Home Workers

Energetic Seventh-day Adventist gospel workers with a prompting desire to see their neighbors saved, will welcome the news that the Home Workers' books for 1939 are now available.

These books are especially adapted to meet the annual season's demand for character-building, health, and inspirational material. Each year thousands of dollars are spent on books to be given as Christmas gifts. Last year a large number of our church members sold hundreds of dollars worth of our books to meet this need.

Some found it advantageous to secure a set of books early and take orders for Christmas delivery. One sister said, "I never have sold any of our books, but they look so attractive I don't see how folks can keep from buying them. Can we take a selection of them, say a health book, Bedtime Stories, a Bible and a couple of Bible study books?" She sold over \$20.00 worth in her spare time. Another sister wanted some of the books for her own children, but couldn't afford to buy them. Obituaries

Thour.—A revered and esteemed member of the Minneapolis Swedish church, Mrs. Maria Thour, fell asleep in Jesus on Sunday, September 10, 1939. She was born in Varmland, Sweden almost ninety-one years ago. From her youth, she loved the Lord and always took pleasure in hearing

His Word preached. For this reason she early came in contact with our pioneers in Sweden at important spiritual gatherings in historic Orebre. In June, 1887, she and her family came to Minnesota. In 1891 she came in touch with Professor J. M. Erickson, Elders Hoffman and Norlin, and she and her daughter, Alma, were baptized in Lake Harriet at the Washburn Park Camp Meeting that same year. Her daughter, now Mrs. John Hedquist, was a Bible worker in the Minnesota conference a number of years and has for many years served as treasurer in our Swedish church. A grandson, Roland, is now connected with the Review and Herald. She leaves besides these two, a son, Paul, and nine grandchildren also eight great-grandchildren. Four of her grandsons helped to carry their grandmother to her last resting place in Crystal Lake Cemetery. Funeral services were held from the Sundseth Mortuary. A large congregation of friends and fellow believers attended.

Koeplin.—Wilhelm Koeplin was born September 22, 1868 and died in his home at Lehr, North Dakota, September 29, 1939, at the age of seventy-one years. In 1894 he came from Russia to the United States with his parents. After spending one year with them near Wishek, North Dakota, he was united in marriage with Fredericka Dollinger. To this union were born two sons and three daughters: Walter, of Windom, Minnesota; William of Mankato, Minnesota; Mrs. Emil Schield, Lehr, North Dakota; Mrs. Theodore Willaby, Bismarck, North Dakota; and Mrs. Lloyd Krein, Jamestown North Dakota. Besides these children, his widow, three sons-in-law, one daughter-in-law, three grandchildren, one sister, and one brother are left to mourn. In 1895 he gave his heart to God and joined the Evangelical church. In 1911 he joined the Baptist church, and in 1913, while Elder Seibel held meetings in Lehr, he joined the Seventh-day Adventist church. He loved the truth and was happy to accept the Sabbath. He was always glad to come to the church and hear the word of God preached. He was a good husband, father, brother in the church, and a good neighbor. He loved his Saviour and fell asleep in the hope of having a part in the first resurrection. A large number were present at the funeral services which were held in the Baptist church at Lehr, North Dakota. Words of comfort were spoken by Elder J. H. Seibel, who was also assisted by the writer.
