

Religious Liberties Might Be Quickly Withdrawn

We have recently seen demonstrated in the United States Congress how pressure can be exerted from a combination of certain religious and political interests. A religio-political maneuver resulted in a surprise action taken only a few hours before the adjournment of Congress last July, whereby the United States Government agreed to pay more than \$8,000,000 in claims to Catholic schools and religious orders in the Philippine Islands.

It should be noted that these claims, based upon food and services furnished to the Americans during the 1944 liberation campaign of the Islands, had previously been rejected under the War Claims Act of 1948, refused on two different occasions by the War Claims Commission, and more recently by its successor, the Foreign Service Settlement Commission.

Perhaps the point of greatest interest in this case, however, was the procedure followed in the passage of the bill making this appropriation possible. Protests had been made by important and influential organizations, by a number of church groups, and scores of individuals, to the proposed legislation. The protests contended that the bill was a gross violation of the principle of separation of church and state, and revealed rank discrimination by giving the lion's share of the proposed payments to one particular church. Despite these

protests, and only six hours after an announcement had been made by the Senate Judiciary Committee to the effect that there would not be sufficient time before adjournment of the Senate to consider this particular measure, the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee obtained the Senate floor and announced that the Committee was ready to report the bill. On the last day of the session, shortly after the Senate convened, the Chairman of the Committee o b t a i n e d unanimous consent from the Senate to suspend the rules and file the bill. The bill

was called from the calendar and passed without debate. Then, despite further protests to the President, the bill was promptly signed by the Chief Executive and became law.

In the light of such actions we are reminded of how we have been told that, "The professed Protestant world will form a confederacy with the man of sin, and the church and the world will be in corrupt harmony." General Conference Bulletin, 1891, p. 257.

Again we read:

"The dignitaries of church and state will unite to bribe, persuade, or compel all classes to honor the Sunday. The lack of divine authority will be supplied by oppressive enactments. Political corruption is destroying love of justice and regard for truth; and even in free America, rulers and legislators, in order to secure public favor, will yield to the popular demand for a law enforcing Sunday observance. Liberty of conscience, which has cost so great a sacrifice, will no longer be respected." Great Controversy, p. 592.

The messenger of the Lord has told us to "arouse and come to the front. Be staunch to defend your religious liberty." Mrs. E. G. White, Review and Herald, January 1, 1889.

Help for New Church Schools

Recently the Northern Union Committee voted to help in the establishment of new church schools in our area. This word will come as a great encouragement to many of our churches who do not have the blessing of a Christian school in their midst.

The following is the action: "Voted, to appropriate 20 per cent of the teacher's salary the first year a school is established and 10 per

cent the second year of operation of said school, with the understanding no school has been in operation for at least three years prior to this period and that the school have at least six students from more than one family. It is understood that the local conference join in this by appropriating 30 per cent of the teacher's salary the first year and 25 per cent the second year. This plan would make it possible for a school to receive half the teaching salary expense the first year and 35 per cent the second year."

This means that the church establishing a new school next September would receive help from the Union Conference and an unusually high subsidy from the local conference the first and the second year. Many of our churches should plan now for the establishment of Christian education for their children this coming autumn.

Those churches which wish to take advantage of this rare opportunity should get in touch with their local educational superintendent and begin laying plans for a new school.

Please consider these instructions as given by Mrs. E. G. White:

"Upon every Christian parent there rests the solemn obligation of giving to his children an education that will lead them to gain a knowledge of the Lord." Counsels to Teachers, p. 205.

"And as believers are raised up, and churches organized, such a school will be found of great value in promoting the permanence and stability of the work. Workers in new territory should not feel free to leave their field of labor till the needed facilities have been provided for the churches under their care. Not only should a humble house of worship be erected, but all necessary arrangements should be made for the permanent establishment of the church school. This matter has been plainly presented before me." Testimonies, vol. 6, p.

"The schoolroom is needed just as much as the church building. The Lord has persons to engage in the work of establishing church schools as soon as something is done to prepare the way." *Testimonies*, vol. 6, p. 109.

By God's help, let's make 1957 what it should be. Let's do "this one thing."







Ingathering Experiences

There are many experiences that might be given from our recent caroling Ingathering program. Today I will list just a few. I have a very interesting letter here from V. W. Emmerson. 
