ACTS 2000 Made a Great Impact The first satellite meetings uplinked in the NSD

SEVENTH-DAY

he Friday night of September 29, 2000, the first satellite evangelistic meetings up-linked in the Northern Asia-Pacific region began at the Sahmyook University auditorium in Seoul, Korea. It was the 8th location of ACTS 2000, which has been held around the world with Mark Finley, *It Is Written* Director/ Speaker. ACTS 2000 stands for "Adventist Commission Through Satellite."

The speaker's English presentation was translated into Korean by Kwang Oh Kim, President of the Korean Seventh-day Adventist Church Council of North and South America. He was asked to do this great role almost one year ago and prepared it with much prayer. Additionally, others translated into Cantonese, Japanese, Mandarin, Mongolian, and Russian from another room.

On the opening night about 3,000 people packed the University auditorium and an additional 700 gathered at the Academy auditorium, which had a big screen showing the live program. In the meantime, there were 154 downlink sites in South Korea, where 555 local churches participated in. For example, the Hospital church in Seoul had about

400 attendants and the SDA Language Institutes headquarters church 400 also. Reports from KUC indicate that 23,721 people attended this evangelist effort throughout the country.

Ministry Professional Growth Seminar Pacific Rim

he "Ministry Professional Growth Seminar Pacific Rim" in Korea on October 3, 2000 was a first time event in two ways. It was conducted for the first time in Korea and for the first time it was broadcasted through satellites around the world from Korea. In fact, it was the first time the Northern Asia -Pacific Division conducted one of these seminars in its territory.

The so-called PREACH Seminar, was held at the Sahmyook University, in Seoul, and attracted around 450 people including pastors, theology teachers and students, church elders and deacons, and other professionals. There were about ten attendants from other Christian denominations. PREACH stands for "Program Reaching Every Active Clergy Home." It was sponsored by the Ministerial Association of the General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

If I cannot attend a PREACH Seminar, I buy the video cassette to learn. I bought the video of the World Ministerial Council in Toronto, Canada. I keep growing." To answer my question, "How can young pastors succeed and become experienced pastors like you?" He said, "They must be strong in commitment, faith, and determination. It is not easy to be a pastor. I say to my own pastors, 'Jesus promised us not a cup of tea, but hardship, persecution, and a cross.' "
