Colombia Receives the Message

He found it necessary to spend the night with a mountaineer and his famly who became very friendly and hospitable. After supper, the missionary showed them beautiful pictures of Christ from the "Picture Roll," and this fam ly appreciated the pictures very much.

The missionary then took his Bible, and just as he opened it and started to read some of the precious promises found there, the lady ot the house slipped out the door and ran away. The husband tried to cover his eyes. Naturally, the missionary was surprised at this behaviour. A little later the husband said: "The priest taught us never to look at a Bible, for if we did so

Then, inquisitively, the man asked:"But, tell me, how is it that you have not lost your sight, nor had your hands burned for reading or touching the Book?" As the missionary placed h's Bible back in his satchel, the lady returned to the house. Then he explained to them how God truly blesses those who study and handle His word. In that area many others have been equally misinformed, and are buried in superstition.

amanga, Colombia, on March 15, 1947, he testified: "I have here with me today a convert from the mountains. This convert, Brother Munoz, not only accepted the truth and left superstition and darkness, but he has also become a successful colporteur and carries the message to many others in the Colombian mountains who are living under the same superstition as he was.

Twenty Sabbath schools were organized during 1946 in this section of Colombia by the colporteurs of the Upper Magdalena Mission. The people in these needy areas will benefit from your 13th Sabbath Offering. 

ship of Mrs. George Butler and Miss Clara May Stevens, set their goal at \$350.00. To date they have more than two hundred dollars, with no thought of stopping short of the goal. They feel that they can now double their goals. Reports from other schools are not in yet, but from the preceding reports one can see that our boys and girls in the church schools are being trained to be workers.

District No. 11 is located in the western part of Minnesota, and includes nine counties. An aviator from Morris, Minnesota, has recently discovered that we have close to 10,000 lakes in this district. The spring floods may have had a great deal to do with all the lakes that he saw below him while soaring through the air.

Although we have been in this district only about six months, we do find a good interest in some places, and a willingness on the part of our people to sacrifice and help finish the Lord's work in the earth. There has been a steady increase in tithe and offerings. The first two months of 1947 show an increase of over a thousand dollars in tithe and almost two hundred in offerings above the first two months of 1946.

We have sent out six thousand pieces of literature with invitations to enroll in the Bible correspondence course, and we hope and pray that many will answer God's call in this way.

We have two churches in the district located at Gilchrist and Artichoke, which have both passed the fiftieth anniversary since they were organized; and the Hancock-Morris church has been organized nearly that long.
