Forty Years Of Railroads And Ingathering

Around the year 1903 work was be- construction of the railroad amounted gun secretly to provide for a railroad to approximately \$45,000,000. During along the north bank of the Columbia this period of time a little over \$44,-River connecting Spokane, Washington, with Portland, Oregon. It seems from the Ingathering endeavors. Last that two years prior to this the first right of way had been obtained. One and one-quarter million dollars was of the great railroad builders of all time, James J. Hill, was the active organizer and promoter of this project.

The Northern Pacific and the Great Northern combined forces to build the road. They were vigorously opposed by the interested road on the south bank of the Columbia controlled by another great railroad official, Edward H. Harriman. On March 11, 1908, forty years ago, at Sheridan, Oregon, on the Columbia, chief engineer Miller drove the golden spike.

The original cost of this road was estimated at \$8,000,000, but the final expenses, according to the Oregonian, totaled nearly \$45,000,000.

This railroad built along the north bank of the Columbia River has meant much to the Pacific Northwest. It is interesting to note that in 1902 Jasper Wayne, a loyal Seventh-day Adventist in the State of Iowa, began his first work in soliciting funds from the public for our foreign mission In 1903 this plan was program. brought forcibly before some of our leaders including Mrs. E. G. White. Then in the year 1908, the outstanding year in the construction of the railway from Portland to Spokane, the Harvest Ingathering was launched by the denomination ordained to accomplish for this people what the railroad was destined to do for parts of the great Northwest.

During that first official year of Ingathering \$14,136.77 was collected. That year 140 missionaries were sent out to the mission fields. Our world membership totaled 97,579. We were publishing the message in 57 languages. Our work was being conducted in approximately 75 different countries.

Now we look back over a period of forty years and by way of comparison we have noted that the expenses of

500,000 has flowed into the treasury year in North America alone over two gathered in. The Home Missionary Department reports that for the world field during 1947 approximately three and one-quarter million dollars found its way into our world program from this source. Surely the Ingathering has been a great thoroughfare which


