Yesterday the Northern Union Conference committee met and reviewed the progress of the work in the local and union conferences for the year 1960. Surely we can say "Amen" to the blessings of the Lord when we realize that the total tithe for the year amounted to \$1,453,-870.31, an increase of more than \$87,000.00 over the tithe receipts for 1959.

In addition to this \$460,957.81 was received for regular missions offerings. This brings the total to nearly \$2,000,000.00 given by our people for the work of God not only in the local conferences but also in the uttermost parts of the earth. How thankful we can be, brethren, that we belong to such a movement that we know is reaching out with the printed page, the spoken word, and the instruments of radio and television to touch the hearts of people and bring them into the knowledge of this truth.

We are also happy to report to you that 519 individuals were added to the church by baptism and profession of faith-519 members is a good-sized church to be added to our union membership, which now stands at 12,742.

Plans for increased laymen's ac-

tivity, for greater end avor in public and personal evangelism by the ministry, for intensified programs by every department should indicate a definite increasing momentum in the activity of the work of the Lord in our union for 1961.

We pray that God will continue to bless our people as they return their tithes and offerings to the Lord, as they go out to visit their neighbors and friends, and as they live consecrated lives before their fellowmen everywhere, for "this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come," Matthew 24:14.

As the World Seeks Peace

"Psychiatrist Found Hanged" these were the words of a headline in a recent morning newspaper. The article that followed stated that this man had held the rank of numberone psychiatrist, a top authority. As I read this account of a man who had studied the workings of the human mind, and who had important degrees after his name, I thought of the 8,000,000 alcoholics and addicted drinkers in the United States. ninety-five per cent of whom are among the average or intellectual group of our country.

The wisdom of this world does not satisfy the deeper longings of the heart. We are told in the book Temperance, p. 132: "Lift up Jesus, crying, 'Behold, the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sin of the world!' John 1:29, A.R.V. He alone can satisfy the craving of the heart, and give peace to the soul." (Italics supplied.)

God has entrusted us with a knowledge of His saving grace in a world where men and women everywhere are seeking to satisfy the deeper longings of the heart by so-called pleasure instigated by Satan, the destroyer of souls. These intemperate habits of using stimulants or depressants are universal, from the devil worshipers in Borneo to the Christian nations of the Western Hemisphere.

In regard to tobacco, a stimulant, Mrs. White states: "Multitudes have fallen victims to its poisonous in-

fluence. They have surely murdered themselves by this slow poison." Ibid., p. 57.

She also states, "Strong drink is regarded by many as the only solace in trouble"; then adds this sobering thought: "But this need not be, if, instead of acting the part of the priest and Levite, professed Christians would follow the example of the good Samaritan." Ibid., p. 127.

Yes, God has entrusted to us a knowledge of His saving grace. In a world that is made insensible to the gospel through intemperance, "publications upon health reform will reach many who will not see or read anything upon important Bible subjects. The gratification of every perverted appetite is doing its

work of death. Intemperance must be met. With united, intelligent effort make known the evils of beclouding the powers that God has given, with wine and strong drinks. The truth must come to the people upon health reform. This is essential in order to arrest the attention in regard to Bible truth. . .

"Many of those looked upon as hopelessly depraved, will, if properly instructed in regard to their unhealthful practices, be arrested with the truth. Then they may be elevated, ennobled, sanctified, fit vessels for the Master's use. Go with your hands full of proper reading matter, and your heart full of the love of Christ for their souls, reaching them where they are," Ibid., pp. 251, 252.

"I feel distressed as I look upon our people and know that they are holding very loosely the temperance question. . . We should be at the head in the temperance reform." Ibid., p. 233.

"From the light God has given me, every member among us should sign the pledge and be connected with the temperance association." Ibid., p. 220.

What a challenge as February 25, the Commitment Day, draws near! In a world that is slowly committing suicide, shall we sit idly by and do nothing for another year, or will we give strong support to this important entering wedge of the third and last angel's message to a dying world?

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#### **Food Companies Merge**

In the last 10 years, annual sales have more than doubled. During 1960, sales reached an all-time high and the sales force was increased to 11 full-time salesmen.

Late in 1960, Worthington Foods continued its growth with the purchase of Battle Creek Food Company (once a denominational enterprise, now back in Adventist hands). The Battle Creek Food Company is presently operated as a division of Worthington Foods. Battle Creek names, trademarks, labels, formulas, recipes and processes will be continued so that customers may still buy the products they have come to expect and enjoy.

