Ordination Celebration in NSD

They have been assigned to areas where no Seventh-day Adventist church exists, to plant a new church. There have been other ordinations in Taiwan in the past. This year 10 pastors will be ordained to the gospel ministry. However, for those involved in the Pioneer Mission Movement, this was a first. A real time to celebrate.



During this past year of language study they have been active in soul winning. They began Bible studies with a Korean lady. She accepted the message. So as they begin their church planting experience they already have a church member to start their congregation.



Pastor John Ash III, Taiwan Conference President presented the ordainees with a commemoration of their ordination. Pastor Ke, Shr Kuang, Conference Secretary presented each pastor with their credentials. Pastor Hong, Sung Sun,

in 2002 has increased the spirit of missions within many young Korean pastors.



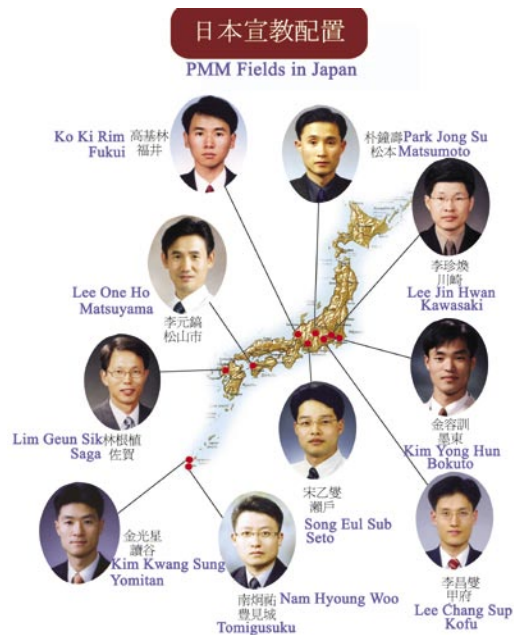

This special ordination service held in Granger Hall on the campus of San-iku Gakuin College, Chiba, Japan was the result of cooperation between the Korean Union Conference and the Japan Union Conference. These three Korean PMM pastors met the qualifications of their home Union. The Japan Union Conference where they are currently working, verified the qualification. Pastor Hong, Sung Sun, KUC Ministerial Association Secretary read the Certificate of Ordination that was then presented by Pastor Masaki Shoji, JUC Secretary. Pastor Takashi Shiraishi, JUC President in his welcome to the PMM pastors also commented on how appropriate that Korea should be sending missionaries to Japan when 100 years ago the Adventist message came from Japan to Korea. Pastor Hong said, "I wish they had had a PMM program 35 years ago when I began my ministry."

Kim, Kwang Sung, Park, Jong Su, and Lee, Chang Sup after finishing their year of language study were sent to plant new churches in un-entered areas. Currently small companies are meeting regularly. Souls are being baptized.

Mongolia: Sabbath School Training Seminar

ASabbath School Training Seminar was held for Mongolian laity March 4 to 6, 2005 in Mongolia. Forty-eight lay members attended the seminar which was conducted by Pastor Elbert Kuhn, Sabbath School Director of the Mongolia Mission Field. The theme for the three days was "How to develop spiritual, practical, enthusiastic and friendly Sabbath School programs."

Pastor Kuhn said "I felt that all of them were eager to learn the knowledge to apply it to help their local churches to spread the Gospel throughout Mongolia. This year we will have many seminars for the laity. Our goal is to develop their spiritual gifts and skills to help the churches. God has a special plan for one of the coldest places on the earth. Please keep Mongolia in your prayers."



At the end of the training seminar, a Sabbath School seminar certificate was given to the participants. They promised to work hard for Jesus and to do their best to share the good news in their places.

New Accounting Program "SunPlus" Implemented

The new accounting software, "SunPlus," has been implemented at the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in March 2005. The General Conference (GC) SunPlus team and a staff member from the East Central African Division visited the NSD to setup the new software and train the NSD accounting team between February 14 to March 18.

The old system, "Sun Accounting," was based on DOS and had been used more than 15 years. Now the new software which is more sophisticated has been already implemented at the GC and some other Divisions. SunPlus operates in the Windows system creating three dimensional or multilateral accounting structures which is a totally different concept from the old system which only had two dimensions to work in. It can provide more detailed accounting information for financial managers. Also the SunPlus software can be switched into many languages including English, Korean, Chinese, Japanese, and others.



Mr. Ray Wahlen, director of the SunPlus of the GC, said "The SunPlus is not just for accounting but strengthens financial management and analysis. The new program is very flexible. Treasurers, associate treasures, and auditors can enter into it on their desk to get easily analytic reports which include items which they are interested in. It also can be customized."

