A Wonderful Record

In the year recently closed, so filled with unusual events, with the normal activities so changed, there has been demonstrated the unchanging interest our believers have in the cause of God. With increased earning power, funds have flowed into the Lord's treasury at a faster pace. We know our readers will be happy to have the detailed information appearing herewith.

The earnings of the constituency in 1942 were nearly twelve million dollars, more than four million dollars greater than in 1941. This is gleaned from the tithe record, which shows total payments in 1942 of \$1,182,856.66, which sum is \$402,554.62 greater than the tithe for 1941. The statement of tithe per member for each conference may be studied in connection with this announcement.

Last month we submitted a report of Sabbath school offerings for the first three quarters of 1942. Let us, by repeating those figures and adding the report for the final quarter of the year, present the picture for the year:

For "Stay-at-Home" Members and All Others

The final reports for 1942 indicate an increase of \$21,631.86 in Ingathering receipts. The year's total was \$121,-017.79. Every mission fund is higher than for the previous year. The total of all funds amounts to \$426,728.28, which was \$102,819.62 more than for 1941.

While rejoicing over such a record of contributions in 1942 for God's great cause, we are determined to do our best while we have the present favorable opportunity to greatly expand the work we love by accomplishing a still greater task in 1943.

usual, but very abnormal costs in many lands are requiring larger appropriations from the General Conference treasury. A dollar now will not accomplish as much as it did a year or two ago. Whether or not a Sabbath school teacher can hold an offering envelope before you each week, your dollar (or smaller coin) now is fully as essential as it was when you could travel as far as necessary to attend Sabbath school and church, and could place your weekly offering in the Sabbath school class envelope.

"Well," some may ask, "if our usual offerings are not now sufficient to cover the mounting cost of operating the

general mission program, how much should we give at this unusual time?" A new plan being introduced throughout our Union Conference, and operating in at least one other Union, is the suggestion that we make our Sabbath school offerings three per cent of our income. Such a plan is more in keeping with individual ability than the urging of twenty-five cents, fifty cents, a dollar, or some other fixed amount each week by each member. If adopted by all, our Sabbath school offerings would be substantially larger, for at present these offerings are much below three per cent of the income of our constituency as indicated by the tithe. We commend the plan to salaried people and wage earners especially.

But whether we contribute on this basis or not, we urge every believer to systematically support the mission program from week to week. It is unthinkable that we would permit a little interference, like rationing of gas to reduce the stream of support for missions. Yet some will not be able to attend Sabbath school as usual; most of us will be paying heavier taxes than ever before; and other obstacles will confront us, so that unless special planning is done, offerings will fall off right at the time when they should be H. the letter is so well worded we feel you will appreciate all of it: "How should a Christian woman dress: Just what should she do on the Sabbath? I need your prayers that I may know how to come out of the church of which I am a member. I do not keep the right Sabbath. I try but I cannot remain in the church of which I am a member and do the right thing.

"I have given up smoking since I began this course. But there are many other things I have not been able to overcome yet: I am having grace at the table, which I did not do before taking these lessons. They have helped me wonderfully. Please pray for me that I may be able to answer all the meditation questions honestly."

Here is another stirring letter from Colorado: "I have firmly resolved to keep the Sabbath day for my Sabbath even though my church observes the first day. I am so happy that this truth has been brought so forcefully to me and I thank my God each day. My prayer is that more people will realize the truth about the Sabbath."

From Massachusetts comes this unusual experience: "After the death of my husband eight years ago, I began to study the Bible. I soon discovered that the seventh day was the Sabbath, and the only day that God commanded should be kept holy, so I shifted to the seventh day, although I knew nothing of Seventh-day Adventists at that time. I also discovered the need of tithing, and have tried to be faithful in this also.

"Later it was my privilege to meet some real Seventh-day Adventists, and they are the highest and finest type of Christian I have ever met. I am the only person in my community who keeps the Sabbath, although I have tried to interest others. It is impossible to have Adventist church contacts, which I deeply regret. I attend the Baptist church and am active in its work. "I am chairman of the Christian Friendliness Club, and am busy trying to help people who need friends."

