It was hard going, and the path through the jungle at this point was very steep. They had been walking for three days and they were weary.

It was a pleasant sight for them to see the small Adventist village of Duidui. They were joyfully welcomed by Piruga (Pee-roo-gar) the teacher, and the village people. In this outof-the-way place they do not receive many visitors, and it was a joyful occasion as they all visited and worshipped together.

About one mile further up the path is another village where the people are not Adventists. Kaleatu, the evangelist, sent "talk" that he would visit them and show them some pictures from his battery-operated projector. These people were willing so that evening about 50 people gathered to see and hear the old old story of Jesus and His love.

After the pictures were finished a young boy of about ten years came

to the evangelist and said that he wanted to go to the Adventist school at Duidui. This lad, Martin, said that he would follow all the rules of the school if they would only let him go to school. However, when he asked his parents the next day if he could go to our school, they angrily prevented him. Martin was not a boy to give up. Next day he arrived at school in a bark loin-cloth. Clothes and money are rare in the mountains, and the bark cloth was all he had to wear.

On returning home he was beaten and threatened by his parents. However, he was determined to come to school. Each day he managed to steal out from his village and arrive at school. He was so determined and persistant that the parents finally decided not to worry him further.

Martin is now ready to attend our District School. After two years there he will come to our Betikama Central School, where there are many other boys like Martin, who are preparing themselves to work for the Lord.

Betikama has many students who, like Martin, battle against tremendous opposition in their search for truth. We are endeavoring to provide more and better dormitories so that we can adequately care for these workers of the future. Your gifts on 13th Sabbath will assist us.


The answer to the foregoing question is found in the *Testimonies*, volume 7, page 141. We read:

New Missionary Seaplane

An airplane built to land on the water of the Amazon River's 40,-000-mile system will enter mission service for the Seventh-day Adventist Church early next year, according to an action by the church's General Conference Committee.

The airplane, a Cessna 185 equipped with pontoons, will enable the church to step up medical and missions activity in the million square miles of Brazil's interior, where the headwaters of the Amazon River lace into heavy jungle terrain.

Primary function of the plane will be to back up the church's medical launches in the central Amazon area around Manaus, Brazil. By providing medical supplies and improving communications between the launches and missions headquarters, the plane will enable launches to extend their tours into hard-to-reach areas of Brazil, ac-

cording to James A. Aitken, president of the church's South American Division.

Pilot-mechanic for the airplane will be 27-year-old Daniel Walter, Mexican Hat, Utah, holder of a commercial pilot flight instructor rating.

The float plane will be the second aircraft purchased by the church for use in the South American Division to supplement the activities of 16 medical launches on the Amazon and other rivers of Peru and Brazil. The first, a Helio Courier, entered service in the spring of 1964. In the past 18 months Pilot Clyde Peters of Lincoln, Nebraska, now stationed at Pucallpa, Peru, has transported 3,000 persons safely, and has saved over 60 lives, according to a report from Aitken. With a float plane, Aitken says, a landing can be made almost anywhere in the interior of Brazil since water is so abundant. Twentyfive airstrips are open in Peru and southwest Brazil to facilitate landing of regular wheel planes.

The plane was purchased from Robert Seamount, of Oak Harbor, Washington, also a pilot, who began a five-year term as a Seventhday Adventist missionary stationed at Pucallpa, Peru, this summer.

Young Walter, who received his college education at Andrews University, Berrien Springs, Michigan, is the son of Gwen and Marion Walter, pioneers in establishing the Adventists' mission and hospital for Indians in Mexican Hat, Utah. Walter's wife, Dorothy, is a 1963 graduate of Columbia Union Col-

Mrs. Elmer Larsen paid tribute to three of our good Dorcas members who had passed away since our last meeting by reading a poem, "She Did Her Best".



receiving these studies was so impressed with them that she ordered 18 sets to be used in her ladies' club, where all the ladies will be able to study the Bible together.

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


