
"As I approached a house to deliver a Home Physician to a man who had given me an order, I heard a woman from within the house exclaim three times in succession, 'My husband doesn't want your book!' I met the man and he arranged to have the book delivered at a future date. While we were making the arrangements, the woman sent in her grandson with instructions for the husband not to take the book. I left with the understanding that I should deliver the book at a specified date.

"At the appointed time, I called again and found both the man and the woman at home. While I managed to enter the house, I was given

a cool reception. I started to pray silently, and while I was praying, she started to hum a song. I said, 'Evidently you are a singer. Do you mind if I join you in singing that song?' She did not reply but continued her singing.

"After she had finished, I started to sing, 'Jesus, Saviour, Pilot Me'. She looked at me with amazement, but I continued singing. After I had finished she queried, 'To what religion do you belong?' I said, 'The religion of love,' and started to sing, 'It is Well With My Soul'. Both

the husband and wife joined me in singing that song. By this time, the woman had become very much interested, and she continued, 'To what church do you belong?' I replied by singing, 'I Must Have the Saviour With Me.' She became still more interested, and turning to her husband, she asked him what agreement he had made about the book. He replied, 'I told him to call at a future date for the money.' She said to him, 'Don't allow this gentleman to make another trip with this book, unless you have the money with which to pay for it. We have greatly enjoyed meeting with the Minneapolis First English church the past two week-ends. Here is a group of loyal, devoted believers in the advent message, working hard to keep a well balanced program going for the interest of the cause in the homeland and in our world-wide mission work. We were impressed with their efforts for their children, carrying a ten-grade school with three teachers, and an enrollment of about sixty-five pupils. The teachers and children seemed happy and contented, and God is blessing their united efforts. Friday evenings we attended the M. V. meetings. This section of the church activity is surely well organized and the attendance and interest bear witness to the good work done by the leaders. One is impressed that these youth are Godly, earnest young people. Their subject matter, in study, was well arranged and given with clear, appealing effect. What a force is pent up in the children and youth of the advent band!

The Sabbath service was very largely attended. It seemed that every seat was taken and others were searching for a place. It is Harvest Ingathering time here as elsewhere. With no regular pastor for more than four months one was deeply impressed with the power of the Word to hold believers together under the leadership of strong local leaders in the various departments of church activity. By committee action Elders Peugh, the conference president, and Christenson, the conference home missionary secretary, were asked to join in the responsibility of assisting the church through the Harvest Ingathering. With his many field duties Elder Peugh has found it hard to do

much but give his moral support. Elder Christenson has been a real general in this field task. The church was organized into twenty bands with a leader over each. Mrs. Christenson was captain of the singing bands. This department alone has raised more than eight hundred dollars. At our last Sabbath morning service Elder Christenson called for reports from the bands and one could not but be deeply stirred by the response. They came forward in groups and placed their gifts on the table while the congregation sang, "They Brought Their Gifts to Jesus". One can never forget that blessed sight.

With a goal of \$2500, and a super goal of \$2800, it was inspiring to see the mercury in the goal device move upward past the \$500, \$1000, \$1500, and the \$2000 mark to nearly \$2400. As the writer and his wife had the privilege of attending the Theological Seminary at Washington, D. The leaders and members of the various churches caught the spirit, and several days before our own fixed time limit had been reached, the district had gone over the top. May these gifts, with the blessing of God resting upon them, be the means of bringing many souls from the ends of the earth into the kingdom of Christ.

Iowa is goal conscious. We believe in attaining objectives. We don't believe in shooting into the air. Ours is not a hit-and-miss program. We believe that goals should represent specific needs. They should not be set in order to make a record. Much prayerful, earnest study should be given before setting goals. The Lord does not require impossibilities. Iowa praises God that His blessing enabled the churches to reach the **Signs of the Times** goal. This goal, when set by the union, seemed a little high, but Iowa went "over the top". God is greatly blessing Iowa in the Harvest Ingathering campaign. We expect that by the time these lines are read, the conference will have reached its base goal. We must not re-

lax our efforts or spend time now in rejoicing, but, cheered by this success, we must press forward with renewed determination toward the conference super goal.

I believe there is another goal that I must mention. Last spring we launched the Institutional Relief campaign. Iowa's great need prompted the committee and workers to set the \$6,000 goal. This is vital. Financial difficulties bring discouragement, but when the conference is rolling back the reproach of indebtedness, the effect is electric. New life and vigor stimulate and encourage all.

One-third of the Institutional Relief goal has already been paid. Another third has been pledged and is to be fully paid before the end of the year. (Much of this is due.) A beginning has been made on the last third. Iowa must, during the months of November and December, address itself to the task in hand. Let no one assume a defeatist attitude. Say, "It can be done," and by God's help and with His blessings, combined with the liberality of His people, it can be done!

Bulletins will be sent to the churches, showing their standing, soon after the first of the month. Now is the time to pay pledges and to plan that your church may be among the leaders.

Are There Exceptions in Tithing?

According to information which comes to us, it would seem that there are those among us who do not pay tithe on certain money they receive. Some there are, it seems, who are of the opinion that they are under no obligation to pay tithe on money which they do not directly earn but receive as grants.

In a letter just received from a brother, I read that there are even

some "who do not pay tithe on cream, milk and farm products." I feel sure that this is not general, and that it is true in exceptional cases only; but even so, we have a solemn responsibility resting upon us toward every believer, to faithfully instruct him in discharging his sacred obligation before God.

Tithing is a sacred principle and the Scriptures teach explicitly that we should "bring all the tithes into the storehouse that there may be meat in mine house." Malachi 3:10. Unfaithfulness will surely rob us of heaven's blessing. Everything we receive, from whatever source it may be, we receive from God whom we should recognize as the great and bountiful Giver of every gift, and in returning one-tenth we recognize Him as the Divine Giver.

Every penny that comes into our hands is partly His. He has reserved one-tenth of it. It is holy. It belongs to God for a special purpose. We should heed God's admonition to His people to bring all the tithe into His storehouse. That means that we will not withhold any part of it, from what ever source we may receive it, for in the last analysis God is the Giver and in tithing we recognize him as the owner.

It pains the heart of any true believer to hear of unfaithfulness in tithing and laxness in the matter of proper Sabbath observance. God's remnant people will be tested on every point. Let us be faithful in all things. God's rich blessing will rest upon those who are faithful. Tithing is an act of obedience on the part of God's children. It is an act of faith on the part of those who are faithful toward God.
