## "Smokey Sam" and Danny Ipes Get Temperance Man of the Year Award

Using "Smokey Sam" as his chief assistant, Daniel Ipes has blazed a temperance path across Tennessee that earned him the Temperance Man of the Year award.

Eighteen-year-old Danny is a senior student at Madison Academy in Tennessee and has served for the past two years as president of the Madison American Temperance Society chapter at his school.

Danny has personally given more than one hundred temperance programs at schools and churches in his state area. He has widely and successfully used Smokey Sam, a manikin of a fourteen-year-old boy designed to show graphically what smoking does to the human body.

Appearing with Smokey on Nashville's popular WSM-TV "Noon" show, emceed by Jud Collins, Danny relates that before the program was over, some fifteen invitations for more appearances had flooded the studio's switchboard.

For the second straight year, Madison Academy has been awarded the Southern Union Conference Gold Star Award for excellence in temperance leadership. The entire student body has enthusiastically participated in the chapter's activities over central Tennessee, giving some 150 programs each year before youth

and community groups. Working with the group have been Principal W. A. Sowers and Paul Priest, science teacher.

Vanderbilt University's education department heartily endorses the chapter's program, as does Nashville's Cancer Society. The Heart Association repeatedly uses Smokey Sam for its demonstration work.

Questioned as to why he so willingly devotes so much of his "spare" time to temperance work, Danny Ipes replies, "I get real enjoyment from helping other young people in our area and community to better understand the harmful effects of intemperance, especially smoking and drinking."

"After we demonstrate Smokey Sam in a high school," Danny confides, "it's most gratifying to have students, total strangers to me, come up and say, 'I've smoked since the third grade, but this is the first time I really sensed that there was any real danger in the habit. I used to think it was fun to smoke, but now I'm going to quit the habit for good.'"

Danny graduated this year and plans to attend Columbia Union College. His father, Elder Tom P. Ipes, is a minister, and his mother, Ruth, is a school teacher. Danny plans to follow in the footsteps of his father and older brother, Tom, Jr., who is attending Southern Missionary College, and study to be a minister.

Each year the American Temperance Society selects a Temperance Man of the Year on the basis of outstanding personal contribution to the temperance cause either in the field of education or legislation. Most recent winners of this award include Clifton Keller, teacher at Bass Memorial Academy in Mississippi; William Howells, real estate man, Parkersburg, West Virginia; John Lammerding, contractor, Orangevale, California; and William M. Ashton, retired postal worker, Batesville, Arkansas.

## Army Invites Adventist Missionary Doctors to Attend Medical-Surgical Conference in Vietnam

A very unique and interesting medical-surgical conference took place recently at the 93rd Evacuation Hospital at Long Binh, near Saigon. It was the first of its kind in this region.

Sixteen missionary doctors from Adventist hospitals around the Far Eastern Division, and nine Adventist military doctors from various army and navy hospitals in Vietnam, joined for a four-day conference that is to long be remembered.

Lt. Col. Gene Aaby, connected with USARVN surgeon's office, was responsible for all arrangements with the army. This included the meeting place, noon meals, speakers and a long list of other important things. Dr. Merle Peterson, medical secretary of the Southeast Asia Union, handled all arrangements for the medical-missionary group.

Mrs. Nguyen Van Loc, wife of the Prime Minister of Vietnam, was a guest at the opening exercises and welcomed the group to her country. Later in the program, she held a private social hour at her home for the visiting men. Tours of the 93rd Evacuation hospital, and later a briefing by intelligence officers on medical techniques and facilities of the northern forces, plus a visit to the heliport at Tan Son Nhut airbase, at Saigon, were all part of the four-day program.

Young people of the Vietnamese SDA church at Saigon, performed Saturday evening at an "This is Vietnam" program. Traditional songs, instruments, and dress, were a part of the evening's entertainment.

Twenty-two of the Army's most outstanding doctors lectured, showed films and slides, illustrating the lat-

est techniques used in fighting disease and injuries among the forces in Vietnam today.

It is hoped that such a conference might be held on a regular basis. The success of this conference will be felt for a long time to come.

The presentation of the Layman of the Year plaque was a part of the Lay Activities period on the first Sabbath of camp meeting.

V. W. Emmerson nominated him by saying "He is the leader of the Stacy Company and as such he personally leads out in all church projects. He never shifts the responsibility of promotion to the district pastor but always takes care of securing (and surpassing) all goals. I well remember the first time that I mentioned that we would soon have to start our Ingathering work and to this he replied, 'We have already reached our goal. And to my surprise they had not only reached it but nearly doubled it. It has been the same with the *Signs of the Times*, *Liberty* and *Listen* and all other campaigns. I never mention them as they are taken care of by Brother Keith and his faithful members."

"During the past year he has purchased the following equipment to help him in his work for the Lord: A 16 mm movie projector, paid half the cost of a set of the 5-day Stop Smoking films, 16 mm health film, three sets of slides, 'Your Radio Doctor'; 'Eat to Live'; 'Science and Evolution', 6 reading racks, which he has placed in the laundromats in five different towns. Each week he makes the rounds and fills the racks.

