Bible Emphasis Year

Of all people in the world, Seventh-day Adventists should be most active and earnest in the study of the Scriptures. This is so primarily because of our love for God and, therefore, our desire to become better acquainted with Him through His Word. Secondly, because we live in a world filled with doubt and uncertainty; and of all people we need a firm faith if we are to overcome the evils of our generation and be able to stand in the time of trouble. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."

Our Saviour pleads with us to "search the Scriptures." Paul's appeal is to "study to shew thyself approved unto God . . . rightly dividing the word of truth." This we need to do as we face the well-nigh overmastering delusions that are abroad in the world today. Our only safety is in knowing the broad ennobling truths of the Bible, and by becoming fully familiar with these we shall find peace and security.

There is, however, another reason. It is brought to our attention in the

following statement from the messenger of the Lord. It has to do with the "renewing of our minds" spoken of by the Apostle Paul. It suggests a real challenge to every child of God.

"In the Bible the will of God is revealed. The truths of the Word of God are the utterances of the Most High. He who makes these truths a part of his life becomes in every sense a new creature. He is not given new mental powers, but the darkness that through ignorance and sin has clouded the understanding is removed. The words, 'A new heart also will I give you,' mean, 'A new mind will I give you.' A change of heart is always attended by a clear conviction of Christian duty, an understanding of truth. He who gives the Scriptures close, prayerful attention will gain clear comprehension and sound judgment, as if in turning to God he had reached a higher plane of intelligence."—*Review and Herald*, Dec. 18, 1913.

Let us make 1962 not only Bible Emphasis Year in our Sabbath Schools, but in the entire activity of our lives. Let us earnestly, prayerfully, diligently study the Bible. Our physical, mental and spiritual growth depends upon it, and our final salvation also.

After a short worship period, Mr. Leonie spoke concerning the evaluation of Mount Ellis Academy which the faculty are in the process of making. Using the Spirit of Prophecy as a background, he explained the school's philosophies and principles.

Mr. Leonie announced that each student leader would be assigned a topic for research from the Spirit of Prophecy books and stated that this meeting at the lodge was the first of a planned series. He spoke of the value of studying the "red books" and the importance of students discovering for themselves the Seventh-day Adventist philosophy of education advocated by Ellen G. White.

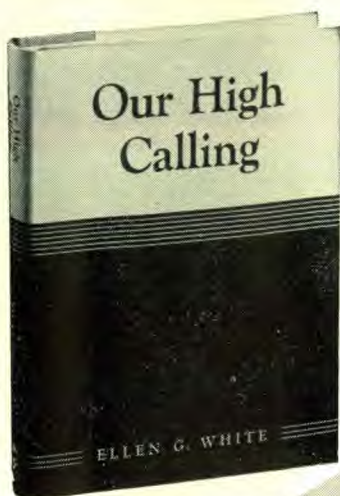
