

# Special Announcement to Dorcas Societies

The cooperation of Doreas Societies in North America with mission stations, particularly in Africa and China, in the way of sending bandages and other first aid supplies, is meeting with real need. We have received numerous letters from our missionaries requesting that we send on their sincere thanks to all Doreas Societies and assure them that what they have done, and are still doing, is appreciated beyond words to express. This good work should be continued as far as consistent with the local demands on Doreas ministry.

For a number of months we have not urged the sending of bandages to interior mission stations in Africa, as we were informed that the shipments became lodged at our headquarters in Capetown, waiting for some means of getting them to the desired destination, which involves transportation by native carriers, long delays and heavy expense. Therefore it hardly seemed practical to urge the sending of shipments to Africa. But at present, the situation has changed, and we wish to bring the matter to the attention of all Dorcas Societies in North America, so they can begin to plan on making shipment to reach Capetown any time between now and the month of April, 1940.

Most of the bandages for Africa have been sent to Mrs. W. L. Davey, of the Luwazi Mission in Nyasaland. From a recent letter written by Sister Davy, we quote as follows:

"Mrs. Davy and I are to have our coastal leave at the end of 1939, and will be at Capetown until early May (1940). We are driving down, and our car has a box body, so there is room for extra parcels, and this will be a good opportunity for us to pick up any packages which may be waiting for us at the Cape. I am especially eager to get worn linens for dressings. Sheets, pillow cases, etc., which are not strong enough for bandages, make excellent dressings. It is true that cotton can be bought here at a price, but the softer used cottons are much preferred. The nurse at the Church of Scotland Mission tells me that they use linens sent from the home churches. The government dispensaries use gauze, but our missions cannot afford that. I have cut up just about everything I can get hold of for that purpose. I know that many of our churches in the homeland would be willing to send on a parcel now and then, if they understood the need here. Every scrap of material is treasured and used over and over again until it finally comes to shreds through repeated washings."

Sister Davy mentions also that paper patterns for dresses, slips, aprons, etc., are a great help in teaching the native girls how to sew and make garments. Anything in the line of stamped goods, with odds and ends of cottons for outline stitch and em-

broidery would also be appreciated. Brother and Sister Dayy are well known throughout the homeland, and we are sure that many Doreas Socicties will be glad to respond to this new call and make up a box of miscellaneous supplies. All shipments should be sent to Adelph Dorn, Eastern Transportation Agent, 30 Irving Place, New York, N. Y., and marked plainly-"Bandages for the Luwazi Mission-Hold at South African Division Headquarters until called for." Send by mail, express or freight to New York, but be sure that all transportation charges to that point are prepaid. Brother Dorn will send on to Africa without further charge.

A slip inside each box, giving name and address of the Dorcas Society sending the shipment, will make Sister Davy very happy and doubtless bring a personal acknowledgement; and one of her cheery letters, telling of the progress of the work at the Mission, also revealing her undaunted courage in spite of testing conditions, will be ample compensation to any Dorcas Society for united endeavors in rendering assistance along the line suggested.

Parents have ever needed divine counsel, for there is "no more important field of effort than that committed to the founders and guardians of the home. No work entrusted to human beings involves greater or more far-reaching results than does the work of fathers and mothers."— "Ministry of Healing," p. 351.

### The Strength of God's People

The integrity of the home has ever been the strength of God's people. Today, Israel again stands on the threshold of deliverance, and sons and daughters are called and dedicated to its accomplishment. For such a time as this God has multiplied His counsel. By the pen of inspiration, the Lord has sent His messenger to teach us.

All steps of childhood and youth present problems that challenge. "The tender years of childhood are years of heavy responsibility for fathers and mothers." —"Counsels to Teachers," p. 158.

"Great is the responsibility of those who take upon themselves the guidance of a human soul. The true father and mother count theirs a trust from which they can never be wholly released." —Education," p. 280.

The trying period of adolescence demands much of the home counsellors. This is a period when understanding, comradeship, association, activities, and wisdom must be whetted to a keen edge if the parents' work is to be crowned with success. For all these and many other responsibilities of parents there is inspiredinstruction for those who seek divine guidance.

'Happy are the parents whose lives are a true reflection of the divine, so that the promises and commands of God awaken in the child gratitude and reverence; the parents whose tenderness and justice and long-suffering interpret to the child the love and justice and long-suffering of God; and who, by teaching the child to love and trust and obey them, are teaching him to love and trust and obey his Father in heaven.
