Seventh-day Adventists have, through the years, been prolific writers, active publishers, and zealous distributors of truth-filled literature. They have recognized the importance of the printed page. Every member of the church was encouraged to distribute our literature like the leaves of autumn. As we near the end of time we should be even more zealous in this respect than were the pioneers, for Satan, realizing his time is short, will do all in his power to promote his subtle doctrines.

The trend, so far as the temperance issue is concerned, since the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, has been towards moderation. The liquor interests are promoting the idea that beer, wine and whisky, if taken moderately, will hurt no one and that only five per cent of those who drink excessively ever become alcoholics. If they do become alcoholics it is not due to the alcohol, but rather to their psychological or pathological make-up. These few are allergic to alcohol and should never drink. The vast majority of the people, they tell us, know how to handle their liquor.

This doctrine of moderation has permeated the rank and file of the people today, including many clergymen and prominent church leaders. The influence of the liquor interests can, therefore, be felt in many of the Christian churches today, and men engaged in the manufacture, the distribution, the sale, and the consumption of alcoholic beverages are members in good and regular standing and may even hold office in many of the leading churches.

We believe the time has come to launch a mighty revival of the temperance issue. Our new temperance journal, Listen, which presents the principles of temperance in a most attractive form, and which will serve as the Voice of the American Temperance Society, should be literally circulated like the leaves of autumn. It should be sent to every official. clergyman, physician, school superintendent, principal, teacher, judge, attorney, law-enforcement officer, prominent business man, and public library in the country.

children, and my mother and I were moved to tears of joy.

"Since 1946 my two children and I have been living with my mother here in western Germany. The boys are five and six years old. Their father is still in the occupied territory, but he must come to me because his health is poor. We were robbed of all our possessions and then driven from our house and property. As refugees, we have our daily struggle for existence and clothing. How great a help therfore was the contents of the package!

"At the present time, I am not able to work at my profession (registered nurse) since my children are too small, and my mother too ill to look after them. Since September 1948 the little son of my brother, who also lives in the occupied zone, has been here with me. The child suffered much because of undernourishment in that section. So I must supply the needs of three boys. But God's blessing has been over us so that we have something to put on our table each day.

"In closing this letter, I want to take opportunity of again thanking you, dear brother in Christ, for the great help and joy which you brought us. I wish you God's blessing in your heavy responsibilities, and greet you together with my loved ones."

The above is a fair sample of thousands of letters that have come to the General Conference, thanking the brethren and sisters who have been the means of sending food and clothing to those in need. It is hard to realize the magnitude of the suffering and want that has been well nigh universal in Europe, China, Korea, Japan, parts

A supplementary statement of expenditures in Europe from 1946 to 1948 is as follows: Germany, (all zones), Austria, Hungary, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Poland—a total of \$980,782.22, which represents a total of 3,845,848 pounds of food. Some of the principal articles of food purchased in overseas countries, particularly in Switzerland, Sweden and Denmark, and sent to the different countries were:

Other items include potatoes, prunes, raisins, soup meal, soy flour, dried fruits, etc., enough to make up a total of 3,845,848 pounds.

We must also add the CARE packages which total some \$525,-000.00. The General Conference has been a member of the CARE organization almost from its beginning. It was through this organization that we were first able to send relief to many of the countries of Europe. This is a non-profit corporation and has been the agent of sending millions of packages of food and clothing to the needy in Europe. Thousands of dollars have been contributed to the CARE organization with no definite address to whom distribution was to be made, but left with the CARE organization to send to the most needy. The General Conference, being a member of this agency, was allocated 4,318 packages, valued at \$47,682.00 of food and blankets in the last six months. The packages have been sent to our headquarters' offices in countries designated to benefit by this relief. The South American, Inter-American, Australian and Southern African Divisions have all contributed very liberally in money, food, and

The following is a brief report of the clothing shipped overseas to 41 countries and island groups—2,799,264 pounds. Included in these

The remaining countries each received less than 30,000 pounds. A very conservative estimate of the value of this new and used clothing would be \$2.00 per pound, or a grand total value of clothing sent from our warehouses, \$5,598,528.00.

