Unauthorized Condensation

of "The Great Controversy"

The attention of the General Conference has been called to a project presently being promoted in connection with the distribution of Ellen G. White's book, *The Great Controversy*. An unauthorized group proposes to issue a special newspaper format condensation of the last twenty chapters of this inspired writing, thereby calling attention to the special 75-cent edition of *The Great Controversy* published under the approval of the E. G. White Trustees. The group solicits contributions in the amount of \$300,000 to finance the project.

The General Conference Committee must raise a voice of protest against this unofficial, independent enterprise. Some statements made in the promotional material for this project are extravagant, and generally unrepresentative of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. This group likewise appears unmindful of the instructions received from the Lord's messenger concerning the use of proper methods in the proclamation of God's last messages, particularly as regards independent publications and private solicitation of funds.

This proposed condensed presentation can lead to confusion at a time when the church is not remiss

in its responsibility to circulate *The Great Controversy* and other truth-laden publications through properly established denominational plans and channels. Important efforts are being put forth right now, and with success, to place our publications, including *The Great Controversy*, before the people in such a way that they can recognize our true Christian motivation.

We would mention further, contrary to the unsupported allegation by this unauthorized group, that *The Great Controversy* has never, to our knowledge, been classified as "subversive," nor rightly could it be. We must make sure that misuse of these inspired pages shall not be cause for such classification. Ellen G. White earnestly counselled against reckless expressions and methods which could bring prematurely a time of trouble and perplexity. This is true not only in America but even more so in other parts of the world. Unwise words and procedures could jeopardize the life and ministry of men and women who are now able to accomplish a marvelous work.

God's messenger wrote long ago:

"The time will come when unguarded expressions of a denunciatory character that have been care-

lessly spoken or written by our brethren, will be used by our enemies to condemn us. These will not be used merely to condemn those who made the statements, but will be charged upon the whole body of Adventists. . . . Let all beware lest by reckless expressions they bring on a time of trouble before the great crisis which is to try men's souls."—*Counsels to Writers and Editors*, p. 69

In the work of warning the world and preparing men and women to meet their Lord, we are to be guided by definite principles. Both the end and the means are to be considered. Such principles guided Ellen G. White in her work, and we believe that all, including those who have undertaken this unauthorized project, will want to know and follow these principles. In this number of the *Review and Herald*, Arthur L. White, secretary of the Ellen G. White Publications, begins a series of articles which will be not only helpful but timely. Read them carefully. We are sure that none will want to have a part in any misuse of the Spirit of Prophecy writings and the funds that God has entrusted to us.

More Years, More Blessings

Yes, that is what the Birthday-Thank Offering means. The more the years, the more the offering and

the greater the blessings. Many can testify that with the increase of the years and an increase of birthday offerings, there is also an increase of both spiritual and material blessings received. Moreover, increased offerings mean increased funds going out to needy mission fields to the ends of the earth. Indeed, more years mean more blessings as faithful Sabbath School members follow the Birthday-Thank Offering plan.

Many members look forward with anticipation of increasing their birthday offering as their birthdays increase. Some follow the plan of a dollar offering for each birthday year. Mrs. Anna Stromme worked hard and planned for a long time hoping to be able to reach her 100th

birthday and come with a hundred dollar birthday offering. Her joy and satisfaction in accomplishing the offering part was about as great as her joy in the accomplishment of reaching the century mark. The entire Sabbath School participated and her Christmas tree that December Sabbath was leafed out with one hundred one dollar bills. Then as her eyes sparkled she said, "It is all for missions."

Some \$300,000 of Birthday-Thank Offerings were received in 1963 to add to other generous Sabbath School offerings. Since the beginning of the plan in 1919, over \$3,000,000 has come in through this means. Thus the Birthday-Thank Offering has been a great blessing both to mission fields and to faithful Sabbath School members.

The General Conference Committee on promotion of offerings has set a goal for Birthday-Thank Offerings for 1964 of \$350,000 and urges total membership participation. If all Sabbath School members were to participate in this plan this sum could easily be reached. If our two million Sabbath School members gave only a penny a year, and if we calculated their average age at thirty years, this would mean \$600,000 a year for missions from the Birthday-Thank Offering alone!

We are glad to report an encouraging increase in both participation and offerings in the Birthday plan. In 1952, the total Birthday-Thank Offering, worked out on the basis of a penny per year, made the average age of all Sabbath School members to be only 12.8 years of age. Whereas, in 1962, on the same basis of calculation, the offering even with a greatly increased membership makes the average age for Sabbath School members to be 15.1 years of

age. Surely the majority of Sabbath School members are at least twice that age. Moreover, the penny per year of age as a birthday offering might be suitable for the children but most adults would want a minimum of a dollar per year as a birthday offering plan. If all will participate, we can easily reach our goal. Surely none would desire to fail in showing appreciation for the abundance of both material and spiritual blessings.

