"Prepare To Meet Thy God"

Sermon on opening night of Upper Columbia camp meeting

May | invite you to turn in your Bibles this evening to | Thessalonians the 4th chapter. We shall read verses 3, 4, and 7 of this chapter.

"For this is the will of God, even your sanctification, that ye should abstain from fornication: That every one of you should know how to possess his vessel in sanctification and honor; for God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness."

God would have us to be a Holy people in these last days, but naturally our hearts are deceitful above all things and desperately wicked. We are unholy and consequently a work of transformation must take place in all of our hearts and in our lives.

Looking down the stream of time through inspiration the prophet made this statement recorded in Amos the 4th chapter, verse 12.

"Therefore thus will I do unto thee, O Israel: and because I will do this unto thee, prepare to meet thy God, O Israel."

This is a last day message. We are living in the time when the second coming of Christ is imminent. The signs centering around His appearing are fast fulfilling and it behooves each one of us to make sure that our hearts are made ready for this great event, which is just before us.

No man has it within himself to accomplish the transformation from unholiness to holiness. God has pointed out to us, however, the way in which it may be accomplished and I would like for us to consider some of these instructions that God has given us.

In the 11th chapter of Job, verses 13 to 15, we read:

"If thou prepare thine heart, and stretch out thine hands toward him; If iniquity be in thine hand, put it far away, and let not wickedness dwell in thy tabernacles. For then shalt thou lift up thy face without spot; yea, thou shalt be steadfast, and shalt not fear."

Oh what a glorious day it will be for those, who have made this sort of a preparation. They will be among those, who by the grace of God, shall be enabled to look up and say, "Lo, this is our God, we have waited for Him and He will save us." Those who fail to make this preparation will be on the contrary among those who cry for the rocks and the mountains to fall upon them and hide them from the face of Him that sitteth upon the throne and from the wrath of the Lamb, so it is important for us to heed the counsels of God's word.

"If thou prepare thine heart and stretch out thine hands before Him; If iniquity be in thine hand, put it far away, and let not wickedness dwell in thy tabernacles." Can the Ethiopian change his skin or the leopard his spot? Then may ye who are accustomed to do evil do good. We cannot change the color of our skin, nor can we change the conditions of our hearts, but God will enable us to part company with iniquity so that we shall be prepared to stand without fear before Him. Oh, what a wonderful thing it is that God will help us in our need. In Psalms 10:17 He makes this promise through David.

"Lord, thou hast heard the desire of the humble: thou wilt prepare their heart, thou wilt cause thine ear to hear."

How grateful we should be that God will do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

God will prepare our hearts. The apostle Paul emphasized this fact in his letter to the church in Thessalonica.

"And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit, and soul, and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it." I Thessalonians 5:23,24.

What is it that he calls us to? "For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness." But God is not going to make us holy unless we invite Him to do so, unless we plead with Him to do so, unless we open the avenue of our hearts and make it possible for Him to do so. God has left on record for us a very definite message—a message for the remnant church. The last church, if you please, that is to be upon earth prior to the second coming of the Lord Jesus. I should like for us to read that message tonight.

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Three Generations Accept Truth From One Enrollment in Bible Course

Four years ago I enrolled in the 20th Century Bible Course a man who had been a former Sunday school superintendent of the Church of Christ (Cambellites). Since he traveled much, I was only able to have an odd contact with him to encourage him to finish his course. Then he came to me with a number of stock arguments with texts his preacher used in favor of Sunday-keeping, saying he had studied the subject very fully and he wanted to know the truth about the Sabbath. After I explained the answer to each objection, to his entire satisfaction, he then brought up a text which he felt he alone had found, and which was surely the Bible reason why we should keep the first day. It was Leviticus 23:7, "In the first day ye shall have an holy convocation; ye shall do no servile work therein." However, after due sympathy for his earnest search, and careful explanation that this was the First Day of that particular Jewish Feast, and not the first day of the week, he confessed that his search for Bible support for Sunday-keeping was in vain. To close our three-hour interview, I read to him Isaiah 56: 1-6, and 58: 13, 14, asking him, in view of what he had found, whether he would not thus take hold of the Sabbath of this new covenant and claim these promised blessings. He said, "I will keep the next Sabbath." He did. Then he spent almost his entire time earnestly enrolling all the business and other friends and relatives possible in the Bible Course, among whom was his prejudiced daughter

whom he persuaded to take and finish the course.

About 18 months after his baptism she requested that I baptize her into the Remnant Church, where she, too, soon became a leader. A few weeks ago this same man's grandson, who at first seemed indifferent to all religion, and hopeless, but who likewise studied the message, came and asked me to baptize him also into the Seventh-day Adventist church.

There will doubtless be many more in the truth soon, and in heaven, through this one enrollment that day in the Bible Correspondence Course, but here, there already are three generations within about three years. from three minutes with just one enrollment card!

What if I had failed to carry some enrollment cards with me? What if I had failed to take the trouble to explain the course to him and enroll him? May the Lord help us every day to see "in every soul one to whom must be given the call to His kingdom." -Desire of Ages, page 151. May we also prayerfully take advantage of this simple, but effective, Correspondence Course enrollment opportunity to help elect that soul!

At a recent conference committee meeting, a number of changes were made in the location of the various district leaders.
