixty-nine years before Sinai. (Genesis 28:22). After the children of Israel were delivered from Egypt they were taught lessons in the wilderness concerning their responsibility to God and the support of His work. "All the tithe of the land,



whether of the seed of the land, or of the fruit of the tree, is the Lord's: it is holy unto the Lord." Leviticus 27:30.

God made it plain that the tithe was to be used to support the Levites and the priests who served in the sanctuary service. To Aaron He said, "Thou shalt have no inheritance in their land, neither shalt thou have any part among them: I am thy part and thine inheritance among the children of Israel." Numbers 18:20.

God's plan for the support of ministers and those who serve in His cause today is the same as it was anciently. They are to be supported from His own revenue of holy things. "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel." 1 Corinthians 9:14. Christ Himself taught the binding obligation of the tithing system when He said, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." Matthew 23:23

Tithepayers are promised a rich blessing. When they bring all the tithes into His storehouse, they may claim the promise that God will open the windows of heaven, and pour out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it. He wants us to be faithful in tithe paying because He desires to take us into partnership with Him in the proclamation of the gospel. By paying an honest tithe will you not share in the joy of seeing souls saved in the kingdom of God?

"WHOSO PUTTETH HIS TRUST IN THE LORD SHALL BE SAFE"

As we hurry on from one day to another, busy with enumerable tasks, we often lose sight of the fact that God's care and protection is over each one of His children no matter where he is. We thought our readers would be interested in a letter recently written by Anees A. Haddad, Missionary Volunteer Secretary of the East Mediterranean Union, in which he tells of a remarkable and miraculous experience which took place in Old Persia where a Junior Camp was held for the first time this year.—Editor.

"On Thursday we transported our first Iranian J.M.V. camp to a place called Georgeron, twenty-three kilometers east of Tehran, in a river valley that looked beautiful and inviting. We were tired and exhausted when we went to bed late that night. On Friday it started to rain. We had no waterproof tents. In a couple of hours everything we had was wet and the rain continued to pour down. I called the staff members to headquarters and we had an earnest season of prayer asking the Lord to guide us and if it was His will to stop the rain. Then each counselor went to his drenched tent and had a season of prayer with the juniors. That was at two o'clock in the afternoon. The rain stopped, but the weather was very bad. We were impressed to break up camp and return to Tehran. The Sabbath was approaching so we had to act quickly. Pastor Skinner took a counselor to Tehran to bring a bus.

We prepared to move camp and packed everything as quickly as we could while God's hand was sheltering us from a terrific storm. The bus came with ten porters and within a few hours we were in Tehran where we set up camp in the Mission compound for Sabbath and Sunday. Elder Skinner returned Friday night to Georgeron to transport the waiting counselors for there had been no room on the bus for them. He said it was raining hard where we had been. The Lord answered our prayers and protected us for four hours until we were moved. Everybody was discouraged. We could not understand it. The farmers said that no such summer rains had fallen for years. We could not understand why the Lord should make us move out before spending one full day at camp. We were so miserably tired that the prospects of pitching tents and setting up camp in another place was very disheartening. Within five days we camped in three sites.

ACCEPT THAT WHICH GOD PROVIDES

When Christ gave the command, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" He also provided the means to accomplish that commission. God declares, "The silver is mine, and the gold is mine," David recognized that "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein." Furthermore we have the assurance of our Savior who promised, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." With these assurances of God's blessings we must press forward taking advantage of every opportunity that He presents before us.

The annual Ingathering Campaign is one means which the Lord has provided whereby we may solicit a portion of the wealth which He has entrusted to others to be used in His service. Some have asked regarding the propriety of receiving gifts from men of the world who are not of our faith. The Spirit of Prophecy gives this reply. "I would ask you, Who is it that owns our world? Who are the real owners of houses and lands? Is it not God? He has an abundance in our world which He has placed in the hands of men, by which the hungry might be supplied with food, the naked with clothing, the homeless with homes. The Lord would move upon worldly men, even idolaters, to give of their abundance for the support of the work, if we would approach them wisely, and give them an opportunity of doing those things which it is their privilege to receive." TM p. 197.

A few hesitate to go Ingathering because they feel that they are asking the

people for money and giving nothing to them in return. This feeling should not exist for two reasons. First of all, the money received through Ingathering for the service of God is money which God first gave to those individuals to be kept in trust for His work. Secondly, we should not ask without also giving. God has entrusted into our hands the knowledge of the way to eternal life. That knowledge we should tactfully offer to everyone we meet as we ingather. That knowledge which may mean eternal life to the one you meet is worth far more to him than all the wealth he may now possess. Through Ingathering contacts you may offer mansions on the streets of gold in exchange for the trials of this life. Thus you are offering far more than what you receive.

