The Bible Versus Communist Literature

Many friends of the American Bible Society have been distressed by the claim that the works of Communist writers have outstripped the Bible as a best seller. The Bible Society has learned, through the Library of Congress, that according to Russian sources, more than 1,000 editions of the Communist Manifesto (usually of about 25 pages) had been published from 1848 to 1952 in 77 languages. Also that of the works of Marx and Engels, Lenin and Stalin over a billion copies in 101 languages were published from 1917 to 1954.

What about the Bible? From 1917 to 1957 the American Bible Society distributed 393,246,474 volumes. To this should be added the distribution of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which was somewhat larger than that of the American Bible Society, and of other Bible Societies.

In addition, there are the commercial Bible publishers, who do not make public their figures. While there is little Bible publishing by such concerns in languages other than English, French, German, Greek and Hebrew, the number of Bibles issued each year by the Oxford and Cambridge University Presses and the Bible printers in this country and Great Britain is very considerable. The total would certainly be a billion and a half. So that even for a period from 1917 to 1957 it would still appear to be true that the Bible "out-published" Communistic literature.

Furthermore, the Bible was being printed nearly 500 years before 1917. and parts of it had already appeared in more than 750 languages and dialects. In addition to the actual Bible

A minister's wife from New York had gone shopping with two overseas leaders and she told us that they saw so many things they would have liked to take back to their wives but they did not have the money with which to buy them. Later, as they walked into the Welfare Depot, I noted a small paper sack in the hand of one of these men and I was curious as to what might be in the bag. I soon learned that the sack contained a few bars of toilet soap, the price of which is almost prohibitive in their country. They were very pleased to have a few bars to take home with them. Isn't it strange that the things we take for granted here are so precious to those in need? The sack of soap was carefully placed in the center of the bundle of clothing and bedding. As these workers left the Welfare Depot a prayer went with them, and we at the Depot felt that the time spent with these brethren was precious and had brought a real blessing to our souls. Since these workers visited the warehouse, permission has been granted to send a shipment to their Union Mission. and at the present time ten tons of clothing and bedding are on their way to that needy field.

Many volunteer workers spend hours in the Welfare Warehouse in New York sorting, folding, and baling material for overseas shipments. A short time ago, some of these helpers lived across the ocean and had to flee from their homes leaving everything behind. They know how to sympathize with the needy overseas. Many of our people are living in refugee camps and reports coming back to us indicate they really appreciate the gifts of clothing. They thank God that others care for them so much that they are willing to share with them.

The Eastern Welfare depot personnel wishes to thank all who have sent shipments and those who have so kindly spent hours of volunteer work in the warehouse that this wonderful phase of God's work for the needy may continue. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

As you bring your offering for Disaster and Famine Relief on Sabbath, May 9, remember it will help to continue and expand this work of relief and this ministry of mercy.

"Fiery" Mission in Spite of Flu

With each passing month our Dorcas workers and pastors are becoming more conscious of the needs and blessings of being ready to step in with immediate aid to families that have lost all through a burn-out. Because of the alertness of pastor and Dorcas society the following report from Percy Lamb was possible in spite of the fact that their clothing supply had been depleted due to the recent shipment of a van load of clothing from Minnesota to the east coast warehouse.

"And this morning I had the flu for sure! . . . The FLU, I mean! But I had to go out even though sick. For Friday night we had a big burn-out at Basswood. A family that lives about a mile from the Basswood church burned out; and when I drove by yesterday afternoon it was still smoldering. The family was related to folks in the Basswood church, so we decided to get help from Detroit Lakes. Basswood is doing all it can, but so are we from here.

"I was too sick to drive, but Josephine, my daughter who is learning and has such a permit, drove. Our Dorcas leader, also sick with the flu, went along. We took blankets, bedding, and one coat. The leader took measurements of the man, woman, and the 15-year-old daughter. Tomorrow our folk will take more things out there. We had just sent off all the clothing we had for overseas, and last week there was a burnout in Frazee that we cared for, so we did not have much left. Our Dorcas gets to work and helps. They show a marvelous spirit."


OBITUARY

text must be added the vast volume
of Christian literature. The fact,
however, that the Communists put
out a great deal of printed matter,
often very attractively produced and
priced, in many languages and in
many parts of the world, continues
to be a great challenge which must
be met by the Christian community
through the worldwide program of
the great Bible Societies of the world.

Some published statements referring to yearly publications so far inaccurately reflect the actual situation for the "Index Translationum," issued annually by UNESCO, lists publications only that are reported to it by national bibliographical services. Such publications by the Bible Societies have not hitherto een adequately reported, so that Cuture editions of the "Index" will more accurately reflect the true picture. So far, the Bible Society knows of no other book that has been published, even in part, in more than 1,100 languages and dialects.



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
