FREEDOM

This brief article is written from the Free Territory of Trieste, at the head of the Adriatic Sea. I just arrived here on the Orient Express that runs between Paris, France, and Istanbul, Turkey.

I have just spent some days in a Police State. That term means little to Americans. It is largely a figure of speech to them. No free-born man can know what a Police State is until he has been there. The inhibitions and control and spying, the scarcities and incessant propaganda can be described, but the fears and apprehensions and depression can be realized only through experience.

Here in Trieste in the security of an American Army hotel and the abundance of a good dining room, I feel relieved—just as if I had suddenly been released from prison. It has taken only a day or two to adjust myself to personal freedom, to private enterprise, and to the abundance of food and clothing and household articles shown

in a thousand shop windows. But I can't think of anything else than what I've been through—what I've seen and heard and experienced—and most of all those dear souls I've left behind. They have had twelve years of mental and physical torture. I cannot say more!

Thank God for *our* freedom! When that is lost, everything most precious in this world is gone. Life means little then.

Thousands of Seventh-day Adventist young men, with many others, are giving of their all to help to preserve liberty and freedom and human decency in this evil world. Sabbath, June 21, an offering is to be received in all our churches to enable the denomination to keep in touch with our servicemen at home and overseas and to provide religious literature for them. I'm sure the offering will be a liberal one, for no cause is dearer to our hearts than the welfare of our boys in the service of God and country.

WILL KOREA PERISH?

On May 23 the General Conference Famine Relief Committee gave study to a number of items among which was the need of Korea. Because I recently spent a number of days in the land of Korea the committee asked me to

prepare an article for the union conference papers.

Never have I seen such a devastated land. Korea needs pity and help. I traveled from the southernmost end of Korea up to Seoul and then beyond the 38th parallel up

to the iron triangle at Choryong. North of Seoul I did not see one single house. Everything has been laid low. I saw orphan children by the hundreds. I saw refugees on the roads by the thousands—all trying to go somewhere, but where is

there to go? Most of our own people have lost everything they ever possessed. The farmer has had his home destroyed, his oxen have been killed, and he is coming back to dig his field by hand this spring, so he can plant a few things by which he might live this coming winter.

Korea's people are fighting for survival against the terrible conditions through which they have passed and are passing. They fight against desperate odds, hunger, disease, and sudden death by violence; they are struggling and praying for enough clothing and enough shelter to cover themselves. The very existence of these people depends on whether they receive help in time. It's the difference between death and life. These Koreans must not be forgotten. They must receive help.

We have just received word from the CARE company that packages can now be sent to institutional addresses in Korea. CARE has offered packages containing materials that we know are greatly needed at the present time. The food packages cost \$10, and contain eleven different items. We have studied the list, and we think they are very good items. There is another package for \$7.00. It contains dress print, cotton suiting, thread, needles, soap, etc. These things would be very helpful to the Korean people this summer.

We believe many of our people would like to send one or more of these packages. If you will send to James F. Cummins, General Conference Treasury Department, either \$10 or \$7 for one of these packages it can be sent at once to our office in Pusan or Seoul and thus be distributed to our people. We know that many of our people will welcome this opportunity of sharing with our Korean people, so we are writing this article with the hope that many of our people who have food to eat and to spare will be glad to pay for one package or more to be sent to Korea to feed the hungry.