The Holy Spirit is calling to the sincere in every part of the far-flung field. From Florida: "Although there is no Seventh-day Adventist church within thirty miles, I am keeping the Sabbath, and studying all the literature I can get. I also study my Bible and lessons, and I listen to the Voice of Prophecy. I do wish I could have the fellowship of the church though. I had never known anything about the Seventh-day Adventists till last August."

"After studying this Bible lesson concerning Sabbathkeeping, it seems there is something wrong with me. In fact, the matter of Sabbathkeeping has been bothering me for a long time. I do want, by God's help, to keep His commandments and be faithful till He comes."

Calendar Reform

A decade has passed since George Eastman of kodak fame and of world calendar reform endeavor ended his long career by his own hand. While Mr. Eastman's plan of calendar reform was defeated before the League of Nations Council in Geneva nearly a dozen years ago and while Mr. Eastman rests from his labors, rest assured that the calendar reform issue is not dead. While our nation and the world is agitated by war, there are still those who are methodically pursuing a course to bring this issue again before the nations.

Miss Achelis, millionaire, whose name is on the New York social register, has been devoting her life and energy to her pet scheme of calendar reform for well over a decade. Her calendar is not the thirteen month type which was advocated by Mr. Eastman, but a calendar of twelve months of four equal quarters. The first month of each quarter contains 31 days, the following two months, 30 days, with an extra day known as year-end day following December 30 of each year, and an intercalary day following June 30 on leap year. Miss Achelis is spending over \$35,000 a year in promotion of this calendar scheme and has already spent over one-half million dollars. According to Howard Whitman in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post, she desires her first world calendar to begin with 1945. The following quotation from his article is of interest:

'In her arduous crusade she has obtained approval of the World Calendar by fourteen nations: Afghanistan. Brazil, Chile, China, Estonia, Greece, Hungary, Mexico, Norway, Panama, Peru, Spain, Turkey, and Uruguay. The United Press conducted a poll on calendar revision in 1934 and obtained favorable responses from big businessmen in the ratio of 37 to 3. A California professor polled the National Academy of Sciences and got a 76 per cent response in favor of the World Calendar. Resolutions advocating it have been passed by the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Mathematical Association of America, the American Academy of and Sciences, Arts the American Philosophical Society and the American Scientific Congress."

The vast majority of our people have not forgotten the vital part played by our Religious Liberty Department and

the influence of the Liberty Magazine in the calendar reform issue when it was before the League of Nations. This proposed calendar would again upset the weekly cycle as far as the Sabbath is concerned and bring great hardship to the people of God. We know of no instrument that will do more in presenting the underlying principles of religious liberty and in sounding a warning against anything which would interfere with the freedom of man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience than our denominational journal, the Liberty Magazine.

Think it over, and when the offering is taken January 30, plan to make a liberal offering. We have suggested in a letter to our elders and workers that many would doubtless be willing to give their income for an entire day to help maintain the principles of liberty. Surely every family should give at least \$1.00. C. A. SCRIVEN.

Finances in the Washington Conference

We have been blessed of the Lord in the Washington Conference during 1942 in a financial way. Over \$270,000 in tithe has been paid by our faithful people. These funds have enabled us to carry on an aggressive work, and the percentage sent on to the General Conference has been a real encouragement in facing the unprecedented needs of the world field. The liberality of our people in their mission offerings has also been indicated by a marked increase in Sabbath school and mission funds. If conditions continue as they are at the present time, we believe that the faithfulness of our people during the year 1942 is only an indication of continued advancement during the present year.

Our Book and Bible House sales indicate the interest of our people in our gospel literature and also in their neighbors and friends to whom they are sending our periodicals and distributing literature. As compared with two years ago, our sales are approximately double. Over \$47,000 worth of literature has been sent out from our Book and Bible House during 1942. The sales for the month of December alone were over \$9,000. Our faithful group of colporteurs have contributed materially toward the results, having delivered 20.000 worth of our truthfilled books in the Washington Conference during the twelve months. Elder Lindquist and his group of faithful colporteurs are trusting that with the Lord's blessing, this may be approxi-

mately doubled during the present year. Surely there are others among our 4800 members who should give their full time to the sale of gospel literature.