In addition to the above mentioned gif's that have been sent through the General Conference, there have been tens of thousands of parcel post packages sent by churches, Dorcas societies, and private individuals. We do not have a record of the exact number of these gifts. Our brethren and sisters in providing these gifts surely are fulfilling the instruction. "Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh? Isaiah 58:6, 7; and also James' definition of true religion as given in James 1:27, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

Union College Week of Prayer

It was a thrilling experience to participate in the recent Week of Prayer conducted at Union College. The writer arrived on the campus on Friday, October 14, and immediately sensed the spiritual preparation and expectancy for this solemn week of serious thinking and reflection. For two weeks prior to the opening meeting, the students and facuty had been praying and preparing for the meetings. The students, especially, led out in exhorting each other not to let this special week pass by without gaining the promised victory over sin. One could not look into the earnest faces of the student body on that opening night and not realize that here was a body of youth that was different. Their demeanor, their vibrant singing, their attention to the preacher, their reverence during prayer-all this eloquently testified to the substantial training that the young men and women of Union College are receiving at the hands of their Christian teachers.

The week was made memorable by the large number of youth who dedicated their lives to God, many of them for the first time. It was sobering, yet heart-warming sight to witness hundreds of young men and women stepping up to the speaker's microphone to testify for Christ and their confidence in the truth of God. As they spoke for God in the presence of hundreds of their fellow-students and townspeople, one could not help sensing that here were some of the future leaders of God's cause and the youth that would help finish the work of God in the earth. For three consecutive nights the young people continued their testimonies, each meeting lasting well over three hours. The youth did not respond because of any emotional appeals, but simply because of a heartfelt conviction that the hour had arrived for the youth of the Advent Movement, and especially of Union College, to find a deeper experience in the things of God and to play a more vital part in the finishing of the work.

On the afternoon of Sabbath, October 22, the college gymnasium was packed to the doors for the final service of the Week of Prayer. Many were turned away from this service and it testified to the spiritual vitality of the school and the interest of its students in spiritual matters.

Besides conducting two public meetings for the entire student body each day, the writer met with one or two special groups daily for study and counsel. In addition to this, four hours each day were spent in consultation and prayer with individual students. It was in these private interviews that many students gained spiritual victories and started their closer walks with God. It was soul-inspiring to hear the students praying for their fathers and mothers, their family members, their teachers and fellow students. Oftentimes their prayers were accompanied by strong crying and tears. The Spirit of God witnessed to the dedication and rededication of these Christian youth by the definite resolutions and reforms which accompanied the dedications.

Repeatedly, the writer heard the following from the lips of those he interviewed: "I am happy to be attending Union College." "I appreciate the sacrifice that mother and dad are making in order for me to attend Union." "I wish my brother and sister could be here with me." "After attending Union, I could never go back to a worldly college." "Please pray that some of my friends back home can see their way clear to come to Union." "I thank God for the Christian teachers at Union who are interested in my spiritual welfare as well as my intellectual progress."

Upon hearing these and other such statements, the writer was convinced that the best days for Union College are still ahead. With such an army of youth, the work in the Central, Northern and Southwestern Unions should make tremendous strides. As the college students write home to the hundreds of youth who are not in school this year, it is easy to believe how they can be inspired to attend Union College the second semester. Union College is a good school, it is a spiritual school, it is the "city of refuge" for the youth of the Central, Northern, and Southwestern Unions. No matter what the sacrifices may be, none should absent themselves from the spiritual influence that "good old Union" imparts to those who walk in and out of its doors. Parents, ministers and church members should see to it that every youth of college age is registered in Union College by the time the second semester rolls around,

Without the hearty cooperation of President Woods, Elders Wearner, Welch, and Joyce, the sympathetic help and interest of every faculty member, the stirring and inspiring singing furnished by the choir and music department members under Professor Abel, the week's endeavor would not have produced the fruits it did.

To God be all the glory and praise for the hundreds of Union College students who renewed their walk with God and for the goodly number who are planning for baptism and rebaptism. Long may "old Union" continue to prepare young people for God's closing work on earth, and may it con-

tinue to receive the hearty support of those who live in its territory!