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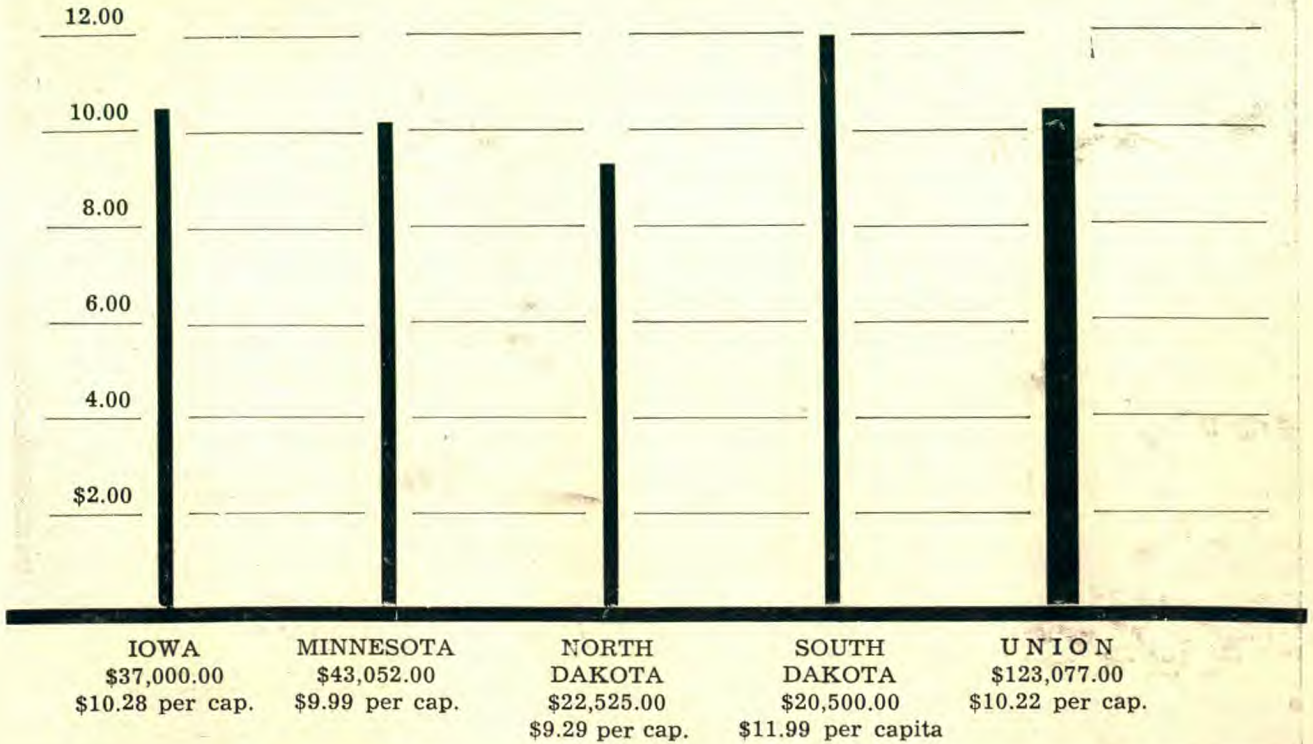

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Wanted: Access to Copy Of 1863 Prophetic Chart

The manuscript of Volume IV of *The Prophetic Faith of Our Fathers* is now in completed form, and the illustrations are being prepared. One outstanding illustration not yet available is the James White prophetic chart of "1863," pictured in M. E. Olson's *Origin and Progress of Seventh-day Adventists*, page 234. We have the pamphlet, *Key to the Prophetic Chart (1864)*, but need access to a clear copy of an original chart for the wording and for photographing—hence this appeal. Colleges, churches, publishing houses, retired workers, and pioneer workers' decedents, will you not make search and see if you have it?

Here is a description: The symbols of Daniel are at the upper left, and the 2300 year diagram on the upper right. The three angels, followed by the coming of Christ on the clouds, appear at the lower left; while the prophetic symbols of Revelation are on the right. The sanctuary, with its two apartments, is at the lower center, and the inscription or title of the chart is in the lower right corner. This apparently reads, "A Pictorial ——— of the Visions of Daniel and John," with the remaining information about the publisher or lithographer at Boston, and the date, not legible on the photograph in our possession.

C., and arrangement will be made for its safe transmission and return, or for a local photographer to make a good negative for us. Your help in locating a copy will be greatly appreciated.

Retrospect of Union College For the School Year of 1952

The school year of 1951-1952 has been an excellent one. Progress has been made in many respects. The students have manifested a deep interest in the missionary activities of the college. In a recent report received, the number of persons engaged regularly in missionary projects was 435. As the result of the missionary activities, a number of persons receiving Bible studies was 246.

