Resolution on Spirit of Prophecy

(Following is a resolution that was voted at the General Conference session Friday, August 3, 1962.)

Whereas, The Lord through the Spirit of Prophecy has spoken to His church in these last days "to bring the minds of His people to His word" (*Testimonies*, vol. 5, p. 663); to impart to us a clearer understanding of future events and our mission and destiny as a people; to call attention to Bible "principles for the formation of correct habits of living" (*Testimonies*, vol. 5, pp. 663,664; "for the comfort of His people" (*Early Writings*, p. 78); and to prepare us to meet the Lord, and

Whereas, The Spirit of Prophecy counsels have been given to build unity in God's church and to cause His people to "see eye to eye and be of the same mind" (*Testimonies*, vol. 3, p. 361); "to correct specious errors and to specify what is truth" —E. G. White letter 117, 1910; and to "confirm the faith of" His people "in the position they have taken" (*Selected Messages*, book 1, p. 41); and

Whereas, The experience of the years has taught us the wisdom of

these counsels—wisdom that is sorely needed as we enter the last days of conflict, when the people preparing for the second advent of their Lord need the special guidance God has so graciously provided; therefore

Resolved, that we express to God our deep-felt gratitude for the gracious provisions He has made in the Spirit of Prophecy writings for the protection and guidance of His church and further

We recommend: 1. That church members throughout the world be urged to study carefully and give earnest heed to the Spirit of Prophecy counsels.

2. That they be encouraged to continue to build Spirit of Prophecy libraries in their homes that they might have at hand the wealth of counsel so vital in this hour.

3. That a special effort be made to encourage the purchase and use of E. G. White books that offer instruction in soul-winning work and guidance to the church in its last final effort to win men to God's kingdom.

4. That we call to the attention of Seventh-day Adventists, and especially new members, the sound

knowledge concerning the Spirit of Prophecy which may be theirs as the result of pursuing courses of study, such as the Prophetic Guidance Correspondence Course, and that our pastors be encouraged to conduct Prophetic Guidance schools periodically in their local churches.

5. That pastors and church officers be encouraged to continue their observance of Spirit of Prophecy Sabbath each year, devoting the preaching hour of the Sabbath to a consideration of this theme.

6. That we earnestly urge our brethren in overseas areas:

a. To press forward with unabated zeal in the excellent work of translating and publishing the Spirit of Prophecy books in the languages of their constituencies;

b. To take full advantage of the newly designed "Spirit of Prophecy Book of the Year" plan which makes available to all English-reading members one basic E. G. White book each year at a greatly reduced price;

c. To participate heartily in the newly designed plan for making the English editions of the E. G. White books available to workers at prices within their purchasing power, capitalizing on the great potential of the English-reading ability of many of our overseas workers.

d. To promote Prophetic Guidance courses in their languages.

7. That church members in all lands be reminded that it is increasingly essential that the writings be studied in their proper context in the E. G. White books.

8. That we encourage workers and laity to avail themselves of the new three-volume *Comprehensive Index to the Writings of Ellen G. White* which will serve as a most valuable aid in the study of the Spirit of Prophecy counsels.

9. That the leaders of our publishing work, and literature evangelists throughout the world be encouraged to undertake, with an increasing sense of the time in which we live, the ever-widening distribution of the subscription editions of the Spirit of Prophecy books that are designed to enlighten the world concerning the times in which we live and the dramatic issues just before us

James White Library Dedicated at Andrews University

The James White Library at Andrews University was formally opened to the public at the dedicatory service held in the Pioneer Memorial Church on October 24 at eleven o'clock.

Walter R. Beach, Secretary of the General Conference of Seventh-day

Adventists with headquarters in Takoma Park, Washington, D. C., was the guest speaker at the dedication of the James White Library. Dr. Beach has distinguished himself as a scholar and author. He has served in important administrative capacities in the Seventh-day Adventist Church both in North America and in Europe.

"Books are the tools with which knowledge is most rapidly and most successfully acquired. They put into our hands the key that opens the door of human commonplaces with a world of boundless horizons" stated Beach in the opening remarks.

After tracing the historical development of libraries, Dr. Beach concluded: "This library is not just another addition to the physical plant of Andrews University. This library is a monument to truth. It should undergird the total educational program. In this act we establish the James White Library under God as the cornerstone of Andrews University's total educational process.

