

DISFIGURED FACE BUT NEW HEART!

Her name is Mrs. Hardjosentono. The story takes place in a small village on the island of Java, Indonesia. Until six years ago, she had never heard of the Bible, Jesus, apostles, cross, or salvation. Fear and superstition were her gods. The fact that she knew nothing about the love of Jesus Christ was the first tragedy. The second tragedy took place when her only earthly security, her husband, fell ill and died. She had been a widow only a week when one of the village men asked her to marry him. Her love for her husband made this offer repulsive. Marriage was unthinkable when her husband had been dead only a few weeks. However, to refuse this proposal would inevitably bring trouble.

The suitor became enraged and threatened her, but to no avail. Anger turned to revenge. His retaliation followed an ancient custom which strikes fear in the hearts of those who believe that evil spirits can cause bodily harm if the proper procedures are followed. He contacted a spirit (or witch) doctor,

and paid money to this agent of Satan to cast a spell over this poor, defenseless soul who could look to neither God nor man for help against this nefarious power.

Within hours after the ritual and incantations of the spirit medium were finished, a boil-like growth began in the victim's nose. Nothing she did could stop this monstrous evil. At this time, she was totally unaware of what was taking place. She appealed to her god—superstition! Finally, one Friday morning—to her a sacred day—she burnt incense to appease the wicked spirits. The moment she lit the incense, a horrible sensation like that of scalding water thrown in her face caused unutterable agony. Next, she felt three spear-like stabs in her nose. Rushing to the elders of the village, she pled with them to tell her what was wrong. The evidence they presented caused her to realize that a spell had been cast over her and that evil spirits were doing this work.

It is customary in a case like this to

search out another spirit doctor who possesses superior power over the one who is causing the damage. Money is paid to this doctor to counteract the horrible prescription of the enemy. This she did, but no doctor in the village seemed to have the power of the one hired by her spurned admirer. Nearly a year passed. Her face slowly disintegrated. Finally her nose completely collapsed and the area between her eyes turned into a sunken hollow. There was no infection, no drainage, and most amazing of all no pain whatever following the experience of lighting the incense.

As I looked at this woman and heard her story, I could not help realizing that physical disfigurement is strictly secondary to the greatest disfigurement of all—the disfigurement of the soul resulting from sin. Every human being in this world suffers from this inward deformity. There has lived on this planet only one soul who escaped this tragedy—Jesus Christ. His escape is our salvation. I saw what this salvation could do for a person. Here, standing before me was a woman, who at one time, suffered both tragedies of having not only her face but her heart scarred with sin, ignorance and unbe-

For the first time at Auburn a course in driving education is now being offered. It has met with a good response, for 21 students, both boys and girls, have been learning the skills and developing the proper attitudes toward driving. The course is offered each semester and the student is given one-half credit upon completing the requirements.

The automobile used for driving instruction has been donated by the Buick Center of Auburn.

In conclusion it may be of interest to note that in the State of Pennsylvania a study of 16-year-old drivers for the past nine years has shown that untrained drivers had about 50 per cent more accidents, arrests, and suspensions than those who took driver education courses. *Happy motoring!*

Several years ago the Police Department of the city of Houston, Texas prepared a document titled *How to Raise Your Children to be Juvenile Delinquents*. Twelve rules for delinquency were suggested. This document was placed in the hands of the parents of any child brought before the Police Court of that city as an offender.

The points touched by the police in this ironic attempt at education of parents of delinquents were touched upon positively in Sister White's book *Child Guidance*. Note how the parallel has been drawn with twelve rules given from the pen of Sister White.

— HOW TO RAISE YOUR CHILDREN —

TO BE JUVENILE DELINQUENTS

By the Police Dept. of Houston, Texas

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up believing the world owes him a living.
2. When he picks up "bad" or "dirty" words, laugh at him. That will make him think he is "cute." He will run off and pick up some words that will blow the top off your head.

3. Never give him any spiritual training until he is 21, and then let him decide for himself. By the same logic, never teach him the English language, maybe when he is old enough he will want to speak Bantu.
4. Praise him in the presence of all the neighbors; show how much smarter he is than all the neighbors' children.

5. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop in the child the "guilt complex." This will prepare him to believe that when he is punished later on for stealing cars that society is "against him" and that he is being "persecuted."

6. Pick up everything after him; his shoes, his socks, his clothes. Do everything for him, so that he will be experienced in throwing burdens on others.

7. Let him read anything he wants. Have no concern whatever for what goes into his mind. Provide him with Lilly cups for his lips but let his brain drink out of a dirty container for words and ideas.

8. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will be prepared for broken homes later on.

9. Give him all the spending money he wants; never let him earn his own.

10. Satisfy every craving of the child for food, drinks, and everything that has to do with the sense of taste and touch, gratify his every sensual desire.

11. Take his part against policemen and neighbors. They are all prejudiced against your child.

12. When he gets into real trouble, always defend YOURSELF and say, "I never could do anything with him."