While referring to some of the financial aspects of our conference, it might not be out of place to mention the work of Auburn Academy. During the past two-year period at the Academy we have paid off a debt of \$20,000, improved the dining room, kitchen, and bakery to the extent of \$8,000, have installed a new 100 horse power boiler, have provided two added homes for teachers and students, are completing a \$10,000 water system, have expended over \$70,000 on the new shop, equipment, and inventory, making a total expenditure of approximately \$125,000. We have received from the insurance company due to the burning of the old shop, from the Union and General Conference, approximately \$44,000. leaving over \$80,000 to have been provided by the Academy and the Washington Conference. We are happy to tell our people that this \$80,000 has been provided for without any general campaign among our people and that at the present time there is no debt resting upon Auburn Academy. These funds have been provided from sources other than the tithe. There are still major improvements to be made at our Academy. In these days of prosperity any of our people who may still have obligations dated from the years of depression can help us materially by caring for these obligations at the present time. The faithful cooperation of the student body in their various campaigns has also materially helped in improving our plant.

We know that the entire constituency of the Washington Conference is interested in what Professor Olson and the consecrated faculty are attempting to do for our young people. Let us continue to work together to make this one of the best academies in our entire denominational educational system.

We shall have a report later to give relative to our evangelistic work, but the returns are not all in from our church clerks. All that has been accomplished during the past year has been due to the loyal cooperation of workers, church officers and laity under the blessing of our Lord.

To add a note of interest to our program a health food demonstration was conducted in which a whole wheat honey cake was mixed and baked, and a health talk given by Mrs. Hallsted, bringing out the advantages of using honey instead of sugar and the harm of using chemical agents for rising such as baking soda, or baking powder. All Federation members left Arlington greatly strengthened for future activity and with a determination to live up to the name of Dorcas.

Miss Ethel Johnson, one of the teachers at the Walla Walla College Training School, attended our teachers' institute at Caldwell, and she passes on this word to our GLEANER friends.

"In a testimony entitled 'Children's Meetings and Church Schools,' Volume 6, page 109, Sister White says, "The establishing of churches and the erection of meeting houses and school houses was extended from city to city. In each place the believers were making a united persevering effort, and the Lord was working to increase His forces. Something was being done that would publish the truth.'

"The Lord has high standards for our church schools. He wants the school building itself to be publishing the truth to those passing by or living near it. We know that all phases of our work and all our institutions will

come up for review before the officials of our country. How important it is that each one 'publishes the truth' and rightly represents our message and God's standards for church schools.

"The believers in the Caldwell church have been doing things 'that publish the truth' and that show their belief in what a church school should be. Their building, while not as new as some, is not only adequately suited for a church school but it is both clean and in good repair. Located as it is on the outskirts of a small town there is ample room for a playground. Each school room had recently been equipped with ample cupboard space in which were many sets of new books that the school now rents to the children. for home after spending a few weeks visiting their son, Brother Alten Bringle, and other relatives in the Northwest.

We regret that a number of our people suffered loss because of the recent flood in the Willamette Valley.

Elder and Mrs. Paul Bartholomew and children left Portland a few days ago en route to Alaska. They plan to locate at Anchorage. They received the Government permission from authorities to make the trip but because of the heavy traffic in men and materials to Alaska they were not certain when they could secure passage from Seattle. Brother and Sister Bartholomew are greatly needed in Alaska. Their previous experience in China will be helpful as they take up their work in that territory.

During the year 1942 we were happy to send to the General Conference mission funds in the amount of \$179,-612.42 This is an average of over thirty-seven and one-half cents a week for each member in the conference. It is a gain over the mission gifts for 1941 of \$52,094.78. We gave almost 41 per cent more in 1942 than the previous year. It is interesting to notice that we lacked but \$11,789.18 of meeting the General Conference goal of forty cents a week per member. Had each member in our conference given an average of two and one-half cents a week more in the Sabbath school, our mission goal would have been fully met.

The Sabbath school offerings for the year totaled \$68,722.72, a gain of \$23,805.65 over the previous year. The Ingathering amounted to \$47,904.25, a gain of \$8,845.74 over the previous year.

We are glad that in these times of financial prosperity our people are responding so well to the calls of the mission field. Surely, now is the time when we should do all we can to assist in carrying the message.
