# College Students Lead Prayer Week

phasized the need of the "New Birth". The many texts that were used in opening up this truth were the more impressive as a "voice" (that of Samia Abu Ali) spoke the words of the Holy Scriptures over loud speakers at the appropriate times. Bakhit Abdul Malek sounded a cheerful note when he said that anyone can be perfectly just in the sight of God—as though he had never sinned—if he chooses to. "Justification" can and will take place for anyone who decides to faithfully follow in "the Christian's daily walk".

Samman Faltas, reviewing the past steps already pointed out in the preceding meetings carried us forward to "Sanctification", graphically depicting for us on the chapel backdrop the steps constituting "Peter's ladder" of 2 Pet. 1:5-7. The necessity of "Obedience" was emphasized on Thursday evening by Hanna Gad Makar. Jesus was upheld as our great Exemplar, who Himself "learned... obedience by the things which he suffered; and being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him" (Heb. 5:8, 9).

## Middle East Division Ministerial Association

The young people did it again! Yes, Sir, if you want something done in a hurry, call on the young people and they'll do it. Let me explain.

Last fall the Middle East Division committee voted to translate into Arabic and print 1,000 sets of the "Friendship Series" Bible study cards. There are 25 lessons in each set. Each lesson contains from 8 to 12 questions printed on separate cards with the Bible references that answer the questions. Also there is a pink card for the instructor with all the questions for the lesson printed on the one card. These Bible studies are designed to provide a convenient means whereby laymen can give an organized Bible study with a minimum amount of preparation.

In order to reduce the cost of these lessons, we invited the young people of Middle East College, the juniors, the children in the Mouseitbeh School, the workers in the Beirut Cultural Center and a few others to donate their spare time to assemble the 300,000 cards and place them in small envelopes and then in the boxes.

For several weeks the students of Middle East College spent their Sabbath afternoons in the library assembling the lessons. I wish you could have seen their happy smiles and heard their joyful songs as with nimble fingers they filled the 25,000 envelopes with Bible studies. The estimated value of donated labor amounted to over LL. 1,000.00. Also, the division subsidized the printiing of these lessons so they can be sold to the church members for only one Lebanese Lira per set.

Sabbath morning, February 10, the completed white boxes containing the lessons entitled "Lightbearer Cards" were stacked on the platform of the College Park church. Elder W. E. Murray from the General Conference offered a dedicatory prayer asking God's blessing to be with the Bible studies as they were sent out to the field for the start of a great lay movement.

As we thank those who worked so faithfully and cheerfully to prepare the lessons, we also pray that the Holy Spirit will guide the laymen as they use this new instrument for spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ in the Middle East.

## MIDDLE EAST DIVISION

In the early days of this division, which was organized January 1, 1951, Pastor and Mrs. A. A. Esteb visited this field and the home missionary department activities were promoted. Then in the fall of 1953 Pastor C. E. Guenther itinerated throughout the division for the same purpose. Again in 1957 Pastor J. E. Edwards spent five or six weeks itinerating in the Middle East. died to save us from eternal death. In return for the great love wherewith Christ has loved you, you are to bring to Him your thank offering. You are to make a gratitude offering of yourself, your time, your talents, your means—all are to flow to the world in a tide of love for the saving of the lost."—*Testimonies*, Vol. 9, p. 50

May I call your attention to statements found in Vol. 4, pp. 467 and 468 which read as follows:

"According to the amount bestowed will be the amount required. The larger the capital entrusted, the more valuable is the gift which God requires to be returned to Him. If a Christian has ten or twenty thousand dollars, God's claims are imperative upon him, not only to give his proportion according to the tithing system, but to present his sin offerings and thank offerings to God. The Levitical dispensation was distinguished in a remarkable manner by the sanctification of property. When we speak of the tithe as the standard of the Jewish contributions to religious purposes, we do not speak understandingly. The Lord kept His claims paramount, and in almost every article they were reminded of the Giver by being required to make returns to Him. They were required to pay a ransom for their firstborn son, for the first fruits of their flocks, and for the first gathering of the harvest. They were required to leave the corners of their harvest fields for the destitute. Whatever dropped from their hands in reaping was left for the poor, and once in every seven years their lands were allowed to produce spontaneously for the needy. Then there were the sacrificial

offerings, the trespass offerings, the sin offerings, and the remission of all debts every seventh year. There were also numerous expenses for hospitalities and gifts to the poor, and there were assessments upon their property.

"At stated periods, in order to preserve the integrity of the law, the people were interviewed as to whether they had faithfully performed their vows or not. A conscientious few made returns to God of about one third of all their income for the benefit of religious interests and for the poor. These exactions were not from a particular class of the people, but from all, the requirement being proportioned according to the amount possessed. Besides all these systematic and regular donations there were special objects calling for freewill offerings, such as the tabernacle built in the wilderness and the temple erected at Jerusalem. These drafts were made by God upon the people for their own good, as well as to sustain His service.

"There must be an awakening among us as a people upon this matter. There are but few men who feel consciencestriken if they neglect their duty in beneficence. But few feel remorse of soul because they are daily robbing God."

As we review the foregoing statements it is very evident that most of us have not given our thank offerings as freely as we should have in the past. May we be impressed with the important lessons which God has left on record for us, and may we give liberally of our thank offerings in order that we may receive the continued blessings of heaven. Remember that the funds thus given, when the regular Sabbath School Birthday and Thank Offerings are taken in your Sabbath Schools from time to time are in addition to our regular Sabbath School contributions. They are a gift of thanksgiving for the goodness of God.