The purchase of Battle Creek Food Company, founded by Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, represents the combining of Battle Creek's 91 years of experience with Worthington Foods' 22 years of aggressive research in the fields of health and nutrition

Worthington Foods now manufactures and distributes 45 products as compared to 25 products in 1959. Some of the products Worthington Foods has been known for include: Choplets, Soyamel, Patties, Big Pats, Veja-Links, and Fry Sticks. In the Battle Creek line, there are such well known brand names as Protose, Nuttose, Vegetable Steaks, and Skallops.

It is interesting to note that Protose is possibly the first product of its kind commercially manufactured. Dr. W. C. Dabney, the founder of Cincinnati University, asked Dr. Kellogg to prepare a substitute for meat and it was Protose that Dr. Kellogg first created.

Besides Company warehouses. Worthington Foods has wholesale distributors representing them in a number of principal cities such as New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Tulsa, Chattanooga, Washington D. C., and other cities.

Worthington Foods plans to con-

tinue publishing quarterly the Chopletter, the first issue of which was published in April, 1948. The Chopletter is mailed free to those interested in health and nutrition information and in new recipes.

While the Company is privately owned and operated, its ownership and management lie in the hands of Seventh-day Adventists. All Company objectives, policies, and procedures have been established in harmony with sound Seventh-day Adventist principles.

#### OUR COMMITMENT FOR GOD

When I boarded the night train to Washington, D.C., dusk was falling around the Chicago area. I noted a young woman, probably in her mid-twenties, lying across the seat assigned to me. Depositing my luggage, I washed up, then came back. She looked tired.

Suddenly she started. "I'm sorry! I\_"

"That's all right," I said. "I was just debating whether or not to awaken you." We talked for a time about subjects of special interest to young people. Then she told me her story. She had married young a man twice as old as she was.

"He drinks all the time," she continued. "So we're getting divorced as soon as the proper time has elapsed." She spoke with no emotion in her voice-only finality.

"Then what will you do?" I asked. "I don't know. I'm not even sure where I'm going." She excused her-

self shortly and left. When she came

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back several hours later, she had alcohol on her breath.

"You've been drinking?" I asked her.

Her lids grew heavy, and her head nodded. "It's a weak out," she murmured, "but it doesn't hurt so much this way."

She slept. I left her—a small bundle in her fitted purple suit. We were in Washington.

I often wonder whether the young woman I met on the train that night ever reached her destination. I wonder, too, if she found that which she was so desperately seeking—a bit of happiness. Pitifully, many of our youth today, as well as many adults, are groping for but not finding happiness in our complex age. Instead, many turn to habits of intemperance in their frustrations.

With stories like this becoming commonplace in today's society, what can we do to help our fellow citizens? One concrete suggestion comes from the Spirit of prophecy: "From the light God has given me, every member among us should sign the pledge and be connected with the temperance association." *Temperance*, p. 197.

In doing this, we not only pledge ourselves (1) to abstain from all alcoholic beverages and tobacco, but also (2) to do all we can to prevent others from falling prey to these habits; and (3) to lead those who are already victims back to the better way of life. This is our commitment to God.

Membership in the American Temperance Society will assure the privilege of receiving and distributing such lively temperance publications as *Smoke Signals* and *Listen*.

For community distribution on Sabbath afternoon of Commitment Day, February 25, there has been prepared a special pamphlet entitled "Just a Human Statistic." Authored by Francis A. Soper, editor of *Listen*, this colorful tract tells the moving story of a young bride-to-be who encountered the tragedy which so often results from the use of beverage alcohol.

Printed in two colors, this pamphlet portrays current facts of vital import, and includes an invitation for your friends and neighbors to join the American Temperance Society. You can be proud to present this pamphlet to the members of your community.

Advantages in joining the American Temperance Society are many. The following quotation indicates that soul winning is of primary importance: "In every place the temperance question is to be made more prominent. . . Many are on the very verge of the kingdom, waiting only to be gathered in." *Ibid.*, p. 258.

Active membership in the ATS brings with it an opportunity for greater participation in this harvest of souls. We are told that many will be spiritually benefited as a direct result of the temperance work. Build a better tomorrow for yourself, your loved ones, and your neighbors.

On February 25, "when the temperance pledge is presented to you, sign it. More than this, resolve to put all your powers against the evil of intemperance, and encourage others who are trying to do a work of reform in the world." *Ibid.*, p. 198.

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Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism

Since 1950 the National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, an organization officially endorsed by the Seventh-day Adventist church, has sponsored Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism, whose primary purpose is to train men and women within and without the church for active service. To these Institutes have come now more than 1,200 men and women from all walks of life, who have received both information and inspiration to become more active in educational, medical, or religious lines, to effectively check the rise and spread of alcoholism.