Let us then undertake to double our Birthday-Thank Offerings in 1964. If each Sabbath School will do that, what additional blessings that would bring to many mission fields! Will you join me in such a plan?

It seemed for a moment that we would have to settle for less than the goal, but the Spirit of God impressed us to pass out the envelopes again and many doubled their previous amounts, and when these were collected a total of over \$10,000.00 was reached.

This morning I received a letter from a dear brother with this note enclosed. "Enclosed is a check of \$500.00 to be used for evangelism for South Dakota. This check of \$500.00 is for the answered prayer of a problem that I have had." May God bless this dear friend.

Not all of our people were at camp meeting on the afternoon when the appeal was made for funds. It is not fair nor right that only the people who were present should carry the program of evangelism in South Dakota. Our ministers will be presenting this in all of their churches; when they do, won't you respond with a liberal contribution if you were not present at camp meeting and had the opportunity then? The work of God will soon be finished in the world, but it must also be finished here in South Dakota.

Word has been received that a nice sum of funds has been made available from the General Conference with which to put the daily evangelistic series of the Voice of Prophecy programs on the air in the Black Hills area and the television program, "It is Written" on the Sioux Falls station which will blanket the entire eastern part of the State of South Dakota. In order to follow up these programs properly, funds will be needed; and we appeal to our believers to please be liberal in making contributions to

### Report on The Recent Constituency Meeting

Most of our readers will know about the calling of a constituency meeting on June 7 with regard to the future of Plainview Academy; but you may not have received a factual report with regard to the outcome of this meeting. Thus this brief report.

A very fine representation of delegates were present showing the keen interest in the topic for discussion. A report had been prepared in detail based on the findings of the "fact-finding committee", which had met some weeks previously. Every possible angle of the needs of the school was brought to the attention of the delegates. Ample time for discussion was given to the delegates and many took advantage of the discussion privileges.

There were seven possible solutions to the problems facing us at Plainview. They are as follows:

1. Remodel the present plant for approximately \$350,000.00.
2. Lay plans for a ten to twelve-year-plan for the complete rebuilding of Plainview Academy at a cost of approximately one-half million dollars.
3. Patch up at a minimum expense as funds become available and do the best we can even in the light of not receiving General Conference accreditation. This is with the realization of having to raise ten to twenty thousand dollars from the field each year for the patching up each year and operating the school.
4. Close the academy immediately

and let the young people take advantage of academies in the adjacent conferences.

5. Close the academy immediately and explore the possibility of consolidating with another academy in an adjacent conference.
6. Patch up and keep operating as best we can, but seriously explore the possibility of consolidation with another academy.
7. Adopt a fund-raising program for a building fund, maintenance fund, and operating fund with the understanding that one half of such funds be put aside for new building or major remodeling work. Goal could be based on 2 per cent of income or a tithe of the tithe, etc.

Early in the discussion it became clear that the South Dakota Conference constituency would not favor closing the school. When the vote was taken on the seven solutions, there were only about 5 or 6 votes for the closing of the school while there were 56 votes for number six and 57 votes for number seven. Since the two plans are nearly identical, it was voted by voice vote to combine numbers six and seven. This was a unanimous or near unanimous vote. The action taken reads, "It was voted that we patch up and keep operating as best we can and at the same time seriously explore the possibility of consolidation with another academy, and that we adopt a fund-raising program for a building fund, maintenance fund, and operating fund with the understanding that one-half of such funds be put aside for new building or major remodeling work. A goal of 2 per cent of a member's income, or a tithe of the tithe could be a suggestive amount to be promoted among our membership."

Plainview has had its problems with water shortages, heating plant, plumbing, etc. Thanks to the Union Conference, a sizeable amount of money is being made available this summer to take care of some of these needs. (Our turn for receiving such help from the Union comes every four years.)

It is obvious then, according to the action taken by the delegation, that Plainview must continue—unless some form of consolidation could be worked out with a neigh-

boring conference academy. And it was clearly recognized that a fund raising program would have to be launched. This we plan to do in the early fall. Our people will be called upon for commitments for the building up of a building fund and to help defray the operating shortages which result from operating a small school in this day of high expenses. With God's help, I plan to pay 2 per cent of my income toward such a fund. If everyone in the conference would do likewise, there would be ample funds for the operation of the institution and for the accumulation of a building fund—looking forward to putting up a small dormitory or remodeling our present building to provide more classroom and administrative space.

May God bless you as you decide what you can do to keep this, our institution, open to continue to serve our youth. It has served it well in the past, and it has always had its struggles, but it has produced some fine men and women who are scattered throughout the earth in God's work.

Please remember the academy principal and staff in your devotions.


