"So Shall Ye Prosper"

"Toward the close of Jehoshaphat's reign the kingdom of Judah was invaded by an army before whose approach the inhabitants of the land had reason to tremble. Jehoshaphat was a man of courage and valor. For years he had been strengthening his armies, and his fortified cities. He was well prepared to meet almost any foe; yet in this crisis he put not his trust in the arm of flesh." Prophets and Kings, p. 198.

The Bible record states that "Jehoshaphat feared, and set himself to seek the Lord, and proclaimed a fast throughout all Judah. And Judah gathered themselves together, to ask help of the Lord; even out of all the cities of Judah they came to seek the Lord." II Chron, 20:3,4.

Then there came a comforting message from the Lord, through the Spirit of prophecy, that the Lord would deliver His people.

Jahaziel, through whom this message came, said:

"Hearken ye, all Judah, and ye inhabitants of Jerusalem. Thus saith the Lord unto you, be not afraid nor dismayed by reason of this great multitude; for the battle is not yours, but God's." Verse 15.

"And Jehoshaphat bowed his head with his face to the ground: and all Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem fell before the Lord, worshipping the Lord." Verse 18.

As they went to the battle, "Jehoshaphat stood and said, Hear me, O judah, and ye inhabitants of Jerusalem; believe in the Lord your God, so shall ye be established; believe His prophets, so shall ye prosper." Verse 20.

This was heaven's recipe, heaven's sign of prosperity, and with this as their "battle song," they went forth to a great and mighty victory.

The Lord does not change, of Himself He says, 'I change not.' What was His sign of prosperity in the long ago, is still His sign of prosperity among His people.

For more than ninety years Seventh-day Adventists have claimed to have the gift of prophecy in their midst. From the pen of Ellen G. White, there has come to this people a series of testimonies for the church, numbering thirty-seven. These testimonies have been bound together and published in convenient form for the reader, in four bound volumes.

In these testimonies there has been given much instruction, reproof, and warning, that is vital to the church, especially in these closing days of the message.

With these timely messages published in convenient form for the reader, how can we be guiltless before God, if we fail to secure and read these precious volumes? We are admonished to "despise not prophesyings," I Thess. 5:20. One of the ways to despise these prophesyings is to allow them to remain upon the shelves of the publishing house, or the conference Book and Bible house.

The end is certainly very near. Events are rapidly taking place, filling in the last links of the great prophetic chains that were outlined twenty-five hundred years ago.

I have some twenty-five books in my library, written by Sister White. These books have been my daily companions, and oft-times when the enemy has "come in like a flood," I have found that "the Spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him." In the Testimonies, I have found at such times, just the help needed.

There surely has been "blitz" in our Harvest Ingathering campaign this year. By Friday, August 1, we had reached our super goal. At the time of this writing, August 5, we have in cash, here in the office, \$7,003. 62. More has been raised, which however has not as yet been sent to the office so that we are considerably over the super goal.

Every district has done well and now in each district an effort is made to have a good overflow. Elder M. F. Grau, for example, writes:

"The Harvest Ingathering district goal of \$760.00 was reached and passed this last week with a total of \$856.94. This lifts our amount raised by \$96.94 beyond our goal. In various places the church members are eager to make back calls, which should bring the district total to \$1000.00 when the work shall have been finished. At Golden Valley one brother seemed hardly able to realize that their church nearly doubled the goal this year, and so quickly. The Dunn Center brethren were all present yesterday at the Golden Valley church, where we had so many people present that extra chairs had to be secured. Brother Johnson and Brother Carlson were happy to report that they had gathered in funds by themselves in Dunn Center and Manning, which helped shorten the campaign and helped put Dunn Center over their \$100.00 goal with a total of \$141.25."

Other district leaders have written similar letters. There are many of our brethren and sisters who are making back calls where they did not find people at home, or where the people did not have the ready cash. Then, too, here and there they have a little territory which has not been completely worked and they are continuing to work until the territory shall have been entirely covered. This plan to work faithfully the entire territory will insure the North Dakota Conference a considerable overflow. Sixty per cent of the overflow will be retained in the conference for local work. We have a big evangelistic program, and this overflow will be a real help to us in carrying it into effect.
