

In this work it happens frequently if we will but follow up openings and leads. Only people can be taken into heaven with us. Houses, lands, cars, all the new appliances must be left behind. The only true joy is one with a lasting flavor, and this I call winning souls. This is what has kept me in the work these many years. I intend to keep on with it to the best of my ability until I look up and see my Saviour. To young men wanting a career with all of the bene-

This is the call of God to His people for full-time literature evangelists. I can personally testify that this call is very real and urgent when it comes. I attended a

E. D. SORENSEN colporteur symposium back in 1942 right after my baptism, where I heard a young girl student-canvasser tell how God had blessed her with such good sales one week end and held back a terrible windstorm long enough for her to ride safely on her bicycle to her headquarters in the next town. She heard later of the terrible damage of the storm in the town she had just worked.

"How wonderful," I thought, "to be engaged in a work in which God takes a deep and guiding interest." And so it was that I dedicated my life in full-time service as a literature evangelist in 1944, and my dedication has paid me richly. In addition to delivering thousands of dollars worth of books for my Master, and making a comfortable living for my family, I can count six-

teen souls baptized as a result of my work; and that is not all, the Lord has led me to a place of leadership as publishing department secretary and last summer at campmeeting time to be ordained to the ministry as well.

In our field for the past five years we have had two men whom we helped to succeed in the work and who decided to dedicate their fulltime to this wonderful house-tohouse soul-winning ministry. They are Dick Chapman and U. L. Litsey. Brother Litsey delivered more books during eight months of 1954 than any literature evangelist North Dakota has ever had with a delivery of \$7200. These two men were so successful here that other conferences solicited their services and now both have been called to California where threy are continuing their life's work with excellent success. Both men say they may likely return here some day but we need men and women to take their places. Happily the need is being met and David Spaulding of California has already to become a full-time worker for us: also Paul Zabolotney of Ruso and three other men are also thinking along these lines.

Read Brother Litsey's experience and if you feel an urge to do more for the Master why not try the literature evangelist work full time?

H. E. PRESTON spare only 10 or 15 hours per week from their homes while their children are at school. Some are men who have full time employment with considerable time free in the late afternoon and evening.

Such individuals can exert a positive influence for God and bring to many the last gospel message for this world in printed form. Probably I appreciate this kind of work especially because it was a small book which I purchased in this way which brought me the Sabbath truth.

There is another group whom I must also mention. They are aging and otherwise physically handicapped. Often they are strong enough to work only a few hours a day but God sustains them with a special measure of strength. Through their ministry new interests are developing, backsliders are being brought into contact with the church and interested people are being instructed in the Bible.

No one class of workers alone nor all but one class of workers will fulfil God's design for His work. It will take all classes of workers and there is urgent and tremendous need for more part-time literature evangelists to carry the message quickly to the nooks and corners of the field where public evangelists and full-time literature evangelists can not go.

I find that I have my best experience after I tell the people that I am a Seventh-day Adventist. They bought books and gladly signed for the free Bible Course. 