The Fall Council actions of the church, beginning in 1956 and confirmed since, have recommended that our church workers attend such sessions and that each conference and church sponsor the attendance of those not of our faith.

This year the annual Institutes will be held in Loma Linda, July 10-21, and in Washington, D.C., on the campus of American University, July 24—August 4. As our church organizes for an increasingly effective temperance campaign, it is important that we become better qualified to lead it. Every church worker, lay and clerical alike, should be a temperance worker. To become an effective one requires both zeal and training.



C.M.E. Receives Grant

A grant of almost \$25,000 has been awarded to the College of Medical Evangelists for the coming year to continue testing drugs for the prevention of parasitic diseases in Africa. This will be the third year of the testing program sponsored by a large pharmaceutical firm and conducted by CME personnel on location in Africa.

Testing of the drugs has been carried on at several locations in Africa, currently at the Kendu Mission Hospital in Kenya. The testing program calls for the treatment of actual victims of the diseases, which are caused by infestation with various parasites.

The conducting of the program in Africa is made necessary by the fact that the diseases in question occur only in areas of that continent, according to Dr. Edward D. Wagner, director of the testing program.

Impressions of Plainview Academy

"And the trees said to the fig tree, Come thou, and reign over us." Judges 9:10

Exactly what does a Biblical quotation of this nature have to do with this article? Simply this: In the same sense that the trees in the forest carried on a conversation in the Scriptural allegory, the administration building at the Plainview Academy was heard to say toward the close of 1960:

"My fiftieth anniversary is coming up next year. Guess I had better spruce up a bit. I'll start by putting on a complete set of combination screen storm doors and windows, to keep the cold out in the winter and the flies in the summer.

"Of course, a lot of people will come and look me over on my anniversary. When they come, they'll be walking on new sidewalks where there never were any sidewalks before."

The building seemed pleased over what happened prior to the arrival of the anniversary year, and continued its observations in the New Year:

"I am really taking on a new look. There are programs of development carried on in both dormitories, sponsored by the Girls' and Boys' Clubs respectively. The girls are refurnishing their parlor and improving the bathrooms. As for the boys, they are in the midst of eliminating a useless hallway, and constructing a worship room with a lounge and reading quarters.

"You should see the kitchen and dining room! Everything sparkles around there with recently painted walls and modern equipment. It seems that the principal, K. M. Nelson, acquired a large supply of paint at an unbelievably low price, and they are surely putting it to good use.

"Speaking of new equipment, in this kitchen you will find a practically new electric dishwasher purchased from Government Surplus at a fabulously low price, a stainless steel sink, electric bake ovens, an electric vegetable-peeler not yet uncrated, and numerous other up-todate material.

"It seems that the students are always on time to enjoy the wholesome meals prepared by Mrs. Fay Wintermeyer and her corps of helpers. You know, one of our ministers from Minneapolis with his wife, visited the school on February 11 and 12. The couple occupied one of the pleasant guest rooms - there are two with bath between. When breakfast was brought up to their room on Sabbath morning, he was heard to say, 'My, these cinnamon rolls are delicious! Must be a product of the kitchen. I haven't seen one student who gave evidence of suffering from undernourishment. On the contrary, they all look exceptionally well and robust.'

"Some of the food comes from the school garden. This garden furnished all the tomatoes required for the institution last year, and most of the potatoes. It also produced some exceptionally large sweet potatoes.

"The School Lunch Nutritionist for the state of South Dakota, Martha Edelen, expressed concern over how the students would fare on a meatless diet. Having observed the situation for some time, she recently wrote the school:

"Let me congratulate you on these menus. You have made tremendous progress since last year. . . . Keep up the good work."

"Would you be interested in what goes on around here? All right, 1 will tell you.

"The young men and women who attend this academy, numbering 82 which is near capacity, are the finest in the state if you will permit me to express a conviction. You will be interested in knowing that \$10,000.-00 worth of labor has been furnished to the students so far during this school year.

"The spiritual tone of the faculty is strong and contagious. Someone has observed that it would be difficult to find a more dedicated group of teachers anywhere.

"The girls are fortunate to benefit by the counsel and sympathetic understanding of their dean, Mary Kube, who also teaches home economics.

"Two weeks ago, Student Spiritual Emphasis Week was featured. During that week, the students took full charge of chapel and worship services.

"The music building was redecorated last year. We have a 35-piece band directed by Robert Groom, whose wife also gives vocal instruction. The leader of the 26-voice choir is the present dean of boys, Arlo Krueger. Once each week, Mary Thompson from Northville, South Dakota, comes in to teach piano.

