# Investment Exceeds Expectation

My previous experience with Investment caused me concern as I surveyed the accomplishments of our church upon arrival in Kirkland nearly three years ago. We had begun to see the results of investing our interests in God's work more fully. That very year we had traveled around the world. As an Investment covenant, we promised ten percent of our travel budget not spent. The Lord richly blessed,

and we had our first big year for Investment. This taught us a wonderful lesson.

Amazing results can happen over what may at first appear to be a moderately promising Investment project. Our largest single return resulted from the decision of two members, Glen Brown and Richard Davis, who do landscaping. As a result of business contacts with a fertilizer dealer. they were offered twenty-five cents for every cubic yard bought through their recommendations. They, in return, decided to make this their Investment project. How surprised we all were when the Lord caused this project to grow and grow until it reached approximately \$315!

Sister Helen Thorburn and her husband agreed they would raise \$100 as their first experience in really supporting Investment. She may have some difficulty getting around due to a handicapped leg, but this certainly did not prevent her from sewing. She made sixty aprons and sold them. She saved over \$13 in pennies, and with the help of her daughter, Lucy Smith, made a quilt for the sale. Sister Lucy Smith contributed \$115 by knitting slippers and mittens. Her sons made hotpads and they sold many of them at camp meeting.

A large number of the members did their share by raising gardens, giving a portion of overtime, saving change and baby sitting. There are many who have taken God as their partner and are unsung heroes for Investment. The enthusiastic primary department led the younger members with over \$260. Our earliteen department brought in \$115. The fall sale resulted with approximately an additional \$300.

Our goal was set at \$1,800. When the first of October arrived, our total had passed \$1,400 and my hopes of our reaching this new high goal began to rise. Two weeks in advance of Investment Day, we requested that our people turn in their offerings on Invesment Sabbath. I knew where some of the \$400 was coming, but as Invest-

Upon my arrival at Sabbath school on that Investment Day, I was not quite prepared for the surprise when the treasurer handed me the tally to date for Investment—\$1,900! When the Investment offering was taken that day, our hearts were greatly cheered when we saw Kirkland's Investment soar to a total of \$2,474. It is marvelous what God can do when we cooperate with Him.

Kirkland has become a truly Investment-minded church. As of August 1, 1969, we have \$1,002 for Investment. We are looking forward to reaching a goal of \$3,000 this year.

# Physical Activities Program at Gem State Academy

More and more people are working at being physically fit. We are beginning to realize that a physically fit person gets more enjoyment out of life. Sister White wrote many years ago that "the time spent in physical exercise is not lost."