The total enrollment for the school year was 788. Including the summer graduates of last year, the senior class numbered 112. All but nine that desired placement have been placed, and five of these have possibilities of being placed in the near future. Up to date, 643 Golden Cords have been hung for alumni who have gone to foreign fields. From this year's graduating class four are entering mission service: Bobby Roberts will go to South America to take up evangelistic work; Marian Zummach, to Kenya, East Africa, as teacher; Novella McWilliam and Agnes Verdell Wall as secretaries in the Inter-American Division.

The students of Union College raised \$278.85 for the Antillian Junior College to help buy necessary equipment.

Several of the faculty members are doing advanced work this summer. J. Wesley Rhodes is taking work at Columbia University, New York City; A. V. Wallenkampf is at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary and will be returning in September to his duties at the school; Robert Reynolds is working on the completion of his master's degree. The following faculty members are working on their doctorate degrees: Douglas Brown, L. W. Welch, R. K. Nelson, V. G. Logan, Neil Rowland, R. E. Firth, and E. R. Maas.

"Survival Through Faith" Rallies

"Double our membership in four years." This was one of the primary objectives set before us at the General Conference in San

Francisco in 1950. To do this, we have been exhausting every avenue for creating interest. One of the new methods that is being used throughout North America is one-night "Survival Through Faith" rallies.

The plan is to hold one-night rallies in every city of 5,000 or more population. All persons who are known to have shown any interest in the work of Seventh-day Adventists are invited to attend the rally. These include Bible Correspondence School interest, Voice of Prophecy radio interests, persons who are taking our periodicals, as well as neighbors, friends, and relatives.

This plan has been tried in five representative cities in Iowa: Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Mason City, Des Moines, and Sioux City. These cities were chosen as "trial" cities because we all felt that we were moving in a new direction, and we had to feel our way carefully.

Different-sized halls were chosen. They varied from a school assembly room at Burlington, to the city auditorium at Sioux City. Various types of advertising were used. Chief of these was letters sent directly to the persons who knew about Seventh-day Adventists.

The response from the public varied from city to city. We hope as we continue these rallies in the various cities of Iowa, that our people will bring their friends and neighbors.

Robert M. Whitsett from the General Conference Ministerial Association, was the speaker at these rallies. Many non-Adventists felt very keenly the appeal of the Lord to their hearts. A large number of persons enrolled in the Bible Correspondence School while even more asked for literature on the subject of the evening.

The effect of these meetings will be far-reaching and as we continue them in the conference, many souls will find their way to God.

OBITUARY

BARCUS.—Besse Mae McComas was born at Lexington, Iowa, September 2, 1884, and died on May 16, 1952 at her home in Los Angeles, California. She was the youngest of six children of Thomas J. and Mary McComas, pioneer Seventh-day Adventists. When the Iowa Conference opened its first academy at Stuart, Iowa, Bess, as she was commonly known to her friends, was among the first year students. Later she was a student at Union College, and then took up nurses' training at the Iowa Sanitarium. In 1909 she was united in marriage with J. E. Barcus, at Nevada, Iowa. For over twenty years Bess labored with her husband, in evangelistic work and in connection with some of our larger educational institutions. Since 1932 she has resided in California. She was a tireless worker, and if one was in need, she was there to lend a hand, do a washing or ironing, or help the sick. In her church activities, she had through the years occupied every position in the Sabbath school and church that a woman can hold. Many times she worked the whole night through that the Dorcas society might be ready for some special occasion. She had a jovial disposition, and her hearty laugh was often referred to by

her friends. She is survived by her husband, an only son, Leroy K., with his wife, and two grandsons of Orangevale, California; two brothers: Harry McComas of Dows, Iowa, and Elder J. W. McComas of Inglewood, California; and one sister, Mrs. Berniece Elliott of Los Angeles. At the time of her death she was a member of the Florence Avenue Seventh-day Adventist church. She went to sleep with a strong confidence that she would have a part in the first resurrection. Memorial services were conducted on May 24 by Gideon D. Hagstotz, pastor of the Florence Avenue church, Lyndon E. Taylor, and K. C. Holman, and interment was made in the Forest Lawn Memorial Park. G. D. Hagstotz.
