A Prophet In The Remnant Church

Near the close of World War I my family decided to join the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Those were exciting days, and we all felt our need of Bible study. In a few months my name would be called in the draft, and I would have to leave home and loved ones to prepare for the battlefield. A number of close friends, who were slightly older, had gone to front lines and had been killed. Was I prepared for what seemed to be my lot?

The day of our baptism was one that we shall never forget. Mother, father, brother, sister, and I were buried with our Lord in the water of an abandoned gravel pit near Frankfort, Indiana, where we were attendiny camp meeting. That was a happy day for me! What a wonderful experience it is to find Christ as Lord and Saviour and to begin the new life with Him!

After my family was baptized we discovered to our surprise that the Seventh-day Adventist Church had a prophet. That was a strange and bewildering discovery. Bible studies were given to make clear that the "remnant" church was to keep the commandments of God and to have the testimony of Jesus which is the Spirit of Prophecy. These truths were read to us from Revelation 21:17 and Revelation 19:10.

One of the first books which we purchased was *Early Writings*. As I sit here writing, this choice little volume is before me. I notice the date I received the book written on the fly leaf, December 25, 1918. Eventually we all received the light, and how grateful we have been that we did not steel our hearts against it.

I want to pass along to you a few of the points that helped me to decide that Mrs. White was indeed God's true messenger. Surely God inspired His servant, Mrs. Ellen G. White, to write this and all of the fifty-three volumes which were given through her to the remnant church.



Even before the time of the great disappointment in 1844 God sought to bring light and guidance to the Adventist telievers. In 1842 He spoke in a prophetic dream to William Foy of Boston, Massachusetts, opening up to his mind the travels of God's people to the Holy City. Two such views were given to him. He was at one time a free-will Baptist, but he was preparing for the Episcopal ministry. Large audiences gathered to hear him speak and relate the story of what he had seen of the heavenly land and the earth made new. Not long before the disappointment of 1844 God gave this man another vision in which he saw three steps or platforms, the third extending all the way to the kingdom d God. This vision he could not under-stand as he was expecting Jesus to come very soon. And he saw no place for such a representation. Actually the vision represented the work of the three angels of Revelation 14. He made no effort to relate this vision which might have allayed the heartbreak of the disappointed Adventists.

Shortly before October 22, 1844, God visited Hazen Foss of Maine with three visions. Mr. Foss firmly believed the Lord would come on October 22 of that year. He was a man of fine appearance, of pleasing address, and we l educated. The Lord came near to this favored man and revealed to him the journey of the Advent people to the city of God with many of its accompanying dangers. He saw also the trials and persecution that would follow if he was faithful in relating what had been shown him. Like Mr. Foy, he saw the three steps on which the people of God were to stand as they neared the Holy City. But he was a firm believer in the Lord's coming "in a few more days" as the people then sang. The part of the vision relating to the three steps were to him unexplainable, and he shrank from the task assigned to him and refused to relate the story.

The vision was repeated the second time, and he was told that if he still refused to relate what had been shown to him the burden would be taken from him and given to one of the weakest of God's children who would faithfully communicate God's message. Again he refused. A third vision was given, and he was told that he was released and that the burden was to be laid upon one of the "weakest of the weak" who would do the Lord's bid-ding. This stirred him to action, and he resolved to tell the vision to others, but alas, when he stood before the assembled audience he could say nothing. The vision once so clear had fled, and his mind was a blank. He stood before the large audience of people as dumb as a statue, and finally said in the deepest agony, "God has fulfilled His word. He has taken the vision from me." And in great distress of mind he moaned,

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"I am a lost man." From that time he lost his hope in Christ and went into a state of despair. He never attended a religious meeting again and lost all personal interest in religion. He lived for a number of years and died in 1893.

A few months after the disappointment God called the third person to serve as His messenger. This call came during a season of worship when five women were praying earnestly for light. It happened in Portland, Maine, in the home of a Mrs. Haines.

In this group of women was Ellen G. Harmon (later Ellen G. White), a girl of seventeen. She was of frail health, having been injured by an accident when she was only nine years old.

The disappointment had been a severe taxation on her physical strength, and some thought that Miss Harmon could live only a short time. It was while praying for light regarding the disappointment that she was taken off in vision for the first time. In this vision much of what God had revealed to Foy and to Foss passed before her mind's eye. It was a wonderful comfort to her and to the faithful ones to whom she related the vision, bringing a sense of the presence of God in their bitter experience. So we can see that this young woman, who was so weak physically and who had but a short time in which to live, was indeed one of the "weakest of the weak." Yet, God laid upon her the burden to serve as His messenger. This vision was the first of approximately 2,000 that followed during the next seventy years. She became God's messenger to the remnant people of God.