During the software education, the Japan Union Conference accounting staff stayed at the NSD to begin implementing the new software. The NSD treasury department will help the Unions and institutions in the Division territory to implement the new accounting system in the near future. "Although it takes time to introduce this system, I hope that all our church organizations including divisions and union conferences will use the innovative and standardized program which does an efficient and effective job of accounting and financial management," said Mr. Wahlen.

Third Korean 1000 Missionary Movement Congress

“Once A Missionary! Always A Missionary!” is one of the most thrilling phrases to our Christian people. It is the 1000 Missionaries slogan who are young and have dedicate their life for one year of service to be trained as a life-time missionary. From February 13 to 18, 2005 the third 1000 Missionary Movement Congress was held with the theme, “You Shall Be My Witness” at the “Deer Mountain” retreat in Gapyung about 40 km from Seoul, Korea.

More than 260 Korean 1000 Missionary Movement (1000MM) Alumni and their family members attended, including church leaders and officers from the Northern

Asia-Pacific Division. Dr. Jairyong Lee, the founder and the first director of the 1000MM, and currently president of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, delivered inspiring sermons during the congress. “Once we become a missionary, we should be always a missionary. As you were members of 1000MM, I hope you will be a faithful missionary with the missionary spirit where you live during your lifetime until Jesus comes again,” said Dr. Lee.

Reports were given regarding “The vision and role of the alumni of 1000MM” by Yo Han Kim, director of the 1000MM headquarters, “The vision of the Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM)” by Kwon Johng-Haeng, coordinator of the NSD PMM, “The vision of the

NSD Youth and Children’s Ministries and role of 1000MM alumni” by Joshua Shin, director of the NSD youth department, “The vision of the KUC Youth Ministries and role of 1000MM alumni” by Nak Hyung Kim, director of the KUC youth department.



Pastor Yo Han Kim presented the 5

year plan (2005-2010) for organizing 20 branches of the 1000MM and the recruiting plan to send 1,000 missionaries every year. Pastor Shin encouraged the attendees to be the forever-missionary from the cradle to the grave, with explanation of the consecutive missionary life introducing a chain of “Children’s Missionary Movement (CMM),” “1000MM,” “PMM,” and “Silver Missionary Movement (SMM).” According to Pastor Kwon, 18 of the 1000MM members joined the 2nd and 3rd groups of the PMM.

So far, in the NSD territory, 767 from Korea, 27 from Mongolia, 13 from Hong Kong, 10 from Taiwan, 6 from Japan have been sent as the 1000MM members. The headquarters of the 1000MM is located in the Philippines and has 5 branches in other countries. Since the first group of 22 missionaries, after four months training, were sent to the fields on March 5, 1993, 3,206 people from 47 countries have been sent to 34 countries including the Philippines, Myanmar, Bangladeshi, Russia, Indonesia, and Mongolia. They baptized 31,011 individuals, constructed 322 church buildings, and organized 523 companies in various places.

“NEWSTART” Evangelism in Taiwan

Recently the “NEWSTART” health evangelism began to attract interest among the churches in Taiwan. January 15 to 22, 2005, the Adventist church in Taichung and Taichung Christian Ministerial Association co-hosted the “NEWSTART” Health Evangelism to bring more than 200 people to the Taiping Elementary School in Taichung city. The speaker was Dr. Sang Lee who is the founder of the “NEWSTART” Lifestyle Program, and Professor at the Weimar College and Institute.

During the evangelistic seminar with entitled, “21 Century is “Time of Gene Medicine,” Dr. Lee delivered 8 presentations: “How to strengthen your Immune System, Lower Your Blood Pressure, Conquer Diabetes, Solve Problems with Osteoporosis, Postmenopausal Syndromes, Can You Avoid Alzheimer Disease, How to Suppress Aging Process, Successful Fight against Cancer, and How to regenerate your Brain cells and recover from Stroke”

This health evangelistic series especially impacted other denomination church leaders and members who attended. Pastor Norman Tu, Taichung Church pastor, who translated Dr. Sang Lee’s lectures said, “More Sunday churches became interested in our Adventist church message. More people began to know about the Adventists, and to be positive to us.” As the result of the programs, 30 people decided to join the NEWSTART Programs and Bible Study.

They also did the song services for the PMM Welcome and Ordination and the Sabbath afternoon services in Saniku Gakuin College at Chiba-ken on March 5. Then from March 6 to 12 they supported the evangelistic meetings with music at the Saga Church where PMM Pastor Lim, Geun Sik is serving. Their beautiful songs im-

pressed people even on cold streets, patients in hospitals, and the elderly at caring houses. A local public newspaper in Saga on March 8 ran an article about the Golden Angels' concert at the elderly caring house. After the meetings in Saga, the Golden Angels moved to Matsumoto Church where PMM Pastor Park, Jong Su is pastoring. The singing angels touched the new souls at the church with heavenly music during the evangelistic revival series March 13 to 19. There were two baptisms, one each in the Saga and Matsumoto churches.

