Many other items were discussed at the meeting such as evangelism, (Continued on page 8)


Greetings—Little Boys and Girls

Turner will conduct the four classes in the Revelation. Murray W. Deming is the director of the Field Evangelism group. Lowell W. A number of "visiting professors," experienced workers living and visiting in Lincoln, will be called in from time to time in several of these classes.

All the Religion courses will be under way beginning on February 3. Hundreds of Union College students will study the Bible, the Spirit of prophecy materials, the history of the church in the past, and the problems and projects of the church in the future.