Many years after her first vision, Mrs. White wrote: "My Saviour declared me to be His messenger. Your work, He instructed me, is to bear My Word. Strange things will arise, and in your youth I set you apart to bear the message to the erring ones, to carry the Word before unbelievers, and with pen and voice, to reprove from the Word actions that are not right. Exhort from the Word. I will make My Word open to you. It shall not be as a strange language. In the true eloquence of simplicity, with voice and pen, the messages that I have given shall be heard from one who has never learned in the schools, but My Spirit and My power shall be with you."

It was no easy struggle for Ellen Harmon to accept this call. For some time she prayed that the burden might be laid upon someone more capable than herself. Still came the command from her heavenly Father: "Make known to others what I have revealed to you." Finally after earnest prayer and the divine assurance that she

would be sustained through her labors she accepted the call of God.

Then her work began in earnest. At Poland, Maine, she passed along to those who were present in the home of her sister the sobering story of her first vision in Portland, Maine. Hazen Foss was present in an adjoining room listening. He recognized the vision as similar to the one that God had given him. He urged the young woman to be "faithful in bearing the burden and in relating the testimonies that the Lord should give her." He told her that she would wear the crown of life he might have worn. To others he said, "That is the instrument on whom the Lord has laid His burden."

From the day when Ellen unconditionally surrendered to her Master's will until her death July 16, 1915, the messenger of God, chosen and commissioned by God, never drew back.

If you haven't read the account of her first vision, turn to Early Writings, page 13. Read this thrilling experience, for it will help you to understand better the road we are to travel as we march onward and upward to the kingdom. Page 16 holds forth a lovely promise, "We all entered the cloud together, and were seven days ascending to the sea of glass, when Jesus brought the crowns, and with His own right hand placed them on our heads. He gave us harps of gold and palms of victory. Here on the sea of glass the 144,000 stood in a perfect square. Some of them had very bright crowns, others not so bright. Some crowns appeared heavy with stars, while others had but few. All were perfectly satisfied with their crowns."

Read it all for it is wonderful, and don't forget, you and I are to be in that great company, if we "hold fast" till He comes.

Not long after I joined the church I became a literature evangelist. Another book written by Sister White brought daily comfort and guidance to me for three and a half years during which time I worked as a colporteur. That little treasure chest of inspiration is now known as Colporteur Ministry. How often when things went hard with me in my work, I would go to God and my Bible and Colporteur Ministry to study, meditate, and pray. In those days God came near to me. And those were days which have molded and fashioned my life for service at home and in many mission fields.

Another experience that came to me in those halcyon days brought real joy. I decided to enroll in a correspondence course on the subject of the Spirit of Prophecy. Of all the subjects that I took while in academy and college this is the one that made the most profound and lasting impression upon my mind. As I studied the many lessons in this course it became crystal clear to me that God had called youthful Ellen Gould Harmon (later Mrs. Ellen G. White) to be His messenger to the remnant church. I believe wholeheartedly in the gift of the Spirit of Prophecy which we have seen so gloriously manifested in the second Advent Movement. An ancient king of Judah said to his people, "Believe in the Lord your God, so shall ye be established; believe His prophets, so shall ye prosper." 2 Chron. 20:20.

After being led into the ministry I labored in many fields, among them the Australasion Division. While there I learned more about the work of Sister White. She worked to build up the cause of God in Australia and New Zealand for about nine years, between 1891 and 1900. Many precious gems of truth from her pen were written while she labored in that great division field. She owned a modest home at Avondale where the Australasian Missionary College is located. And it was in this place known as Sunnyside that Sister White spent many happy hours writing.

I have stood by the stump of the old tree near the side of her home, under which she sat writing portions of that wonderful book *Desire of Ages*. Her old chair is now at the newly renovated Sunnyside home. The old dwelling is being used as an historical landmark for our people.

While Sister White was in Australasia God gave her instruction through prophetic dreams of the night which have served as a guiding light to our leaders around the world. Among other important messages were those which gave to us guidance in the creation by the leaders of our present form of church and conference organization. Our first union conference organization came to birth in Australia. Instruction given gave to our leaders guidance in building a strong health and health food program. The instruction was followed most carefully in Australasia, and as a result we stand at "the head and not tail" in these things. The health food work in Australia is a large and fruitful enterprise.