We are told by the servant of the Lord, "Just as long as we are in this world, and the Spirit of God is striving with the world, we are to receive as well as to impart favors. We are to give to the world the light of truth as presented in the Sacred Scriptures, and we are to receive from the world that which God moves upon them to do in behalf of His cause." TM p. 202.

"The Lord God... has placed His goods in the hands of unbelievers, but they are to be used in favor of doing the works that must be done for a fallen world. The agents through whom these gifts come may open up avenues through which the truth may go. They may have no sympathy with the work, and no faith in Christ, and no practice in His words; but their gifts are not to be refused on that account.

"... Let them (the leaders) be as wise as serpents, and as harmless as doves. I have repeatedly been shown that we might receive far more favors than we do in many ways if we would approach men in wisdom, acquaint them with our work, and give them an opportunity of doing those things which it is our privilege to induce them to do for the advancement of the work of God." TM p. 203.

I have frequently been challenged with the question, how can we reach the rich men with our message? They will not come to our meetings. They are too busy, usually, to read our literature. Last year I found the Ingathering work to be a most effective means to find an excuse to enter the offices of the rich and poor alike. I was surprised to find such a large number of influential men who knew little or nothing

about our work but when we showed them pictures of our schools, hospitals and other like institutions they showed a very appreciative interest in the uplift work which we as Adventists are doing for their country. Why should we labor year after year and the very ones who need this message most do not know that we exist? I believe that year by year we can use the Ingathering campaign as a most effective means of acquainting all classes of society with the work we are doing.

Aside from the message we give and the funds we receive in return, I have found my own soul stirred as I took the most active part in Ingathering work last year that I have ever taken. I am sure that once the fear of knocking at the first door is overcome, every consecrated solicitor will find a blessed experience in the Ingathering work.

Much of the advancement made in the past few years in the construction of new schools, churches, etc. has been made possible by the funds collected through the Ingathering Campaign. As the local people become better acquainted with our work we can with confidence and a prayer for God's blessings expect greater offerings in the future.

We thank God for the larger offerings from the wealthy but also we should solicit gifts from the lower classes of society as well for by doing so we open a channel whereby God may pour out His richest blessings upon the giver. The following story written by F. Emerson Andrews in the *Atlantic Monthly* should give each one new courage to ask for offerings:

"Some years ago I was walking through the Great Smoky Mountains in Tennessee. The depression was in its blackest depths, and a government program was making small allotments to impoverished farmers for seed, stock, or needed improvements. I met one of the government agents who had just returned from a mountain woman who, all alone, managed somehow to scratch a living from her two acres.

" 'If the government could allot you \$200, what would you do with it?' the government agent had asked her.

"The woman thought a moment. Her cabin had no floor but the packed earth, and light came through chinks in its wall. Finally she said: 'Reckon I'd give it to the poor.'"

May God bless each of you and make this year the greatest in Ingathering in the Middle East.

Not Twelves Disciples But Apostles

It wants true higher education, a character well expressed in *Counsels to Parents, Teachers, and Students*, page 11:

...To gain the higher education means to follow the word implicitly; it means to walk in the footsteps of Christ, to practice His virtues. It means to give up selfishness, and to devote the life

to the service of God. Higher education calls for something greater, something more divine, than the knowledge to be obtained merely from books. It means a personal, experimental knowledge of Christ; it means emancipation from ideas, from habits and practices; that have been gained in the school of the prince of darkness, and which are opposed to loyalty to God. It means to overcome stubbornness, pride, selfishness, worldly ambition, and unbelief. It is the message of deliverance from sin.

We are happy for the large groups of graduates in both the preparatory school and college classes. The number of college-graduates this year well remind us of the twelve who had followed the Master Teacher. Jesus called His *disciples to be apostles*. Unless the students from our schools "go forth" to witness for the true God into fields of His choosing, our training program is incomplete. God would call everyone to be a follower of His, and then He would send him forth into the vineyard.

At Middle East College we as fellow teachers and workers are interested in the salvation of all Advent youth and in their preparation to fill their places, respectively, to help fulfill under God the gospel commission in the Middle East.

A NEW IMPETUS TO OUR MISSION WORK

One of the greatest needs in our denomination now is for a new vital surge forward in our mission activities. In past years we have built institutions and started new work in so many places in the world that at the present a large proportion of our mission funds is needed to carry on the work already started in these places. It is vital that we strengthen the work and continue it where it is already established. However, our people are interested in seeing an impetus given to expanding the work into fields that have not yet been touched, and for the commencement of new types of activity in certain areas where we are already operating. They have shown by their financial support that they believe in strengthening the stakes, but in conversation with loyal believers in many churches we find they are interested too in lengthening the cords, and launching out for greater, more expanded work.

