Bumper Corn Yield

A plaque recognizing Gem State Academy's farm for high corn yield per acre was presented recently by Dekalb Agricultural Association, Dekalb, Illinois.



This plaque from the "200 Club" of the Dekalb Agricultural Association was presented to the Gem State Academy farm.

Each year the company honors the top-yielding farms in the U. S., but it was the first time the GSA farm had been selected for special recognition, according to Bob Munsey, farm manager.

The academy farm last year produced a mechanically measured yield of 144 bushels per acre, he said. Although short of the "200 Bushel Club" goal set by Dekalb, the yield represents an extremely high production for crops in Idaho. Top-yielding farms in 1967 were in Colorado, Michigan, Iowa, and other states, mainly in the midwest "corn belt."

The many-faceted tasks which come to teachers and counsellors certainly demonstrate that teaching and counselling are professions for which training and skill are necessary and to which one must bring certain abilities.

A graduate assistant has the privilege of working in the Department of Education and Psychology in close proximity to the regular staff and thus observes them following their vocation while he begins to take his part in this program of teaching and caring for the student's needs. Such an opportunity can, I feel, contribute significantly to the development of one's educational equipment for life.

Senior Recognition Service

Dr. David L. McKenna, president of Seattle Pacific College, a Protestant church-related school, challenged seniors and guests to "The Thrill of a New Dedication" when he addressed them as speaker for the Senior Recognition Service in the College Church February 12.

Music was by the College Chorale under the direction of Professor William H. Murphy, and a piano duet, an anthem, by Professor and Mrs. Vinson Bushnell. Dr. Melvin K. West was at the organ.

Scripture and introduction of the speaker were by Dr. R. H. Brown, vice-president; presentation of the classes of June and August, 1969, by Dr. H. L. Rasmussen, academic dean, benediction by Dr. Malcolm Maxwell, senior class advisor.

Following an analysis of the contemporary student and his problems, Dr. McKenna declared the Christian college has "the power, the priorities, and the purpose to lift the student to the thrill of a new dedication."

First, he said, the Christian college has the power to bring a transforming focus to the concern, the ideas and the idealism of its students. The difference will come as we seek the "big answers," not from the secular world, but from the word of God and in the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

Second, the Christian college has priorities which begin with a spiritual regeneration that gives human concern its Christlike touch, follows with an honest intellectual search, and leads to moral decisions. Christian higher education begins with a personalized, spiritual commitment.

Third, the Christian college has the purpose to produce 20th century Christians who have a balanced wholeness of concern, ideas, and idealism. Action without balance of ideas and commitment tends to intemperate and impersonal reactions. Ideas without the balance of concern and action tend to be sterile exercises. Thus there is no more important task in the Christian college than to produce whole men and women for a society of "broken symbols" and "shattered relationships."

"This is the background for a new dedication that I would like to see come fully to life at Walla Walla College. You must face the moral conflicts that are raging down the street and across the world. But, as a Christian college, you must have a prevailing redemptive tone for your concern, your ideas, and your action. You must keep your priorities clear as you seek the truth, and you must remember that whole men are always greater than the sum of their parts."