"George Melashenko of the Bible Department, whose wife serves as school nurse, is at present giving a series of lectures at Huron. Boys from his classes accompany him to these meetings, and take an active part.

"Alvin Morford is in charge of science and mathematics instruction at the academy.

"There were five students who

earned full or partial scholarships selling denominational literature last summer. They were: Shirley Patzer, Janet Shepherd, Darlene Dunford, Curtis Poore, and Bonnie Wallman. Under the excellent training and guidance of H. F. Anderson, publishing department secretary for the conference, they gained an in-aluable experience.

"In the administration's effort to extend the influence of the academy, the school bus, which was acquired last summer, serves a most excellent purpose. It is being used to make possible trips to Union College, music tours, and varied school activities.

"Well, Friends, here I am all excited about the Plainview Academy, but I feel that I have reasons to be. I surely hope that the editor of the OUTLOOK, L. H. Netteburg, who also comes up to audit our books periodically, allows me to express what is on my heart through that good publication. You see, I never had a fiftieth anniversary before.

"Even the ewes and the little lambs have joined us to celebrate this year. The school was very fortunate in securing more than 200 ewes at a very favorable price, the increase in the number of which will result in added profit to the school. They will also be in a playful mood when you come to see us."



Was all-sufficient for the need; Should Isaac's blood enrich the sod Humanity would still be freed.



Christian Education

Mrs. Toms, Danny, Teddy, and I are happy to take this opportunity to express our heartfelt greatings to our brethren and sisters of the Northern Union. Since our coming to Minnesota last August, our good people here have surely entwined themselves around our hearts. We are happy for the privilege of fellowship in service with you in this great field.

Loyalty to the divine blueprint on the part of our dear people here in the Hinckley district is perhaps in no way better demonstrated than in their faithfulness and fervor in the matter of Christian education on all levels: church school, academy, and college.

The members here wholeheartedly subscribe to the divine philosophy of education: "To bring man back into harmony with God, so to elevate and ennoble his moral nature that he may again reflect the image of the Creator, is the great purpose of all the education and discipline of life." *Counsels to Teachers*, p. 49. They believe that higher education is that which fits the student for the higher life, a life that measures with the life of God, a life engendered by the Holy Spirit and a prayerful study of the word of God, and which brings us into personal contact and fellowship with the Infinite One, the Allwise God, and our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

We believe that education is a preparation for life—not for this short life merely, but for "the whole period of existence possible to man," *Education*, p. 13. —life that flows on sweetly through the unending ages of eternity, a life of unselfish service to God and man.

We believe that "we cannot afford to separate spiritual from intellectual training." Counsels to Teachers, p. 167. As parents we "realize that it is no longer safe to send them (our children) to the public school," (Ibid. p. 205.) and therefore through sacrificial effort we "send them to schools where they will obtain an education based on a scriptural foundation." Ibid. p. 205

When God was about to take His people Israel out of Egypt to the promised land, He told them, "I will pass through the land of Egypt this night, and will smite all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment: I am the Lord And ye shall take a bunch of hyssop, and dip it in the blood that is in the bason, and strike the lintel and the two side posts with the blood that is in the bason; and none of you shall go out at the door of his house until the morning. For the Lord will pass through to smite the Egyptians; and when He seith the blood upon the lintel, and on the two side posts, the Lord will pass over the door, and will not suffer the destroyer to come in unto your houses to smite you. And ve shall observe this thing for an ordinance to thee and to thy sons for ever." Excdus 12: 12, 22-24. Speaking of this experience, the messenger of the Lord declares: "The blood upon the lintel of the door symbolized the blood of Christ, who alone saved the firstborn of the Hebrews from the curse. Any one of the children of the Hebrews who was found in an Egyptian habitation was destroyed.

"This experience of the Israelites

was written for the instruction of those who should live in the last days. Before the overflowing scourge shall come upon the dwellers of the earth, the Lord calls upon all who are Israelites indeed to prepare for that event. To parents He sends the warning cry. Gather your children into your own houses; gather them away from those who are disregarding the commandments of God, who are teaching and practicing evil. Get out of the large cities as fast as possible. Establish church schools. Give your children the word of God as the foundation of all their education." Testimonies, vol. 6, p. 195

Mrs. Margaret Bimberg is the teacher of the eleven pupils enrolled in the Hinckley church school this year. A former public school teacher before she became a Seventh-day Adventist, she is bringing real skill and devotion to her first year of teaching in church school. She loves the Lord fervently, and is contributing great strength and blessing to our boys and girls.