We are happy to report that plans have been laid to reach out into new fields and to begin these new types of activity. Our leaders in the mission fields are asking our believers in the home land to finance these projects by liberal gifts for the missions extension offering which will be taken in all Seventh-day Adventist churches on Sabbath, September 1. Let me describe for you a few of these special projects which our missionaries are asking our people to help them finance.

Brazil, a country much larger than the United States, has a population of fifty-two million people. Out of this mass of human beings 36,652 are baptized members of the Seventh-day Adventist church. We have several hospitals and a thriving medical work carried on by launches on the great rivers of the country. However, we are greatly embarrassed by the fact that we do not have nearly enough nurses in Brazil to enable the medical work to make the contribution to the advance of the message that it should. Within the whole great nation we do not have a single training school for Adventist nurses. Moreover, the nursing education schools of the country are greatly overcrowded and cannot provide nurses' training for our young people. In all South America there is only one other Adventist training school for nurses. Before our medical program, which serves so marvelously in strengthening our work and winning souls to the faith, can be expanded, it will be necessary to establish a training school within Brazil to train our Adventist young people for this profession. One of the projects to be launched as the result of funds given


toward the missions extension offering is a school of nursing in Brazil.

Almost as vital for the advancement of our work in this great nation is the building and equipping of another worker-training school. Previously our young people from the northern regions of Brazil have had to travel over 3,000 miles to our training school in southern Brazil. In recent years attempts have been made to establish a strong worker-training school in northeastern Brazil in order to educate the young people of our church who reside in those areas. Our brethren have launched out in faith in these projects, and are looking to

their fellow believers here in America to help them, by means of the missions extension offering, to provide permanent quarters and adequate housing and equipment in order that this school may function efficiently in training workers for the field.

Another imperative need that must be met immediately is for a new worker-training school in Indonesia. This largest Moslem country in the world with its eighty million people is crying out for educational facilities. Almost weekly our leaders are receiving calls

By Monday the weather had cleared and we had found a most beautiful spot to camp—right next to a spring in a grove of trees called Manzarieh on the Al Burz mountains north of Tehran.

Last night it was revealed to us why the Lord had moved us out of George-ron. The valley where we were camping was swept with a flood that took scores of lives. The newspapers report that 250 lives were lost (most of whom were in that valley) and one hundred million toumans worth of real estate and gardens.

I tremble as I write these words under a tree overlooking my juniors in their council period—all safe and praising the Lord."

Much prayer, much power; little prayer, little power; no prayer, no power.

A NEW IMPETUS TO OUR MISSION WORK

from communities for teachers to come and establish Adventist schools. In many places the community is willing to provide the school and the equipment if we will only provide the teacher. Annually many souls are being won to the faith so that we are not able by any means to meet the demand for trained teachers to provide schools for our children, let alone to enter into the wonderful evangelistic opportunity provided by these calls from other communities. A worker-training school has been started for Indonesia, but it will need a large appropriation of funds this year in order to become well-established.

In the Middle East Division also missions extension funds will be used to provide a school for the training of Adventist children who are encountering intolerable conditions in trying to attend the local schools. These Seventh-day Adventist youth are punished for their attendance at Sabbath schools. Frequently they are beaten and sometimes expelled. The great need in that division is for a school in the area where a branch Sabbath school has been started by the students of the Middle East College. This elementary school, in addition to providing an education for those young people who have recently accepted the faith, will serve as a laboratory school in the teacher education department of the college.

We hesitate to mention the crying need of a worker-training school for central New Guinea for fear that our readers will tire of hearing about this endless need for schools. However, all over the world the need of the hour is for the establishment of additional schools to train our indigenous Adventist youth so that they can help proclaim the third Angel's message.

In some mission fields the greatest need is for industries wherein the young people who are receiving an education in schools already established may work to pay for their own expenses. Due to the very low average income in most mission fields it is almost impossible for many Adventist parents to pay anything toward the education of their children. At the same time, the mission cannot be burdened with these expenses. Therefore added industrial facilities are needed in several schools to provide opportunities for students to earn their own way. Some missions extension funds this year will purchase printing

presses to expand or establish print shops which provide excellent work opportunities for students. In other countries the need is for printing presses to enable the brethren to publish our truth in the language of the country.

I am sure it is not necessary to write more. The above illustrations have given a picture of the greatest challenge in expanding our work today. I have labored in some mission lands and have visited others. In every mission field the transcendent demand is for more and better schools to train thousands of Adventist young people to carry on and expand our growing work. Now here is an opportunity for each of us to provide a new surge to the onward progress of the Adventist message. Let us plan now to give a liberal offering for missions extension on Sabbath, September 1. At the worship hour let us talk it over with all the family including the children, and lay plans to give a large amount for these essential projects.