The new library is a three-story structure, 204 feet by 90 feet, constructed of reinforced concrete, limestone, and marble, and is designed to blend with the Seminary Building. The new library will face west directly across the mall toward the Pioneer Memorial Church.

Costing in the neighborhood of \$750,000 the library has 45,000 square feet of floor space with shelving capacity for 280,000 volumes. Equipment including walnut tables and chairs, study carrels, card catalog, Rolodex record file, storage cabinets and microfilm reader, cost

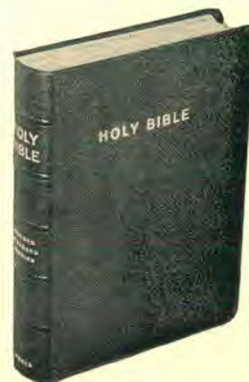

\$100,000. An annual budget of \$30,000 has been set aside for the purchase of books.

Approximately 120,000 volumes comprise the united library. It subscribes to nearly 1,000 periodicals, has 7 professionally trained staff members, 4 sub-professional staff members, 2 library assistants, several clerical workers, and provides over 300 hours of work a week to 25 undergraduate students.

Of particular interest to denominational researchers is the Heritage Room which contains a collection of rare books which include the Advent Source Collection made by Dr. L. E. Froom as he wrote the four volumes of *Prophetic Faith of our Fathers*. Such items as Uriah Smith's old desk and William Miller's hatbox are on display.

Mrs. Mary Jane Mitchell, Librarian stated that "The present James White Library is the result of the merger of staff and book collections of two libraries. The old one was the James White Memorial Library of Emmanuel Missionary College, and the other of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary.

K. F. Ambs, now Assistant Treasurer of the General Conference, while General Manager of the University carried the responsibility for scores of important decisions which were necessary in the erection of such an edifice. Elder Ambs offered the invocation at the dedicatory service.

Emil Leffler, Dean of the School of Graduate Studies, presided at the Act of Dedication. The Act of Dedication, written by John Waller,

was read by W. G. C. Murdoch, Dean of the Theological Seminary.

The purpose of the James White Library was succinctly set forth in the concluding statement of the Act of Dedication, "May God make it (library) a place where teachers come to learn beside their students, where the public is welcome to share its riches; where the annals of God's church form a living part of the study resources; where thoughts may be born in youthful minds, be nurtured in places of labor at the ends of the earth, and return here in columns of print to quicken in other youths new thought, new dedication."

In accepting the building from J. D. Smith, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Floyd O. Rittenhouse stated: "Second only to a superior faculty stands an adequate, balanced and growing book accumulation. But a vast book collection without the essential concomitant facilities and services means little. It is due to a lively appreciation of this fact that we can inaugurate this library today and we are deeply grateful for it."

H. M. Tippet, Associate Book Editor of the Review and Herald Publishing Association read the dedicatory prayer.

Educational Conference Scheduled For Andrews University January 3-24, 1963

"The Image and Role of the Educational Superintendent," will be the general theme of study in an intensive Andrews University Educational Conference slated for January 3 to 24, 1963.

Directed primarily to meet the needs of Seventh-day Adventist superintendents of education on the local conference level, the event will also be open to graduate students in education. "Two hours of graduate credit may be earned by qualified persons," according to E. S. Chace, assistant professor of education and co-ordinator of the conference.

Highlights of the three-week program include qualified speakers and field trips which will take the participants to places of interest in the surrounding area. Trips will include direct observation of ungraded schools in the Chicago district, a tour of the unique school plant at Carson City, Michigan, and the opportunity to examine new school furniture design.

An added feature of the conference will be the establishment of a closed circuit television system on the campus whereby direct observation of laboratory school teaching methods may be observed by all participants.

"Our department has sought to create a program that will delineate the specific role of the Seventh-day Adventist superintendent; a role that involves varied activities and responsibilities," said Dr. Chace. "Rather than cutting out a facsimile of the public school superintendents, our goal is the development of a new and distinctive Seventh-day Adventist school superintendent."

