CANVASSING IN SOUTH WALES.

Down here in the southwest corner of Wales we have had a very happy time during the past season's work with "Great Controversy." I think I never enjoyed canvassing quite so much before, and the gladness of heart and peace and rest which come through working with and for the Lord are better than language can describe.

I believe I never before so keenly felt the presence of the Lord in the work, and the possible result which may follow from yoking up with him; while the instances of His providential care sharpen our faith in His interest for our personal welfare. Though "I am poor and needy; yet the Lord thinketh upon me."

Experiences.

I had a good delivery coming off early in September; but two or three weeks before that time the money I had by me was running short, and was reduced to something like three and sevenpence with which to buy food, pay three and eightpence for notification, and seven and elevenpence for carriage on books coming. The thought of borrowing a little came, but something said, "Get it of the Lord ; " so I watched to see what He would do. Pretty soon a man paid me seven sh llings for a second-hand copy of "Great Controversy" I had A little later another man wanted been using. the last new copy I had. Others bought small books, which came to hand in the meantime, so that when the time for my delivery arrived I still had part of my three and sevenpence, left and all my bills paid as they came due. That lesson in faith did me a world of good.

The Street | Dreaded.

In the town where I have been working was a short business street which I dreaded to canvass; but one dull morning I went out trusting in the Lord to do it. At the first shop (a grocery) on the corner, I took an order from the owner for a sevenand-six "Great Controversy;" a little further along, a tailor gave me an order for a fifteen-shilling or e, and at the next door I received another. Across the street a chemist ordered a nine and six book; and in the evening I took another order of a young man I had seen at another place of business in the same street.

One day I worked hard, and could not do a pennyworth of business. The next day I took nine orders for "Great Controversy."

At a Big House and a Little One.

At the big house I showed my book to a very superior looking servant, who ordered one. After I had called at another house, this same person came after me, saying her fellow-servant was put out because she had not been called to see the book. When I went back, she also ordered one, and they thought the gardener would like one; when I saw him later, he spoke for a morocco binding, making thirty shillings' worth of books for the one house, and when they were delivered the subscribers almost danced with delight.

At the little house was an old lady and a young woman to whom I showed a copy of "His Glorious Appearing," which they bought. While I was talking with them, I discovered that the young lady was a spiritually-minded person. I started up the road and she ran after me wanting another copy of "His Glorious Appearing." After going up the road and getting an order for "Great Controversy" at a farm, I returned by this cottage, and in the meantime the young woman had learned I had a large book, and wanted to know what it was. As I talked about the truths it contained, and the spiritual nature of our work, and she saw the list of orders, she remarked, "You are doing a great work, sir," and ordered a large book.

How sweet those words sounded ! and to think that amid the moral darkness there is now and then one who can appreciate the nature of our work. Truly we are engaged in a great work, and may the Lord inspire our hearts with new faith and courage to press the battle till the final victory is won. G. W. BAILLEY.

THE office is for a time deprived of the faithful labours of Miss Jacques, who is now at the *Institut* Sanitaire, Bale, taking a long-needed rest and undergoing some necessary treatment. All the WORKER family, however widely scattered, will certainly be glad of the privilege of joining in spirit, in prayer that the treatment may have the desired effect, and that she may speedily be restored to health and to her place in the work.

PORTSMOUTH.

Our meetings in the tent terminated very abruptly, owing to pressure being brought to bear upon the agents by a Baptist Minister, to get us off the ground. On reaching the tent one Friday evening, we were told that that must be the last meeting we could hold. As we had no opportunity then of making arrangements for the Sunday meetings, we held our afternoon meeting, on the Sunday following, ontside the tent, and a large crowd assembled who were in full sympathy with us, because of this religious persecution. In the evening, we went into the small Victoria Hall, and at this short notice (only being able to announce it at our afternoon open-air meeting) we had the hall packed, over 200 being present. Our tent was left standing as a witness against those who had turned ns out.

On Sunday morning I called on the Baptist minister, and saw him in his vestry, after the cervice. He had one of the deacons present as a witness, but I told him I had come in the Spirit of the Master, to ask him the reason why he had objected to our tent meetings. He told me he thought that we should have gone to him and his deacons before putting the tent up, and sought their co-operation. I told him that I had a ccmmission from the Master to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, and needed not to ask the permission of the Portsmouth Free Church Council, nor any man, to do the work the Lord had given me to do. We had a pleasant interview, and he relented considerably before I left; and we prayed together, he asking that God would especially bless our work in Portsmouth, and I asking the same for his work.

The sound of this matter has gone forth, and the result is that several members of the chapel have sent in their resignation, and are attaching themselves to our work in a closer manner than ever before; and last Sunday night, when we commenced in the large Victoria Hall, we had about 400 present. This has done-more for the work than anything we could have done. The people are helping us by their means. On Sunday our collections amounted to £2 15s., and last week our collections and donations amounted to £6. We can see the good hand of the Lord in working for us in such a marvellous manner; for that which appeared to be a disaster has turned out to be a furtherance of the Gospel.
