"Sermon's in Stones; Beauty in Everything

The Nature Crafts Institute, which was held at Maplewood Academy, Hutchinson, Minnesota, August 7 to 17, afforded opportunity for the church school teachers and M. V. Society leaders in the union conference, to spend some time away from their routine duties in communion with God, with nature, and in training to help the young people in a practical way.

The crafts laboratory, where, under the direction of Mr. Stone from Union College, we learned to make things with our hands, was always a busy place, as instruction in various crafts formed an important part of our program. Instruction in leather, wood and metal crafts was appreciated by all, and many were the lessons of perseverance learned while hammering a piece of metal or braiding strands of leather!

Someone has remarked, and truly, "Blessed is he who has been apprenticed to a craft and taught to preach beauty with his hands."

On the opening evening of the institute, H. W. Clark of Pacific Union College, emphasized the importance of nature study by stressing the relationship voiced in the expression "Through nature to nature's God." And, surely, those of us who were privileged to spend ten days under with such nature students as Mr. Clark, Mr. Schilling, and Miss Brasier, felt that the purpose of the instruction was being realized. God seemed very near in the cool of the day as a small group waited silently at the edge of a lake, watching for birds. We heard His voice speaking to our hearts in the song of the birds, the symmetry of the trees, the perfection of the delicate flowers, the beauty of the fragile butterfly wings, and in the silent music of the stars at night.


Our eyes were opened. We saw that perhaps the reason why nature holds no appeal for many is that we too often try to preserve it by embalming it in a book, by studying about nature rather than studying nature itself.

We studied such statements as this from ''Counsels to Teachers'': ''While the Bible should hold the first place in the education of children and youth, the book of nature is next in importance." We recognized as part of God's program, the plan of leading the boys and girls to Him through nature—His works.

We were brought to a realization of the fact that a study of nature is not a substitute for the artificial pleasures of life, but rather that the artificial pleasures have become a substitute for nature, which is the real thing!

In a practical way our field trips taught us the truth of the statement that "By communion with God in nature, the mind is uplifted and the heart finds rest." And somehow, as we said good-bye to the Nature Crafts Institute, we felt inspired to carry into the highways and byways of the Middle-West, the gospel of nature, which is the gospel of Christ.


Going Forward
