From his personal experience in public evangelism he presented methods and plans which can help every pastor to be more successful in conducting evangelistic meetings. His purpose in presenting his methods was not to make all preachers exactly alike, but in his words, "to make me a better me, and you a better you." Surely every minister who attended the council went away a better man for having been there.

R. S. Watts, Vice President of the General Conference, gave a deeply spiritual series of studies on Right-eousness by Faith and Christian Perfection. The truth

and beauty of this Bible teaching as presented by Elder Watts, was a great encouragement to all. As this doctrine is accepted into the Christian's life it will result in confidence and joy as well as God's blessing in finishing His work.

Other visiting ministers included R. R. Hegstad, Editor of *Liberty*, W. A. Fagal of Faith for Today, and W. R. Wollard from Pacific Press.

Different ways in which all the members of the church can have a part in evangelism were presented by H. E. Haas and P. F. Pedersen from the Northern Union office. Several local pastors added to the success of the council by sharing with others methods that are helping them in their soul-winning work. Special meetings were conducted for the ministers' wives under the direction of Mrs. Dittberner.

As the council came to the close each minister rededicated himself to be a co-laborer with God and finish the work in the Northern Union so Jesus can come. We invite every church member to unite in this purpose.

# Andrews University is Recipient of National Science Foundation Grant

Andrews University has been notified that its mathematics department is the recipient of a National Science Foundation grant in the amount of \$29,980.

According to John T. Wilson, acting director of the foundation, the grant is for the "support of a Summer Institute in Mathematics for Secondary School Teachers, and is under the direction of Harold T. Jones."

Dr. Jones, professor of mathematics at the university, says that the school has been the recipient of similar grants from the foundation in 1960 and 1963.

The institute this summer will have places for 25 secondary teachers, who will come from all over the country. "We try to accept people from all different areas," says

In addition to Jones, Dr. Roy A. Jorgensen, associate professor of mathematics, will teach. Courses offered will be "Analysis for Secondary Teachers," and "Modern Application of Mathematics for Secondary Teachers."





## Hot Springs Cherishes Christian Education

It costs over \$51 a child to run the church schools of the South Dakota Conference, Christian education is a large portion of the budget of any church that operates a school. It is also a large portion of the Conference budget as all these schools are subsidized from conference funds.

On a per pupil cost small church schools cost more to run than larger church schools. This larger expense is carried by the church.

The Hot Springs Church School has seven students this year. Their enrollment has approximately an average of eight or nine students the past few years. Of course, they have felt the financial bite. Last year they raised their tuition rates to the highest in the conference. This raise will probably need to be made in all the church schools soon. The Hot Springs Church people do not leave the whole burden to the parents, for most of them subscribe

a monthly amount for church school and some add nice-sized sums to this from time to time.

This year Sharon Dickhaut is teaching the school. Sharon learned to love Hot Springs right away and the Hot Springs people have been most appreciative of their teacher's efforts.

The kind of program run by the Hot Springs Church School is making workers for God's cause and saints for eternity!