We have a most valuable book, Messages to Young People, written especially for the youth by Sister White. How I did enjoy and appreciate this lovely volume as I read it for the first time many years ago while making my first airplane flight from Saigon to Singapore. I had the feeling of being very close to heaven in more than one respect. Here are some of the beautiful statements from Messages to Young People which I cherish as dear to my heart:

"Remember that in your life, religion is not merely one influence among others; it is an influence dominating all others."—p. 110.

God has a place for every young man and young woman in His service. "The Lord has appointed the youth to be His helping hand."—Testimonies, vol. 7, p. 64.

"Youthful talent, well organized and and well trained, is needed in our churches."—Gospel Workers, p. 211.

Let us search the Scriptures daily and study carefully the writings of the Spirit of Prophecy. These writings are only to shed light on the Bible. The gift of God as revealed through His handmaiden, Sister White, has meant much to our church. It has been a guiding light to our fore-fathers, and it remains the same for us today. God's messages through His servant are for you and me. They are timely and appropriate in every stage of our journey through life until we reach Canaan's shore.

May God whom we serve help us to be more grateful for His precious gift to us in giving Jesus to save us from sin, and may we be more appreciative of His Word and the gift of the Spirit of Prophecy as revealed in the remnant church "which keep the commandments of God and have the testimony of Jesus Christ."

Challenge To Youth In Lebanon

In a special MV rally held in the Museithe Church, Beirut, on February 12, Elder R. H. Hartwell urged all Adventist youth in Lebanon to "Win One In '61." He presented sixty ways of achieving this aim and challenged the group to find the sixty-first.

The purpose of the rally which was conducted under the leadership of Pastor Manoug Nazirian, the MV Secretary for the Lebanon Section, was to study ways and means of putting into effect the MV plans for the new year.

Among those who contributed to the success of the rally were Pastor A. A. Haddad, MV leader of the Middle East Division, who spoke about the marks of a true MV society; Elder E. L. Gammon, president of Middle East College, who emphasized to the teachers present the importance of teaching the heart as well as the head and the hand; Elder R. C. Darnell, Radio and Publishing Department Secretary of the Middle East Division, who spoke about wholesome recreation for Adventist young people; Elder S. Noujaim, president of the Lebanon Section, who pointed out the importance of providing the needs of young people along various lines. A very interesting feature was a panel discussion on various phases of MV work.

At the close of the rally there was a wholehearted response to the call to consecration and devotion to the work for interests of young people in 1961. Pastor Mousa Azar offered the dedication prayer.

Baghdad Church Dedication And Opening

A delightful dedicatory service was held in the newly erected Baghdad church on February 18 at the eleven o'clock hour. The division president, Pastor R. A. Wilcox preached the dedicatory sermon; Pastor Shukri Nowfel, veteran worker from Lebanon, led in the "Act of Dedication;" and the division secretary, R. H. Hartwell, offered the dedication prayer. Pastor Anees Haddad, division MV and temperance secretary, translated for the service. Miss Mary Haddad, registrar of Middle East College, played the Hammond organ. The choir, directed by Brother Yacoub Nashed, sang beautifully. Pastor G. A. Keough, division educational and public relations secretary, and Pastor A. G. Zytkoskee, president of the Nile Union, also assisted with the service, as well as Pastor V. A. Fenn, division treasurer. Pastor Behnam Arshat, pastor of the Baghdad church and president of the Iraq field, was the chairman of the service.

The Baghdad church represents the

combined skill and workmanship of the ministerial workers and laymen in Baghdad. It is a real credit to the denomination in its artistic appointments. These must be seen to be fully appreciated. It has attractive platform arrangements and a fine baptistry. The mothers' room will seat some twenty five persons and the balcony seventy five more. The well made and very comfortable pews will provide for at least two hundred individuals in the main auditorium and by economy of space provision could be made for at least one hundred more. The wall-towall floor carpeting adds much to the atmosphere of reverent worship. Very attractive are the electric chandeliers and wall lights. The stained glass windows are quite ornamental and have plenty of eye appeal. The church model Hammond electric organ, which was flown from Chicago and arrived in time for the dedication adds much to the elegance of the worship atmosphere Above the church is a steeple and

"God has made the proclamation of the gospel dependent upon the labors and gifts of His people. Voluntary offerings and the tithe constitute the revenue of the Lord's work. Of the means entrusted to man, God claims a certain portion,-the tenth. He leaves all free to say whether or not they will give more than this. But when the heart is stirred by the influence of the Holy Spirit, and a vow is made to give a certain amount, the one who vows has no longer any right to the consecrated portion. Promises of this kind made to men would be looked upon as binding; are those not more binding that are made to God?-Acts of the Apostles, p. 74.