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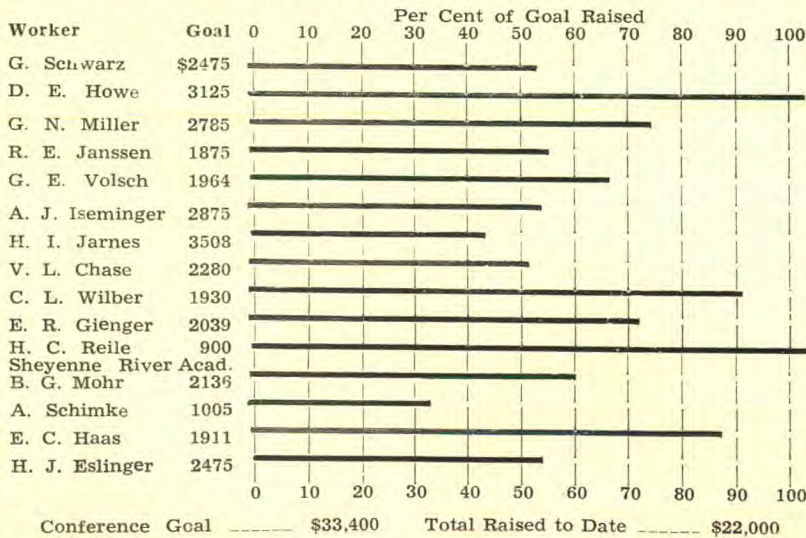
Through God's Providence

Because of their thirst for the truths of the Word of God many other books were also read. Visits were made regularly in which the message was discussed. Always a good interest was maintained.

Conviction of the truth came early and remained with them throughout. They considered taking their stand a few months after they first studied the message. Family ties and very close church relationship, however, prevented them from doing this. Mrs. Olson also being the head of

The experiences through which they passed in accepting the message are such as strengthen faith in the power of the truths of the Word of God, and the work of the Holy Spirit in bringing conviction and conversion to the truth. This brought the conviction to them that their choice was Christ and truth on the one side and friends and conveniences on the other. In the meantime they had already attended Sabbath School and church and their "children just loved the Sabbath School." The good work of the teachers and leaders of the Sabbath School departments proved a winning influence—encouraging to right decision. The Olsons therefore realized their decision must be solely on the basis of faith and truth. Such a choice would be for Christ, whose love was drawing them.

Church Schools Having an Excellent Year

"Higher than the highest human thought can reach is God's ideal for His children. Godliness - godlikeness, is the goal to be reached." The ten church schools are the only schools in South Dakota dedicated to the full instruction of the mind as God would have it. The educational process of the public schools is too low and too narrow to fortify the minds of our boys and girls as they should be to prepare them for the fulness of living that God would have them enjoy.

One hundred thirty-seven children are enrolled in South Dakota church schools this year. This is the largest such enrollment since 1919 when 209 were in church school. However, it is only two above last year's enrollment and we have added two new schools. The Rapid City school has shown constant growth the last three years and now has 39 students. It would be nice to see them go over the 40 mark and move on to 50.

By the Lord's direction all of our schools have qualified teachers. This is better than many of the public

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schools were able to do. Eight of our twelve teachers have degrees.

But I am most impressed by the high spiritual standards that they live and teach to the boys and girls. Devotional exercises every morning, missionary activity leadership and many other character building programs are directed by our church school teachers. They are the best teachers in town because they walk with God and they are the most important teachers in town because they teach God's way. Our church schools are surely enjoying God's blessings this year.

