THE CAMP-MEETING.

(Continued.)

Preparation of Heart.

AT these gatherings we must ever remember that two forces are at work. A battle unseen by human eyes is being waged. The army of the Lord is on the ground, seeking to save souls. Satan and his host are also at work, trying in every possible way to deceive and destroy. The Lord bids us, "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." Eph. vi. 11, 12. Day by day the battle goes on. If our eyes could be opened to see the good and evil agencies at work, there would be no trifling, no vanity, no jesting or joking. If all would put on the whole armour of God, and fight manfully the battles of the Lord, victories would be gained that would cause the kingdom of darkness to tremble.

Personal Responsibility.

None of us should go to the camp-meeting depending on the ministers or the Bible-workers to make the meeting a blessing to us. God does not want His people to hang their weight on the minister. He does not want them to be weakened by depending on human beings for help. They are not to lean, like helpless children, upon someone else as a prop. As a steward of the grace of God, every church-member should feel personal responsibility to have life and root in himself. Each one should feel that in a measure the success of the meeting depends upon him. Do not say, "I am not responsible. I shall have nothing to do in this meeting." If you feel thus, you are giving Satan opportunity to work through you. He will crowd your mind with his thoughts, giving you something to do in his lines. Instead of gathering with Christ, you will scatter abroad.

The Holy Spirit.

The success of the meeting depends on the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. For the outpouring of the Spirit every lover of the cause of truth should pray. And as far as lies in our power, we are to remove every hindrance to His working. The Spirit can never be poured out while variance and bitterness toward one another are cherished by the members of the church. Envy, jealousy, evil-surmising, and evil-speaking are of Satan, and they effectually bar the way against the Holy Spirit's working. Nothing else in this world is so dear to God as His church. Nothing is guarded by Him with such jealous care. Nothing so offends God as an act that injures the influence of those who are doing His service. He will call to account all who aid Satan in his work of criticising and discouraging.

Brotherly Love.

Those who are destitute of sympathy, tenderness, and love, cannot do Christ's work. Before the prophecy can be fulfilled, the weak shall be "as David," and the house of David "as the angel of the Lord" (Zech. xii. 8), the children of God must put away every thought of suspicion in regard to their brethren. Heart must beat in unison with heart. Christian benevolence and brotherly love must be far more abundantly shown. The words are ringing in my ears, "Draw together, draw together." The solemn, sacred truth for this time is to unify the people of God. The desire for pre-eminence must die. One subject of emulation must swallow up all others,—Who will most nearly resemble Christ in character? Who will most entirely hide self in Jesus?

Receive and Give.

"Herein is My Father glorified," Christ says, "that ye bear much fruit." John xv. 8. If there was ever a place where the believers should bear much fruit, it is at our camp-meetings. At these meetings our acts, our words, our spirit, is marked, and our influence is as far-reaching as eternity.

When the grace of God reigns within, the soul will be surrounded with an atmosphere of faith and

courage and Christ-like love, an atmosphere invigorating to the spiritual life of all who inhale it. Then we can go to the camp-meeting, not merely to receive, but to impart. Every one who is a partaker of Christ's pardoning love, every one who has been enlightened by the Spirit of God and converted to the truth, will feel that for these precious blessings he owes a debt to every soul with whom he comes in contact. Those who are humble in heart the Lord will use to reach souls whom the ordained ministers cannot approach. They will be moved to speak words which reveal the saving grace of Christ.

And in blessing others, they will themselves be blessed. God gives us opportunity to impart grace, that He may refill us with increased grace. Hope and faith will strengthen as the agent for God works with the talents and facilities that God has provided. He will have a divine agency to work with Him.

BRISTOL AND BATH.

AFTER my visit to Cardiff I went to Bristol where I stayed two days. We had two meetings and celebrated the ordinances with much blessing. I was much pleased to find the numbers of believers increased by the addition of another family who has lately begun the observance of the Sabbath.

At Bath I remained over two Sabbaths, having meetings every evening and visiting a large number of our friends at their homes. The attendance was not large at any time but the blessing of the Lord was with us.

Sabbath, May 2nd, was a precious day. Brethren Evan Perry and Edward Clifford were unanimously re-elected elders of the church. In the afternoon we celebrated the ordinances. On Sunday evening we held the quarterly business meeting of the church, which was well attended. The church treasurer and others rendered faithful reports of the receipts and disbursements in a very intelligent manner. At this time the church elected its treasurer, clerk, and librarian for the coming year, and also an agent to take charge of the *Present Truth* and *Good Health* work. I am impressed with the thought that in many of our churches there is not enough attention given to what might be called the business matters of the church. Everything that pertains to the Lord's work is of sacred importance. Some are indifferent in the matter of rendering a faithful tithe to the Lord, and the withholding of the tithe, instead of proving advantageous, only results in the loss of many blessings, and also leads to indifference in the Lord's work generally. The Sabbath-school offerings, which have been devoted to missionary work, are largely used for local and home expenses.

A curse and not a blessing is pronounced on doing the work of the Lord negligently. See Jer. xlviii. 10.

