Overwhelming Appeals

The following word has just been received from Brother W. H. Williams, the Undertreasurer of the General Conference.

"Eagerly the secretaries of the Tresury Department scan the weekly "Tribune" from the Harvest Ingather ing fields. Then we turn to the budgets under preparation for the Autumn Council. What do we find :-Urgent appeals, memorials and pleadings for additional funds, coming from the men we have sent "out there on the border," which almost overwhelm us. Never before have appeals come from mission lands. During the years of depression our missionaries have been conservative in pressing their needs. They have been holding back the calls. But now there is, as it were, an avalanche let loose. God's providences are beckoning us to press on, and our brethren on the border are looking straight to us as they call. Even in old India, where it has been so difficult to break through the wall of superstition and ignorance, our brethren tell us that the Spirit of God is turning the hearts of those benightcd people to this message in a woiderful manner.

"Yes, brethren, we must send them help. We hope to grant an advance

over that of the last Council. Much depends on our autumn campaig: s for funds, and particularly the Harvest Ingathering, for from this source comes nearly one-fourth of our mission budget. We are profoundly grateful to God for the splendid reports rolling in from every local and union field, and the loyalty expressed these substantial reports. Lay God bless and inspire us too hold on until we have all reached our objective in this the most important campaign in the history of this people."

The world is in a terrible situation. The calls from the mission fields abroad are very urgent. What we do must be done quickly. In order that the General Conference may be able to intelligently fix the budget of the mission fields at the time of the Autumn Council, October 20 to 27, they should know what the amount of Harvest Ingathering is going to be.

Brethren and Sisters of the Minnesota churches, we earnestly appeal to each of you to plan definitely to reach your goal during the next two weeks. United prayer and wholehearted, united action will do it. It can be done. Shall we do it ? May God help us to do our duty and do it now. V. E. Peugh

God Answers Prayer

The Bible teaches it; experience proves it. When laboring in northern Europe I had an experience which I shall never forget.

Early one morning I arrived in Riga, Latvia, where before the Bolshevist Revolution our headquarters for all Russia had been located, and where now the headquarters of the Baltic Union was located. I had traveled all night and felt tired. As soon as I stepped off the train the secretary-treasurer of the union met me at the depot and, after greeting me,

reminded me that we had a financial obligation to meet the following day. The amount which was due totaled several hundred dollars. I inquired how much cash there was on hand and he told me that we did not have a dollar with which to meet this obligation. The union was newly organized and our funds were very low.

The following night I woke and could not sleep from two until four o'elock, and I pleaded for God to help. I told the Lord that we necced it at once. Next morning when I went to the union office and sat down at my desk to look through my mail. I found a check of \$545 in the first letter which I opened. This moncy was sent by a sister in California, and it was stated in the letter that I should feel free to use the money where it was most needed.

I know that God heard my prayer. I knelt down immediately in that office beside my desk, to thank the Lord for His goodness and mercy and His watch care over His cause. That experience has given me great confidence in God's care over His work in the earth.

Time and space make no difference in God's attitude toward His children and His work. North Dakota has been hard hit and we have all felt it. In spite of a shortage of funds we have tried to carry on in a strong, aggresive way and the Lord has blessed our endeavers. We rejoice over the success of our evangelistic but there has been a loss in our operating of \$2,000 for the first eight months of this year. This has caused us great concern. We have prayed most earnestly over this matter. Last Friday, October 1, I received a letter from a brother containing a check of \$1,000 tithe. I read the letter and the check several times to make sure that I was not dreaming. but sure enough, there was the amount, \$1,000. When I gave the check to the treasurer he exclaimed "God bless the man who has sent this money at this time." The treasurer, knowing our situation as he does, could not help but feel that God had come to our help. Just a little later on that santies Friday forenoon the treasurer came to me and said, "We have a surprise." I thought it strange that he should tell me about the surprise when I had known about it before he did, but he assured me that it was another surprise, and he soon convinced me that another person, a sister in Fargo, had turned in \$1,025 tithe. The Lord does hear prayer. He knows the needs of His cause and we praise His name for His goodness.

Yesterday a check of \$150 was received from two sisters. This was also tithe, one sister paying \$100 and the other \$50.

What the Lord looks upon in the matter of tithing is faithfulness. We read in I Corinthians 4:2, "Moreover, it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." We should be be faithful not only in large amounts but in the small amounts. The tithe is the Lord's whether it is large or small.

People are never too poor to pay tithe. Jacob possessed nothing of this world's goods when he vowed to pay a tenth unto the Lord. He said he would surely pay a tenth unto the Lord if the Lord would give him "bread to eat and raiment to put on." Gen. 28:20-22. The Lord blessed the faithfulness of Jacob and He will do the same thing today.

If all who are members of the great Advent movement were faithful in the matter of bringing a full tithe into the Lord's storehouse, there would be no shortage of means and we would be able to meet all exhisting needs of the work.

"If professing Christians would faithfully bring to God their tithes and offerings, His treasury would be full." "Acts of the Apostles," page 338.

"Should means flow into the treasury exactly according to God's plan, a tenth of all the increase, there would be abundance to carry forward His work."—"Testimonies," Vol. V. page 150.

God does hear prayer. We can fully trust Him, and we are definitely planning to carry on strong, aggresive evangelistic work. Brethren and sisters, let us be faithful in bringing 'n a full tithe. God will not forsake us; if we move forward in faith He will add His blessing.

With continued work in the vicinity we are confident that several others will unite with us, and that ultimately it will be possible to organize a church there.

Our three families within atterding distance of the meetings, have given us their most loyal and consecrated cooperation. It has been a real inspiration to work with them. Others of our people from adjacent towns have given us freely of their services and prayers. Again it is demonstrated that the consistent Christian lives of our people are the mightiest argument for the truth.

Brother T. R. Torkelson, recently from Union College, has given himself unsparingly to the work. He has the confidence of the people and will continue to foster the interest in Kathryn throughout the winter. We are also indebted to Miss Olivia Harder and Sister A. H. Denning for their faithful services in making the musical aspect of the meetings a winning factor.

For the last part of the effort, at a time when we most needed help, Elder Wall and Brother Grau came to our assistance and presented some strong lectures which contributed materially to the success of the work.
