JUC Bible Printed

he First Bible ever published by our publishing house was released December 2003. This was made possible because of several conditions which now seem to be a wonderful help from God. At first, we were planning to publish the Bible

illustrated with almost 1,000 full color pictures, using an old translation because of copyright restrictions. However, during our proofreading process, many misprints in the text were found. When we reported this to the Japan Bible Society, they gave us special permission to use their latest translation for our project.



While this project was in process, the JUC was planning to print Sow 1 Billion advertisements in two major national newspapers. But one of the newspaper companies refused to print our advertisement because inviting people to enroll in our free Bible correspondence school was considered too much religious solicitation. At that time our new Bible was released. When we consulted with the advertising agency, they advised us that advertisement of the Bible should not be a problem with the newspaper company. So, we decided to print the Bible advertisement together with the invitation to study the Bible message. If we had not published the Bible at this time, the JUC would never have been able to print the S1B advertisement in one of the major national newspapers.

The price of this Bible is reasonable for most buyers. We are hoping that this publication will revitalize literature evangelism in the JUC territory.

Year of World Evangelism Initiatives

new Seventh-day Adventist Church worldwide outreach initiative, "Year of World Evangelism," has been promoted in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) along with world-wide Seventh-day Adventist churches.

Kwon JohngHaeng, Assistant Ministerial Association director of the NSD, said, "We have prepared our own poster for the "Year of World Evangelism" based on the original poster provided by the General Conference. It is unique in that the title YEAR OF WORLD EVANGLISM is in five languages: Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Mongolian and English."



The NSD voted the dates for "Evangelism Emphasis Sabbaths" as February 7, April 3, July 3 and October 2 of this year. Every level of the church will participate in this program.

"Chinese Union Mission's 'Year of World Evangelism' is focused on 50 or more reaping campaigns in Taiwan; target groups focused on evangelism in Hong Kong; all institutions in the CHUM are creating and executing their own YWE projects; integration of S1B into Internet evangelism; and support where possible in unorganized territories," said John Ash, coordinator of the CHUM Year of World Evangelism.

The Korean Union Conference initiated the "Year of World Evangelism" with a Public Evangelists and Go One Million members' retreat from February 12-15. The retreat brought together more than 400 lay people in preparation for a stepping stone for revival of evangelistic activities, as the KUC celebrates 100 years of mission this year.

The Japan Union Conference promoted the initiative with Sow 1 Billion invitations, Apostles Movement 21, Signs Contact Evangelism, Pioneer Mission Movement, and TV Evangelism.

Second Bi-Division Women's Convention

he second Bi-Division Women's Convention was held January 14-19, 2004 in the Federal Hotel in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. About 490 delegates, representing 13 unions, attended this convention. These delegates came from various parts of Asia: Bangladesh, China, Guam/



Micronesia, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, South Korea, Sri Lanka, Taiwan, Thailand, the United States, and Vietnam. There were 114 delegates from the Northern Asia-Pacific Division: 23 from the CHUM, 20 from the JUC, and 71 from the KUC.

"Empowered to Lead" was the theme throughout this convention. Dr. Jairyong Lee, NSD President, and Dr. Alberto Gulfan, SSD President, made welcoming remarks during the opening ceremony. Ten seminars were offered to the delegates, including the topics: Problem Solving and Decision-Making Techniques, Principles of Effective Public Speaking, Goal Setting and Visioning, Professional Appearance & Deportment, and Principles of Effective Leadership.

The delegates were encouraged to work toward Women's Ministries Certification or to take classes to promote their ministries. Seven resource speakers conducted these seminars: Mrs. Nancy Van Pelt, Family Life Educator; Mrs. Ardis Stenbbaken, GC Women's Ministries Director; Dr. Linda Koh, former SSD Women's Ministries Director, and currently the GC Children's Ministries Director; Dr. Sally Phoon, Southeast Asia Union Mission Women's Ministries Director; Dr. Song Sook Ja and Dr. Choi SunHae, NEWSTART Health Messengers and Dr. Ellen Missah, SSD Women's Ministries Director.

All delegates learned songs in different languages, and had opportunities to share with one another the blessings they received and the challenges they were facing. The Union Directors gave reports on the work of women's ministries in their countries. The delegates enjoyed the seminars and programs. They came to this convention with great expectations, and they left, transformed into women with a mission, with empowerment from Heaven, ready to return to their countries and lead their fellow sisters in Christ to greater service in women's ministries.

International Vegetarian Congress - Tokyo

enowned Seventh-day Adventist nutritionist, Joan Sabate, MD, PhD, best known as the world's leading authority whose research highlights the benefits of eating one handful of walnuts per day, was one of the lecturers at the International Vegetarian Congress, held in Tokyo, November 2-3, 2003.

Other lecturers included Dr. Mitsuru Kakimoto, Chairman of the Japanese Vegetarian Society; Dr. Winston Craig, chairman of nutrition at Andrews University; Dr. Fred Hardinge, Health Ministries Director, Upper Columbia Conference, USA; Dr. Lenore Hodges, Nutrition Director, Florida Hospital System; Stoy Proctor, GC Health Ministries Associate Director; Dr. Peter Landless, cardiologist and GC Health Ministries Associate Director; Dr. Osamu Mizukami, Director of Health Education, Tokyo Adventist Hospital; and Dr. John McGhee, NSD Health Ministries Director.

The elite group of Japanese dieticians, nutritionists, and medical professionals who pre-registered, packed the auditorium. Late arrivals had to be turned away for lack of space. The total attendance was 120, although they had only planned for 100.

