The Week of Prayer.

IF there ever was an occasion when there was a special need for the blessing of the Lord, it is now. We are living on the very verge of eternity.

As we look about us, from every phase of the world's situation, the evidences of the Lord's soon coming, are so decidedly plain that we cannot mistake their meaning.

The world is enveloped in darkness, but the commandment to the church at this time is, "Arise and shine, for thy light is come." Will the church appreciate its privilege? Will she be thoroughly awakened and aroused? And will each individual brother and sister take the matter to heart in earnest?

The Laodicean message belongs to this time, and should come home with full force to every believer. Is there not a danger of our being in that lukewarm state, feeling burselves to be rich, and increased with goods, having need of nothing, and not able to see that we are poor, and miserable, and blind and naked? We are altogether too easily satisfied. We settle down, contented with a form of religion. As we look to the world about us, we see much that professes to be Christianity, much of the form of religion, but where is the power? We are in danger of being affected by the same spirit, but God save us for His name's sake.

There is a great work to be done, but the church is hindered in its work by sin. Let diligent and earnest heart-searching go on; let sin be put away; let every wrong that has been cherished be eradicated; let there be a complete yielding of self and selfish interests to the Lord,

and let the liberality of your gift for the forwarding of the work in the earth be the evidence of your complete consecration to the Lord. If all take hold as with one heart, and seek the Lord with that earnestness that the solemnity of the situation calls for, a rich outpouring of the Spirit of God will fit us all for greater usefulness in His cause.

In your heart searching look over the past. Where have you neglected duty? Where have you been careless? Where have you partaken of the spirit of worldliness? Where have you robbed God in tithes and offerings? Where have you been negligent with reference to the keeping of the Sabbath, or careless and indifferent in your life? Where have you neglected secret prayer and the study of the Word of the Lord? The promise is, "Ye shall seek Me and find Me, if ye search for Me with all your heart, and I will be found of you, saith the Lord, and I will turn away your captivity."

We are so desirous that the year upon which we are just entering may be one of rapid advancement in the work of the Lord all along the line, and this will be so if we give ourselves wholly and unreservedly to the Lord and to His work. Let no one hold back, but let each one consecrate himself anew to the work, accepting with faith and confidence the promise, "Ask, and ye shall receive, seek, and ye shall find." The Lord is more willing to give His Spirit to those that ask Him, than parents are to give good gifts to their children. Again :—

"Thus saith the Lord that made thee, and formed thee from the womb, which will help thee; Fear not, O Jacob, My servant; and thou, Jesurun, whom I have chosen: For I will pour water upon him that is thirsty, and floods upon the dry ground. . . . One shall say, I am the Lord's, and another shall call himself by the name of Jacob; and another shall subscribe with his hand unto the Lord, and surname himself by the name of Israel. Thus saith the Lord, the King of Israel, and His Redeemer, the Lord of hosts; I am the first and I am the last; and beside Me there is no God. . . . Fear ye not, neither be afraid; have not I told thee from that time, and have declared it? Ye are even My witnesses. Is there a God beside Me? Yea, there is no God. I know not any." Isa. xliv. 2-8. If any would feel it a privilege to make this season a time of fasting and special prayer let everyone feel free to do so. We leave it with each individual and each company to act as the Spirit of God may direct. May the special blessing of the Lord be with you, and precious victories will be gained, both for yourselves individually, and to the work as a whole.

Our Training College.

OUR half year closed December 23rd, and many of our students who live away from London have gone home for a ten days' holiday. We are cheered by the spirit of consecration and sacrifice shown by the students, and are encouraged by the determined efforts which they have put forth to prepare themselves for thorough and acceptable work in the great field.

Someone has written to me, asking if the money which we are now using for the running expenses of the College is from the sale of "Christ's Object Lessons," or donations which have been made for the establishment of a permanent school in Great Britain. I am glad to say that not one penny of this money has been used, but is being kept for the purchase of a permanent institution. We hope the day is not far distant when enough will have been received.