Two 1000MM Missionaries in Mongolia

A small airplane accommodating about 60 people landed on an unpaved runway. It was windy. Everywhere was snow covered. There were two young men, named Bobo and Tsogo, who are working as 1000 Missionary Movement (1000MM) members for the Mongolian Mission in spite of -55°C temperature and the difficult environment in Gobi Altai. Bobo and Tsogo stay in an apartment building which doesn't have doors for each room, so it is very cold inside. They must cover themselves with two or three folded comforters while sleeping. Water and electricity are provided through a central system which doesn't send warm water even during the winter time.

Bobo and Tsogo were trained in the 1000MM branch in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia and were sent to Gobi Altai in August 2003. There are 20,000 people in the small city, mostly Buddhists. The two young 1000MM missionaries focus on evangelism for young students. Currently they have about 20 members who attend the company regularly. This group developed from a cell group of Bible study students. These two young missionaries use an internet site for evangelism, "www.1000mmmongolia.tk" which attracts students and ranks 18th among Mongolian websites. Recently Tsogo is trying to teach people the Bible through ham radio. They both have a dream to organize a church before another six months passes and their term expires.

Currently there are 10 hours of Mandarin programs coming from Guam everyday, within which 5 hours are new programs produced by the Chinese Union Media Center.

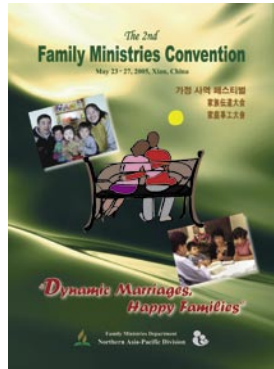

Friendship Award

The following was written by Llewellyn Juby, ADRA Mongolia Director. His staff submitted his name to the President of Mongolia's office for an award in recognition of his leadership of ADRA. Since we were unable to have anyone from our staff present we asked Mr. Juby to share the experience with us. The award was given March 7, 2005.

I went to the Mongolian Parliament today to receive an award from President Bagabandi. This friendship award is given to foreigners who have made a significant contribution to the welfare of Mongolians. This award has been over a year in the planning and it was kept a secret from me. It was first passed through parliament and then a police clearance from South Africa had to be procured. ADRA has worked in Mongolia for 10 years doing development and relief work and we have built up a team of amazing colleagues. They had put forward my name for this award. Although I accepted it from the President of Mongolia, it was really on behalf of ADRA and our team in Mongolia that I did so. It was an amazing privilege to have this special time to talk to the president and have his full attention. I thanked him for the honor and told him briefly that ADRA was so happy to collaborate with his government and serve in Mongolia. He said that ADRA was well known for our teaching and training people to work for their own change. He thanked us for the contribution we had made to the improvement of Mongolians in this period of transition.

My team met me outside the parliament. Only my wife, Renee, our board chairman, Dale Tunnell and my right-

hand man, Munk-Jargal, had been allowed into the President's office. Everyone wanted to shake the hand that shook that of the president minutes before. My staff gave me a bouquet of roses and all wanted a photo with me. We posed on Sukhbaater square in the icy wind for some photos and then went off to a posh restaurant for a celebratory meal together. They presented me with a traditional dööl (coat) which I had to put on immediately. They had a wonderful meal planned. It seemed as if no-one wanted to leave afterwards. They began to take turns singing traditional songs. I knew that we foreigners would soon be called on to sing too. It was wonderful fun to relax together and to take our turn to sing some songs of home too. It is indeed a privilege to work with such amazing people in this most unusual country.

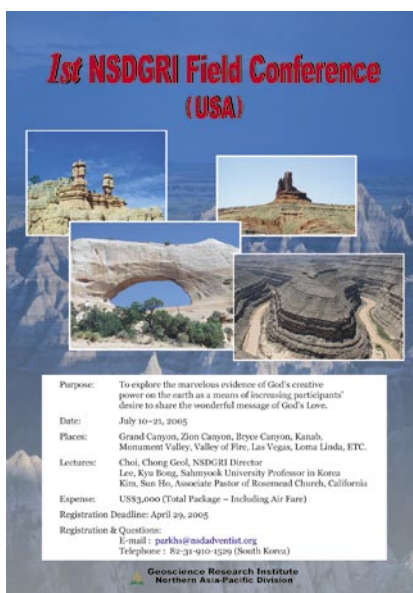