The project was skillfully directed by Kyoichi Myazaki, CEO of our premier Seventh-day Adventist Health Food Factory which produces 123 commodities for retail. It was coordinated by Dr. Akeri Suzuki, Health Ministries director, Japanese Union Conference. And it was sponsored by the NSD, the JUC, and the Food Factory.

JUC English Language School Staff Retreat

n English Language School Staff Retreat was held at the Amagisanso Assembly (a Baptist retreat center) in the Izu peninsula, Sizuoka, Japan on November 21 (Friday) – 24 (Monday), 2003 under the leadership of John Fraser, director of the English Language Schools in the Japan Union Conference (JUC). Thirty-one teachers and two children attended. Pastor Lloyd Grolimund of the Wahroonga Seventh-day Adventist Church, Greater Sydney Conference, Australia, was the main speaker.

Pastor Grolimund spoke seven times including the Sabbath church service sharing about the successful Christian life. He noted five points that would help us follow Jesus: prayer, Bible study, dwelling on the cross, becoming a new person, and sharing Jesus. As he accepted questions and comments about his presentations, many listeners showed their eagerness to learn more to improve their missionary work.

Along with the spiritual meetings every morning and evening, there were a variety of programs conducted during the four-day, three-night-long retreat. Sabbath afternoon, all the participants went to see Joren-no-taki, a waterfall near the



retreat center, and then enjoyed a nature hike. It was an exciting moment when we spotted Mr. Fuji from an observatory in the forest. The vegetarian meals prepared by the retreat center were very much appreciated by the group.

The participants came from the Okinawa Junior High School, Hayato Church, Kagoshima Church, Tokuyama Church, Hofu Church, Hiroshima Academy, Hiroshima Church, Osaka Center Church, Kamenokoyama Church, Tokyo Central Church, Amanuma Church, and Saniku Gakuin College. Of the thirty-one participants, four were Japanese. The others were from Australia, Ghana, New Zealand, South Africa, the United States and Zimbabwe. While it is the first year for many of them to teach in Japan, it is the fourth or fifth year for a few of them.

The JUC English Language School was organized in 1966 at the Osaka Center Church by M. T. Bascom as a method of reaching secular people. The Japanese people were eager to learn English, so the number of schools and enrollment increased during the first 15 years. But the school's present financial situation is becoming critical due to the competition from other professional schools, visa issues and lack of students.

Twenty-one foreign teachers serve at local churches and the total enrollment is around 900. Five overseas teachers are working at a junior high school in Okinawa, an academy in Hiroshima, and at a college in Otaki as well. The total enrollment from these schools is about 600.

UC (the Korean Union Conference) began it's celebration of the 100th centennial anniversary mission in Korea with a major satellite evangelistic se-

ries, held November 7-15, and its theme was "Discover Bible Keys for a Bright Future." The invited speaker was Pastor Doug Batchelor, the well-known author of the book, "The Richest Caveman". Every night, more than 20,000 people watched and participated in the evangelistic series from 565 different churches in Ko-



rea. And more than 3,000 people attended the program in the Sahmyook University main auditorium.

At the close of the meetings, 534 new souls were brought to the feet of Jesus Christ through baptism, and there are now 4,185 interests who desire to study the Word of God.

"I'm Doug Batchelor, I want to encourage you to participate in campus ministries. Feeding the Homeless

Yokohama, Japan

he Yokohama International Church (YIC) conducts an outreach program every second Sabbath afternoon, feeding the homeless in Yokohama, Japan. John and Ann Fraser, the pastor and his wife, initiated this project and work with the church members. They feed around 150 to 200 people.

YIC is not a big church, as the average attendance is only twenty to thirty. The members are from Australia, Korea, the Philippines, and the USA,

as well as Japan. They meet in a two-story building that was once a school for missionary children.

On November 8, 2003, the church members came to the church with curry. Each housewife had been asked to prepare curry for twenty people. After lunch, the members cooked rice and combined the individual curries in big pots. Then, they put the curry pots, rice bowls, one table, guitars and used clothes into vans. Around twenty members drove to downtown Yokohama in four cars. When they arrived at their destination, they found twenty to thirty individuals already lined up to receive food. Several church members from the Japanese Yokohama Church joined this team to sing Christian songs.

Land Purchased by the NSD

anuary 8, 2004 the Northern Asia-Pacific Division Executive Committee, including the Union Presidents via telephone, took a historic vote to purchase land as an investment. A decision had been made at the 2003 midyear meetings to invest in land. Since land in Korea is appreciating at a faster rate than bank deposits or stocks and bonds, it was felt that the division would be wise to use its money in that manner.



After looking at more than 20 different properties, a decision was made to purchase about 33,000 square meters adjacent to an area the government plans to develop into a new city within the next two – three years. Highway bridges are already being constructed.

The property is about 15 minutes farther north from our current location. This property was chosen because it does have the potential for construction of a division office, should this be deemed the direction to go some day in the future. The government plans call for a major access road to the expressway. The commute to the airport should take about the same amount of time as it does currently.

This property is slightly elevated from the bordering agricultural land. A wooded area comprises approximately three-quarters of the property.

Most of the homeless are elderly and physically weak, so they have a difficult time finding jobs.

While they ate, a couple of them raised several questions, asking the name of the church, location of the church, etc. On this day, one person received a new Bible that he had requested the previous time. He told them that he had once attended a church. Another person requested a copy of a Christian song which he wanted to learn after listening to the song sung by the church members.