There is also a lack of care shown in many instances in regard to the Church Membership. When a shepherd is given the care of a flock of sheep, he is held responsible for every one. He is expected to know where they are and how they fare. Gen. xxxi. 38-40. Of how much greater importance are the souls of men who are the purchase of the blood of the Son of God! To us the charge is given to "feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof," for this is "God's heritage." The Chief Shepherd will call all the under shepherds to account for every sheep and lamb that He has entrusted to our care.

This should lead us to exercise the greatest care for every individual member of the church. I trust this matter may receive more careful attention, for it will add to the prosperity of the work in every place. Distant members who cannot meet regularly with the church should write to the church at least once each quarter; and the church, through its clerk, should keep up a kind and helpful correspondence with these absent members. This is one branch of missionary work that will bring good results.

THE SOUTH ENGLAND GENERAL MEETING AT "SUNNY SOUTHSEA."

THE time is now very near when our General Meeting for the South England Conference will be held. We have chosen one of the prettiest of the South Coast watering places, and we should therefore see the largest attendance from our South England churches that we have ever seen.

Southsea has a southerly aspect. It is within half an hour's steam-boat ride to the Isle of Wight. Frequent boat excursions run also to Bournemouth, Brighton, and other noted sea-side places. It is called "Sunny Southsea" because of the large amount of sunshine that we get here all the year round.

How to Reach the Hall.

The meetings will commence Friday, May 29th, at the Albert Hall, Commercial Road. Those who come by train either by the L. & S. W. Ry. or the L. B. & S. C. Ry. should book to Portsmouth Town Station. Albert Hall is within five minutes' walk of the station which is in Commercial Road. On coming out of the station, turn to the left, and keep straight on till you come to the hall. Those who come by boat can get off at Clarence Pier which is eight minutes' walk from the hall. Electric trams pass the hall from all parts of the town.

Albert Hall, where we are now holding our meetings, is a large building, containing two halls. The

large hall has a splendid gallery running round. It seats 1400 people, and the small hall 350 to 400. We have taken both halls for the ten days of the Conference. The upper or large hall will be used for all the Conference meetings and the lower hall will be utilised for other purposes.

A Good Rally.

Now, brethren and sisters, let there be a good rally from all parts of the field to this important meeting, and let all come with hearts fully set on seeking God that we may receive the fulfilment of the promise of Isaiah xxviii. 5, 6 R V. "In that day shall the Lord of Hosts be for a crown of glory, and for a diadem of beauty, unto the residue of His people; and for a spirit of judgment to him that sitteth in judgment and for strength to them that turn back the battle at the gate."

"AFTER MANY DAYS."

ABOUT four years ago I was privileged to work in the small seaport town of Blyth, Northumberland. I was in doubt which book to offer the people, "Patriarchs and Prophets" or "Great Controversy." The Lord made it clear to me it was to be the latter book. We often wondered what results might follow the canvassing of that place with this most important book. We heard nothing however until lately, when Brother Gillatt informed us a young man had embraced the truth there, and has been keeping the Sabbath for about two years as a result of reading a copy of "Great Controversy."

We went to see the young fellow and found that he had suffered very much at the hands of his father and stepmother, as a result of his acceptance of the truth, and had been even beaten and kicked about by his father (who is a deacon in one of the Presbyterian churches in the town) for not obeying his orders by working on the Sabbath. We found him suffering from serious physical drawbacks, being stone deaf and having defective eyesight; he had also suffered from lupus and catarrh of the head. Our communications had to be carried on by means of writing.

We found him staunch in the truth, thoughtful and conscientious, and anxious to do something for his fellow-townsmen, having a true and sincere burden for souls. He has been threatened with expulsion from his father's house, but a married sister has shown him great kindness, and he is at liberty to go there when he likes. How such an one could engage in the canvassing work seemed a mystery, but events since have proved that the Lord could use even such an one with all his disadvantages. We sent him the other week at his request twenty *Present Truth* to sell in the town. He waited specially upon the Lord before going out, and in about one and one-half hours on the Saturday night sold them all. He took with him as a canvass, which he handed to the people, the following, written on a card:—

"FRIEND:—

I am an agent for this paper the *Present Truth*, a good weekly evangelistic family paper containing articles on health, studies in Bible subjects and interesting pages for the children, etc. Thinking it would interest you, I have ventured to call on you with it. The price is 1d. GEO. GOLDBER."

Following up this successful campaign with the paper he soon after ordered 100 more, and on the Thursday following sold seventy-nine more.

With the above facts before us what reason can anyone urge for not being able to canvass? This dear boy, who is not very clear in utterance, and of course being stone deaf cannot carry on any ordi-

nary conversation, is yet so desirous of doing something for Jesus that he is burning with the desire that the truth he values so highly should be offered to his fellow-townsmen. His case is one of the most pathetically interesting it has ever been our lot to hear of, and we feel sure the Lord will use him to be of signal service in the cause of present truth.

I trust all the brethren and sisters in this field will join their prayers with ours that he may be sustained and used by the loving Heavenly Father in bringing many sons unto glory. Much more could be said of this extremely interesting case, which has been a cause of rejoicing to us and all who have heard of it, but space will not permit.
