Fourteen women came from the Middle West Korean Conference Women's Association with me and Dr. Song who delivered the health messages. Since these women

have been leading out in evangelistic meetings in their Conference several times a year, they were very helpful in this meeting in Mongolia. This was the first time for them to



hold meetings outside their home country. These women not only sponsored the meetings but paid their own way. People were so inspired by their dedication and sacrificial services.

Mornings, the Health and Gospel messages were presented to the people, and afternoons were devoted to body and foot massages and tapping therapy.



Tolgoit church is in a small town where the people are very poor. We have approximately 40 church members. Around 190 people attended the meeting everyday. On Sabbath, July 31, our women prepared a big lunch for all the people, about 350 attended. Fifteen people

were baptized in the river on Sabbath afternoon by Elder Dale Tunnell, director of the Mongolia Mis-



sion Field. We were so thankful to the Lord for His many blessings and these new members of His family.

Other great news: this Women's Evangelistic group raised Scholarship funds for the Mongolian pastoral training project, US \$8,000 were donated. Dr. Song donated US \$5,000 for well digging expenses for the Tolgoit church which has no water. Hallelujah!

Health Seminar - Hong Kong

n April 17 a public seminar was conducted at the Chinese Bible Auditorium SDA church in Kowloon, Hong Kong. This was a partnership between the church and the two local Adventist hospitals, Hong Kong Adventist Hospital and Tsuen Wan Adventist Hospital. The seminar, organized by Dr. Santos, director of the Lifestyle Management Center at both hospitals, was about Diabetes and Metabolic Syndrome, two problems that are prevalent in Hong Kong.

Pastor Davis Kong, church pastor and leader of the 35-plus team of volunteers, including young people, that worked during the afternoons to provide lectures and health assessments for about 100 people. Dr. Santos talked about Metabolic Syndrome and Dr. Lam Ming Yuen about Diabetes. Helen Yue, dietitian of the Tsuen Wan Advnetist Hospital, translated for Dr. Santos lecture. It was a very interactive seminar with intense participation of the au-

dience, during the questions and answer section.

After the lectures, a series of body assessments were done by the volunteers in a separate room. Body fat percentage, weight, height, blood pressure, and blood glucose were all offered for free. The food company, Eden's Synergy - run by the church in Hong Kong - also participated giving healthy food samples for

the participants during the seminar.

This was the first seminar done in conjunction with the hospitals and the church. There are plans to continue with those seminars and develop other health activities for the local Chinese community with the intent to promote health and break the ice for them to know the gospel.

Ten minutes before starting the lecture, we invited some young musicians to play instrumental music for those waiting for the seminar. Also we created a puppet group to deliver health messages before the main lecture. Five young people played the puppet family - dad and mom, two children and grandfather. It was exciting both for the youth puppet group and for the audience. Young people were responsible for the body tests: checking the weight, height and body fat. Nurses took blood pressures, and the blood tests.



"Signs Magazine Contact Evangelism" in Japan

o commemorate the 100th anniversary of "Signs Magazine", the Adventist Church in Japan started an evangelistic mission movement 3 years ago. "Signs Magazine Contact Evangelism" designed for "Onefor-One Soul Winning" through the year 2005.



According to replies that 54 churches' submitted to a questionnaire in May 2004. These churches have a combined membership of 1,947. Six hundred forty-one (33 %)

members have been involved in distributing the Signs Magazines. Among those who receive the magazines are 1,261 by personal contact, and 539 by mail.

As a result of this personal contact, 41 new persons are attending church regularly, 232 have participated in seminars and church meetings, 51 requested Bible Studies, 28 are involved in small groups, 110 subscribed to the Signs themselves and 13 have been baptized.

From the survey, Church members said "Through Signs Magazine Contact, we could visit non-believers' homes and invite them to take Bible studies and to worship with us. We hope that this mission movement will continue."

Children's Missionary Movement, a First For the Church in Northern Asia-Pacific

dventist church members in the Northern Asia-Pacific region are not satisfied with just sending out missionaries who are already young adults. Now, they are training children to have a "mind for mission."

The Children's Missionary Movement, voted in Hong Kong in June by church children's ministries directors from the region, aims to develop a "missionary consciousness" in children and train them to be missionaries.

"Right now [the church in the Northern Asia-Pacific region] is going full-force in missionary work," says Linda Koh, children's ministries director for the world church. She explains that the church there has set up an office, headed by Kwon John Haeng, that trains missionaries to go all over the region planting churches and become Global Mission "pioneers," volunteers who give their time to begin Bible studies and eventually churches.

The goal is to prepare 10,000 children to develop a sense for mission, which includes saving a certain amount of their allowances for their missionary fund until 2010. "By then, they can use this missionary fund to do missionary work," Koh says. Out of this 10,000, the hope is that 1,000 will ultimately join the 1,000 Missionary Movement when they are a little older.

"The Children's Missionary Movement will serve as a feeder organization for the 1,000 Missionary Movement, which has successfully sent out hundreds of young people as missionaries annually to Asia and to other parts of the world," Koh says.

"We need to train and raise more qualified and prepared missionaries," says Joshua Shin, Children's Ministries director in the Northern Asia-Pacific region, who helped begin the 1,000 Missionary Movement. "If we do this, then more young people will dedicate their lives for the Lord."

He says in Korea, men are required to serve in the military for two to three years. "Since we serve the government for years, why not serve the Lord for a year?" he says. "I really want to train our children to be the best and faithful missionaries for God ..."

Children's Missionary Movement participants are encouraged to attend a camp every year, and participate in training courses, seminars and short-term mission projects. A Children's Missionary Movement magazine, to be published quarterly, will also be sent to those involved.

"Many church members and children are already very excited about this movement and they started to join this program," Shin says.

The church in the Northern Asia-Pacific region also has a missionary program for pastors, as well as a Silver Missionary Movement for retired people, which is in the planning stages.

Three hundred forty-eight teens and young adults, most living in high-rise Hong Kong, joined 30 friendship groups led by 89 teen and adult facilitators during a historic YOUTH ALIVE summer camp overlooking the South China Sea on an Adventist College campus at Clearwater Bay, July 5 - 11, 2004. YOUTH ALIVE reduces high risk behaviors through building friendships that emphasize small group activities where everyone is a winner.

Pastor Lee, Choke Woh, "Go One Million" and Youth Evangelism coordinator of the Hong Kong Macau conference directed YOUTH ALIVE. Dr. Kathleen Kuntaraf, GC Health Ministries associate director, led the programming while Two General Conference departmental directors, Dr. Alan Handysides, Health Ministries, and Dr. Garland Dulan, Education, assisted her.
