Elect a Church Press Secretary

To place Seventh-day Adventist church information properly before the public is one of the most vitally important lines of endeavor at this time. Our active church press secretaries are doing a service that cannot be measured in its influence for good. Due to their faithful efforts the Seventh-day Adventist church in many communities is becoming more favorably known. Prejudice is breaking, interests are developing, and the way is opening for the program of the church to make more rapid progress.

One report just received tells of a young man who read the news stories coming from the local Adventist church in his home city of about 8,000 population. As a result, "he made his first venture By J R. Ferren, Secretary Bureau of Press Relations

to our church," we are told. And for the past ten weeks he has been regularly attending Sabbath services and prayer meetings. He is studying our books, and evidently preparing himself for church membership. No wonder the leaders of this church "believe wholeheartedly in the press work."

We would earnetly urge the leaders of every church to definitely plan at the time of the annual election of officers to have a church press secretary. This is recommended by the General Conference, and hundreds of churches have adopted the plan and our work is benefiting from it. If you have an active

and able press secretary, our suggestion is to re-elect, recognizing that in press relations frequent changes are inadvisable. Continuity of service on the part of secretaries who have become proficient is recommended.

Newly elected press secretaries will be fully instructed and given opportunity to learn the work assigned. Every additional secretary becomes a link in a mighty chain of Seventh-day Adventist church publicity that is lengthening around the world. It isn't a question of the size of the church, or its location. We have remotely located churches, small in membership, whose live press secretaries are, through their nearest newspapers, bringing our work to thousands of families.

Union College Ingathering Day

One of the high lights of each school year has already occured at Union College. The day is always outstanding because it typifies the missionary spirit upon which the College of the Golden Cords is founded. The annual Ingathering field day provides a practical outlet for missionary zeal. This year a total of \$3,161.46, plus produce and clothing was the result of the day's labor. Twentyseven bands composed of nearly 300 students and faculty members traveled throughout the southeastern section of Nebraska to the neighboring towns. Members of

four of the bands were Union College Academy students. In addition, a number of students and faculty members remained on the campus and made personal contributions or worked and gave their earnings. A large number of students reached the individual minute-man goal of \$18.00.

A. J. Wearner, head of the religion department; E. E. Hagen, home missionary secretary of the Nebraska Conference; and Eugene Armour, senior ministerial student, were largely responsible for the efficient way in which the campaign was organized.