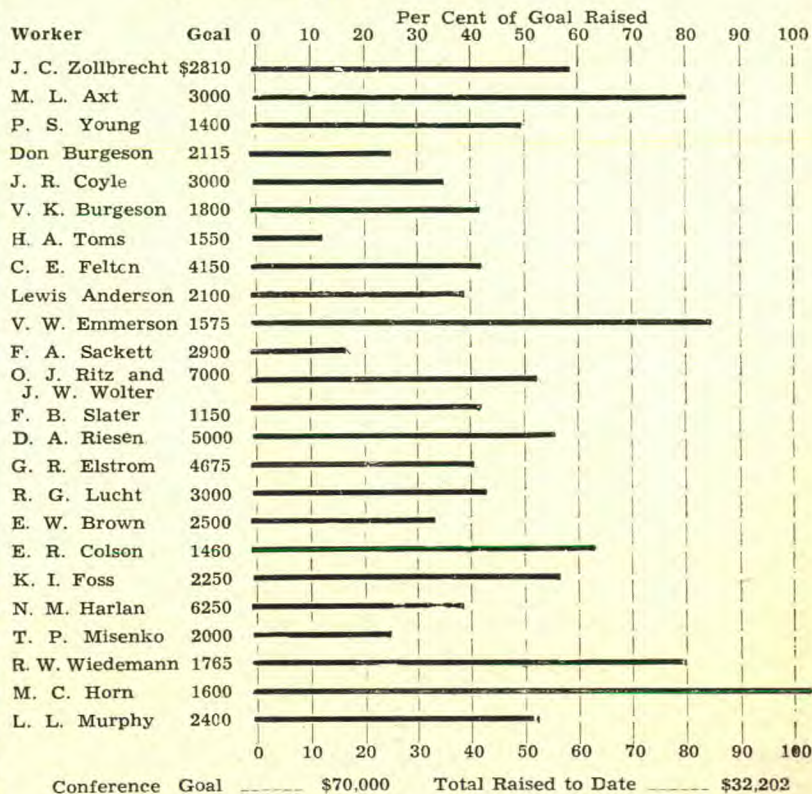

REPORT THROUGH DECEMBER 3, 1962

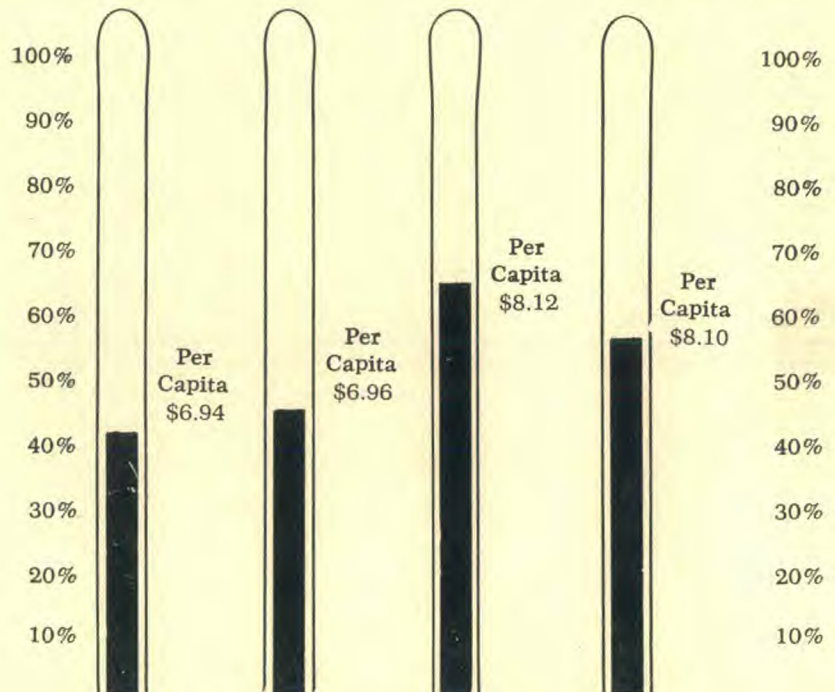
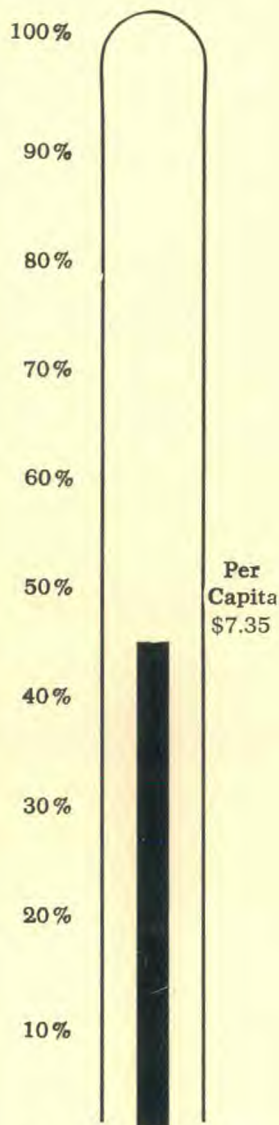
