7. The daily sharing of truth through the King's Pocket League.

"Let the neglected tithes be now brought in. Let the new year open upon you as men honest in their deal with God. Let those that have withheld their tithes send them in before the year 1896 shall close, that they may be right with God, and never, never again run any risk of being cursed of God.... Elders of churches, do your duty. Labor from home to home, that the flock of God shall not be remiss in this great matter, which involves such a blessing or such a curse.... Every man who bears the message of truth to our churches, must do his duty by warning, educating, rebuking. Any neglect of duty which is a robbery toward God, means a curse upon the delinquent." *Testimonies to Ministers*, p. 306, 307.

8. The Bible Correspondence School enrollment opportunity offered to every person in your church missionary territory.

9. A rural mailing literature program to contact homes in unentered counties.

10. The active sponsoring of the objective: No Sunday night blackout in your church.

11. The placement of tract racks in strategic places.

12. The holding of classes; first aid, home nursing, healthful cookery.

13. The loaning of the special missionary book of the year.

14. The follow-through of interests: visitation contacts, Bible Correspondence school students, radio and telecast, colporteurs.

May the first Sabbath of this new year be a "blowing of trumpets" with your enrollment in missionary service and your planning of a Bible Evangelism project this month.

In many fields the winter months — when people enjoy their homes and firesides, present an uninterrupted season for Bible evangelism. Let these months be dedicated to teaching the last Message.

## Eighty-nine Per Cent Completed



A news story concerning the arrival of Elder and Mrs. Dinwiddie will appear soon.





Remain not in a position where you ever need help yourself, and where others have to guard you to keep you in the narrow way. You may be strong to exert a sanctifying influence upon others. You may be where your soul's interest will be awakened to do good to others, to comfort the sorrowful, strengthen the weak, and to bear your testimony for Christ whenever opportunity offers. Aim to honor God in everything, always and everywhere. Carry your religion into everything. Be thorough in whatever you undertake." (p. 261, 262)

"God bids you become a worker with Him in His vineyard. Commence just where you are. Come to the cross and there renounce self, the world, and every idol. Take Jesus into your heart fully. You are in a hard place to preserve consecration and to exert an influence which shall lead others from sin and pleasure and folly to the narrow way, cast up for the ransomed of the Lord to walk in.

"Make an entire surrender to God;

yield up everything unreservedly, and thus seek for that peace which passes understanding. You cannot draw nourishment from Christ unless you are in Him. If not in Him, you are a branch that is withered. You do not feel your want of purity and true holiness. You should feel an earnest desire for the Holy Spirit and should pray earnestly to obtain it. You cannot expect the blessing of God without seeking for it..." (p. 263.)

"Those who have trained the mind to delight in spiritual exercises are the ones who can be translated and not be overwhelmed with the purity and transcendent glory of heaven. You may have a good knowledge of the arts, you may have an acquaintance with the sciences, you may excel in music and in penmanship, your manners may please your associates, but what have these things to do with a preparation for heaven? What have they to do to prepare you to stand before the tribunal of God?

"Be not deceived. God is not mocked. Nothing but holiness will prepare you for heaven. It is sincere, experimental piety alone that can give you a pure, elevated character, and enable you to enter into the presence of God, who dwelleth in light unapproachable. The heavenly character must be acquired on earth, or it can never be acquired at all. Then begin at once. Flatter not yourself that a time will come when you can make an earnest effort easier than now. Every day increases your distance from God. Prepare for eternity with such zeal as you have not yet manifested. Educate your mind to love the Bible, to love the praver meeting, to love the hour of meditation, and, above all, the hour when the soul communes with God. Become heavenly-minded if you would unite with the heavenly choir in the mansions above.

"A new year of your life now commences. A new page is turned in the book of the recording angel. What will be the record upon its pages? Shall it be blotted with neglect of God, with unfulfilled duties? God forbid. Let a record be stamped there which you will not be ashamed to have revealed to the gaze of men and angels." (p. 267, 268)

### "Good Measure, Pressed Down... And Running Over!"

This expresses the experience of the Baker-Misenko evangelistic team in their two public efforts, one in each of their respective districts.

For many years no public work has been done in St. Cloud. We thrilled for the people who attended! Men and women from all walks of life came to listen to the preaching of God's word. From out of such God has presented a choice number for gleaning.

Following St. Cloud the church at Rochester was ready with its doors open for public evangelism. Don Burgeson joined the Baker-Misenko team and rendered valuable service. The attendance varied, with a definite increase toward the close of the meetings. Here, as in St. Cloud, the people who attended were of a distinctly fine class, such who would render a marked influence and service to the church.

It was wonderful to find interspersed throughout our visits at non-Adventist homes a reverent reflection upon some Adventist individual. While this particular passage is

addressed to the ministry, the church membership is likewise instructed:

"Not upon the ordained minister only rests the responsibility of going forth to fulfill the commission. Every one who has received Christ is called to work for the salvation of his fellow-men." Acts of the Apostles, p. 110.

"That any one can be saved in indelence and inactivity is an utter impossibility." *Colporteur Evangelist*, p. 38.

And for what purpose are both preachers and laymen called?

"The present world is designed as a scene of probation for man. He is here to form a character which will pass with him into the eternal world.

... The great sacrifice has been made for man, and now he will be tested and proved to see if he would follow the example of Jesus, and make a sacrifice for his fellow-man." *Testimonies*, vol. 1, pp. 196, 197.

Herein lies the blessing and success of all evangelism! We have witnessed the opening of doors and hearts in abundance, "good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over." It is now the privilege and responsibility of the church, ministry, and laymen, to garner in, that its own membership be spiritually made strong, that the church be pure, that Divine power may attend, that the work be finished, and then, that the Lord may come.


