

Iowa Makes Progress

In the opening remarks of his report at the Iowa Conference Biennial Session K. D. Johnson, conference president, read the following quotation which was addressed to the delegates assembled in the year 1913:

"Oh, let it be seen, my brethren, that Jesus is abiding in the heart, sustaining, strengthening, comforting. It is your privilege to be endowed, from day to day, with a rich measure of His Holy Spirit, and to have broadened views of the importance and scope of the message we are proclaiming to the world. The Lord is willing to reveal to you wondrous things out of His law. Wait before Him with humility of heart. Pray most earnestly for an understanding of the times in which we live, for a fuller conception of His purpose, and for increased efficiency in soul saving." Testimonies to Ministers, p. 513.

The conference treasurer and departmental secretaries joined the president in giving a very interesting report of the progress of the work in Iowa during the last two years. By the use of black light illustration, charts, and graphs each delegate could readily see the results of all conference activities. The entire report showed evidence that the Iowa Conference does have "broadened views of the importance and scope of the message we are proclaiming to the world."

One of the highlights of the day was when four newly-organized churches were taken into the sisterhood of churches in the Iowa Conference. These new church organizations are at Independence, Iowa City, Perry, and Bloomfield. According to present plans, a fifth new church will be organized in a couple of weeks. Iowa is to be commended for bringing light into these cities. May other fields follow this good example.

J. O. McLeod reported that the membership of the conference now stands at 3,537. He also remarked that if during the years all would remain faithful and we would not lose members by transferring to other places, Iowa now would have nearly ten thousand members.

Even though members move to other places, the work continues to move forward in Iowa. During the biennium one new church and one new school plant were completed and dedicated. Three new building sites were acquired. Presently the Des Moines church is engaged in erecting a new school and church plant.

For the first time in any biennium the tithe reached the million-dollar mark. When \$1,003,725 is compared with \$889,980 for the previous biennium, evidence of the Lord's blessing and the people's faithfulness can readily be seen. There was a corresponding gain of \$43,005 in mission offerings.

Perhaps one of the most outstanding achievements in mission support and Christian witnessing has been in the Ingathering program. The amount raised in 1962 was \$56,576.38. Four years later, in the re-

cent campaign, the total Ingathering was \$78,655.92. This represents a per capita of \$22.16. This gain is worthy of commendation and doubly so when future sights are set on reaching the Silver Vanguard level.

Another unusually large increase was revealed in distributing the *Liberty* magazine. The offering for this purpose has increased from \$3,155.38 in 1960-61 to \$11,518.47 in 1964-65.

Still another leader for Iowa is in the Signs of the Times distribution. For every one hundred members in the conference there are two hundred twelve Signs subscriptions sent to neighbors and friends. This is the highest per capita circulation of any conference. F. J. Kinsey, Home Missionary leader, said, "In no place have our people shown more

The publishing work, Book and Bible House sales, attendance at Oak Park Academy, all show good gains.



Loma Linda University, according to Carl Sundin, director of placement services.

These students and many others met recently with leadership of our local and union conferences when they visited Loma Linda University as a recruitment team. Together, students and church leaders reviewed the needs for professional personnel in many communities, as well as the challenge of service in the program of the churches.

The Northern Union Conference team hosted an evening buffet dinner and program for the purpose of becoming acquainted with the families of students and to make a visual presentation of many of the areas of professional and Christian service in our territory. Ninety students and members of their families were present.

Sabbath, April 9, is the designated day when the membership of our field is invited to dedicate a special offering to the support of Loma Linda University, to which all of us look for professional members of the gospel team.

Year-Round Classes at Andrews

Dr. Richard Hammill announces that the University Board has voted a year-round academic calendar to begin in June, 1967. This new yearly calendar will consist of four quarters of equal length replacing the present system of two semesters and a summer term. The decision follows many months of careful study by special committees of faculty and administration.

The transition to the new program will be directed and coordinated by Dr. Charles B. Hirsch, vice president of academic affairs. The system will allow a student to accelerate his college schedule or to adapt a work load without being limited to three registrations a year. Teacher leaves will not be restricted to the summer months under the new quarter system.

