#### Church School Building Underway at Juneau

The long hoped for Juneau church school is finally out of the planning stage and off to a good start with the concrete foundation laid and construction started.

Many months of earnest prayers and sacrificial giving on the part of the Juneau church members has resulted in the realization of this portion of the urgently needed school building. Many problems have arisen with expenses mounting higher than anticipated due to the current inflationary trend, new building code rules under the Borough system, shortage of available equipment, etc. The comparatively small Juneau group, consisting for the most part, of young professional people, have refused to become discouraged, however, and are moving forward in faith in spite of the many obstacles which still lie ahead. Materials must

be paid for as they arrive and freight costs are almost fantastic. Delays occur frequently and as the summer construction period in the north is well on its way and is short at its best, it will take even more faith and sacrifice to keep the project moving. It is hoped that it might be possible to have the building ready for occupancy at the start of the new school year in September or shortly thereafter.

Carl Manley, veteran in his profession, is the builder and is being assisted by Dan Dawson. Elder Harold Dawson has donated many hours of work to the project and other volunteer workers are also "putting their shoulders to the plow." The mothers and children, anxious to see the project go ahead, may be seen with shovels and wheelbarrows, busily engaged in levelling and filling. This is slow and tedious work but even the children want to feel that they have a part. All are working

together and praying that further delays will be cut to a minimum and claiming the promise that "with God nothing is impossible." If funds are available for completion, it is planned to operate a two-teacher school in order to accommodate the present students and also those who had to be turned away last year because of lack of space and facilities.

Alaska's Capitol City has felt the pinch of close quarters as the church group grows along with the expanding community. The able leadership of Elder Harold Dawson, the impact of the "It Is Written" telecast, the influence of the medical work and faithful witnessing of our two Christian physicians, the Story Hour and other Sabbath school projects have all played a part in the continual growth of the Juneau church.

Starting with a handful of students in one of the Sabbath school rooms and later moving to the quarters formerly occupied by the Alaska

NORTH PACIFIC UNION GLEANER Mission headquarters before the transfer to Anchorage, and using the church basement as a gymnasium, the enrollment has grown steadily to the point where it is apparent that a one-teacher school is no longer adequate.

> Even without the existing need for expansion, present facilities may not be available for too much longer as the City of Juneau has already included the lot on which the Juneau church stands in their plans for offstreet parking area. How soon this will be is not known at present but as the need for more parking space increases, Mayor Lauris Parker has informed Elder Dawson that notice could be served at any time for dismantling the church building. No funds have been received or price established on the sale of the building to the city as yet. Plans to complete the church school building as soon as possible are accelerated as members realize that they must also soon have a temporary place in which to hold worship services if none other is available until a new church can be erected on the lots purchased two years ago on the Douglas Island side of Gastineau Channel.

> The attractive site of the new church school building is situated five miles north of Juneau on the Glacier Highway, commanding a superb view of the majestic Chilkat Range, the Municipal Airport and Gastineau Channel. It is fronted by the lush green fields of the Lemon Creek Valley and a thickly forested slope rises in the background.

Juneau asks an interest in the prayers of fellow believers in Alaska and the Pacific Northwest that our urgently needed school may be completed on schedule.

#### Summer Session

A college campus is a busy place during the summer session as well as during the regular term. With 555 summer session students and a faculty of 60, the basic program is now under way.

A special event now taking place on the campus is the Summer Conference on Relativity in Undergraduate Physics. Designed for teachers of physics, mathematics, and engineering, the National Science Foundation-supported conference of which Dr. C. C. Barnett, chairman of WWC's department of physics, is director, with Robert Kingman and Robert Whitsett, instructors in physics as his assistants, has drawn capacity registration.

Among those in attendance are six from SDA colleges: Dr. Donald Snyder and Lance Hodges, Andrews University; Lester Cushman, La Sierra College; Kenneth Spaulding, Union College; and Oran McNiel and Dr. James Chambers, WWC.

Other special events scheduled during the summer session are Workshop Aerospace in Education, July 19-28, and Library Workshop, August 1-12.