Advantages are not limited to the undergraduate school, but the Seminarians, most of whom are conference sponsored, will find it easier to be away from their churches or mission stations for one or two quarters rather than one or two semes-

ters. All schools from the elementary to the graduate will come under the new plan.

Two semester hours credits will be equal to three quarter hour credits, and instead of needing 128 hours to graduate, a student will graduate with 192 quarter hours.

On a four-quarter system, each quarter is 11 weeks long. The fall quarter closes before Christmas and the winter quarter starts after New Year's. The spring quarter will begin March 19 and the summer quarter will begin approximately a week after graduation.

There will be approximately three to four weeks between the end of the summer quarter and the start of the new autumn quarter.

Andrews University is not alone in taking advantage of the quarteryear program. It has been adopted by several of the leading universities and colleges on the West Coast and elsewhere.

South Dakota Camp **Meeting Housing Changes**

This year there are some major changes in housing at the fair grounds. Some of the old buildings we have used for years for housing are not available to us this year, but we have something much better to offer for the first time. The 4H Building is available to us this year. This building has 24 sleeping rooms in it plus large open dormitory space which we can divide into smaller rooms with canvass. The sleeping rooms can sleep from 20 to 28 people in them. The building has four large rest rooms with many sinks and showers. The entire sleeping capacity is 1500; however, we cannot use all the beds because of the arrangement.

We are hoping that many families who are related can share some of the sleeping rooms. Each room can easily house two families with several children. If you plan to share

year-old lad who was hit in the head and died almost instantly.

Everyone would, no doubt, agree that such an incident is a terible tragedy in more ways than one. There is the boy who lost his life and the grief-stricken parents. Then there is the boy who fired the fatal shot and the concern of his parents for him. He will always have that tragic mark upon his life record.

Daily similar incidents are brought to our attention in the news. Because of the wide-spread lack of concern for life and morals crime is very much on the increase. Just a few days ago I saw a sign that read, "The Army teaches how to kill." It seems that in one instance we teach the youth "how to kill" and then in another we try to tell them not to kill. On radio and TV life is portrayed as being very cheap. Violence is the order of the day...children playing cops and robbers and war games is just innocent fun."

In too many of our Adventist homes these crime-laden programs are not just tolerated but eagerly taken in. Indeed, in more than one sense we are living "Amid those fearful perils" (T.5, page 525) of the last days.

Are we as members of the remnant church allowing our communion with God and the teaching of our children the vital things of life to lag and to be replaced by these soul-destroying things that are tools of the devil? God forbid.

It is wonderful to have his church remember him when a young man is in service. Our congratulations to those of you who are writing to our service men, though they may not be of your family.

At the present they have five young men in military service. Periodically another serviceman is written to. This is done by taking ten or fifteen minutes at an MV service when stationery is passed to everyone present.

# Brainerd Adopts Every-Member Canvass Program

The Brainerd church is now well into the second quarter of the Every-Member Canvass Development Program.

Last October, Lewis Anderson, Conference Church Development Secretary, assisted the Brainerd congregation in conducting a successful Every-Member Canvass.

The church board, under the direction of Phillip Young, carefully considered the financial needs, and recommended in business session that the Conference-approved development program be initiated in the Brainerd Church. Acting upon this suggestion, the members invited Elder Anderson to conduct an Every-Member Canvass from October 2-30.

A goal of \$33,750 over a 150 week (three year) period was set on the basis of the budget presented to the church by the board.

The cooperation of the brethren during the active phase of the campaign was most heartening. God blessed as laymen visited in the homes of the membership, seeking commitments for the Lord's work in the Brainerd area.

The final result was that the 143-member congregation sacrificially committed itself to \$35,107. This was \$1,357 over the appointed goal. The goal includes funds necessary to operate the local church, support a new tuition-free church school, and meet Brainerd's share of the current Conference Development program. In addition, an allotted sum for future church improvement is to be set aside each year.

The Brainerd church not only met a financial goal, but more importantly, demonstrated its faith in God and a determination to meet the challenge of the Lord's work in Minnesota. A spiritual refreshing has been most evident as member after member, giving in faith and claiming the Lord's promises, has been the recipient of God's special blessings. Surely there is no better way to finance God's church program than "to make a covenant through sacrifice."

# Lay Training School at Keene, North Dakota

Ben Trout. in his sermon, challenged each member to do his part in harmony with the "vision" of the work yet to be accomplished before Jesus can return, and also gave the charge, closing with the words of II Timothy 4:1,2, "I charge thee therefore before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom; Preach the Word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine."

The Keene church has voted to order a supply of My Bible Speaks basic and advanced lessons as well as Bibles to begin giving Bible studies to those whom they will be visiting soon in connection with literature distribution. 

Is Your Church Gambling?

On the other hand, if our children attend church schools for tweive years, more than nine of every ten are baptized and still only one backsides. Instead of only two of those not attending being saved we see over eight of those attending twelve years being saved.

It costs time and money to provide Christian education for our children. However, training and educating the children of the church is part of faithful stewardship and is the responsibility of every member of the church. Nowhere in the Scriptures do we find Jesus Christ or any others excusing the church from its sacred responsibility toward the lambs of the flock.

The children of the church are a priceless heritage. Let us not gamble on their being saved without the proper spiritual background, at home, at church, and at school. As stewards of God let us do all that is possible to provide a saving influence for our children in these evil days.

the North Dakota Conference in a material way and they have responded faithfully in tithes and offerings. The two-year period revealed an increase of \$58,000 in tithe, bringing the total to over \$700,000. There was a corresponding gain in missions giving with a fifty cents per capita being reached in the Sabbath School as of last December 31. The conference shows an increase in net worth and has its required operating reserves in hand.

The delegates adopted a number of plans and objectives to serve as guide lines and directives for the progress of the work during the coming two years. These plans include the objective of every lay member being involved in some type of soul winning, every pastor holding at least two evangelistic meetings a year, and one baptismal service being conducted each quarter in every district.

Elder Trout, conference president, said, "We must put forth every effort to preach the gospel; this is not a time for us to hold back for ourselves our time, our talents, or our means, but all must be dedicated to God and the finishing of His work for even now the signs indicate that we are living and preaching on borrowed time."

May the believers in North Dakota respond to this appeal.



# North Dakota Reports

A spirit of enthusiasm and progress was evident as Ben Trout and the departmental secretaries of the North Dakota Conference gave a report of the work in this growing field. The biennial session was held in Jamestown with over 200 delegates present. Most of the churches were represented. Delegates at large included W. E. Murray of the General Conference, Paul Turpel from the Omaha Branch of the Pacific Press, and the Northern Union staff.

The conference president stated that there was more than a ten per cent increase in baptisms over the past biennium. This has brought the membership of the North Dakota Conference over the 2,800 mark for the first time. The public evangelistic program has been carried forward by two conference evangelists and every district pastor participating. To help develop interests, the daily Voice of Prophecy program was broadcast from Fargo and Minot. Also, the It Is Written telecast was on five stations. The interests developed through these programs are being followed up and will bear fruit.

To provide better places of worship for both new and old members, as well as schools for the children, there are plans for the completion and dedication of three new churches and one school with an evangelistic center. The total cost will be \$300,000 with approximately 80 per cent of this amount in hand. Three

other churches are undergoing a remodeling program.

Gospel work is being carried on in a strong way by the literature evangelists in North Dakota. Deliveries of our good books to the people in the state showed a 135 per cent increase over the previous two-year period. Our colporteurs also gave away over eight thousand pieces of literature, enrolled three thousand in the Voice of Prophecy Bible Course, and prayed in hundreds of homes. Surely, these activities will result in people saved in God's kingdom, Literature sold to our own

members for personal use and missionary work amounted to over \$124,000.

Church members, young and old, have shown an increased interest in soul winning by visiting many more people and distributing much more literature than during the past two-year period. It is interesting to note that the North Dakota Conference stands second from the top in the number of Signs ordered per member in all of the Signs of the Times territory.