"He has held three series of health classes. Under his direction a welfare van was purchased for this company.

Until further notice the Minnesota Book and Bible House will no longer be open on Monday nights.

Last fall he rented a booth at four county fairs. He decorated these booths with signs and pictures depicting the harmful effects of tobacco on the human body. In order to make the demonstration more effective, he purchased *Smoking Sam*, *The Other Side of the Coin*, and about \$150.00 worth of literature. He averages four Bible studies a week, over 200 for the year."

After the presentation, Brother Keith said, as he looked at the plaque presented him by the Conference President, Elder Kiesz, "This challenges me to do more."

## A Personal Testimony

One would think that planning for the disposition of one's possessions after his death would not be a pleasant subject to consider. However, I was surprised to experience a sense of exhilaration and pleasure in working out this matter in a Trust Agreement for my church.

Most of us have had numerous occasions to consecrate ourselves to the Lord. We do it repeatedly at camp meetings and other services. Yet it is possible for one to make this kind of commitment and still keep himself aloof from Christ in areas which characteristically tie people to this world—their possessions. Putting one's substance in Trust helps maintain a perspective which recognizes that God is only lending men certain possessions which cannot be taken with them at death. Placing one's material benefits at His disposal completes and seals the commitment of all he has to Christ.

It is my hope that I shall live to



meet Christ at His coming. But if He wills it differently, it is a deep source of satisfaction to know that my estate will help in some measure to hasten His return after I am gone.

Many of us have worked hard all our lives. Therefore, we would have the results of our labors to be used significantly, not just melt away into the world's resources without having accomplished anything of eternal value. There is no substitute for directing funds into God's work while they are under our control. The Trust Plan is a natural complement to that program of giving.

Not all my family are Seventh-day Adventists. I feel I am doing them no disservice by not making a Will stipulating that my estate be divided among them. I wish the very best for them, but the greatest service I can do them is to help them see this message as it is, an ark of safety in a turbulent, dangerous world. Strengthening the church with my funds helps accomplish this better than contributing toward their pleasure the brief period they might enjoy the extra cash. Entering into the Trust Plan is an additional evidence of the value of this message. It is another way of witnessing that the commitment we have made is real and permanent.

I cannot think of anyone not benefitting from the Trust program. If he has accumulated much in this world, it is all the more important that its disposal not be left to chance or worldly enterprises. If his means are modest, he needs to fully connect his economic life to the Lord and reap the security that such a union brings. If he has loved ones, perhaps children, he will surely want their destinies linked to the church in this fuller way. And if he is among those who are more or less alone in the world, he will find it a comfort to know that hands and minds in harmony with his own love for the truth will be involved in the handling of his affairs at death.

The establishing of a Trust Agreement has been one of the most satisfying experiences of my life, even though I recognize that my particular resources may not be of great financial benefit to the church. I am grateful for the plan and see it as an action that reflects my confidence in this message and its leadership. Realizing the time is

short and Christ is soon to come, I would encourage our people to take this step without delay.

### How to Keep a Deep Rich Experience in the Lord Jesus

After a wonderful camp meeting (they seem better every year) the question arises, what can I do to hold on to this experience and deepen it? One of the ways to retain a saving experience with Jesus Christ is to tell others. "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine righteousness; and with the mouth heart that God hath raised him from

the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." Romans 10:9, 10.

The Holy Spirit is in this type of thing. Jesus said to Peter after his wonderful confession, "Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona; for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven." Matthew 16:17. What had Peter confessed? "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Matthew 16:16. Look also at I Corinthians 12:3, last part, "No man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the Holy Ghost." We might say let us gossip our faith in Christ.

"If Christians would associate together, speaking to each other of the love of God and of the precious truths of redemption, their own hearts would be refreshed and they

would refresh one another. We may be daily learning more of our heavenly Father, gaining a fresh experience of His grace; then we shall desire to speak of His love; and as we do this, our own hearts will be warmed and encouraged. If we thought and talked more of Jesus, and less of self, we should have far more of His presence." *Steps to Christ*, page 102.

It has always been a mystery to me why more people don't manifest an open and intense interest in the plan of salvation. The world is full of people who believe that the Bible shows the way of salvation. Sad to say the number is decreasing in proportion to the total population when it should be steadily increasing.

Believers are disillusioned when they find what they accepted with great joy either spurned or regard-

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ed apathetically by others.

Genesis, Chapter 3, sheds light on this question. When we go back to the garden of Eden when sin first entered we find that when the Lord brought the plan of salvation to Adam and Eve they were not seeking it. They did not come to the Lord and say, "We have a real problem here." "Please, show us the way out." Instead they ran away when He sought them. When the Lord asked, "Hast thou eaten of the tree, whereof I commanded that thou shouldest not eat?" Genesis 3:11. Instead of saying, "Yes, Lord," Adam blamed the Lord for the problem—inferring that it was His fault. Adam said, "The woman whom Thou gavest." Genesis 3:12. Imagine blaming and condemning the one who was bringing deliverance.

You remember Ahab asked Elijah, "Art thou he that troubleth Israel?" I Kings 18:17. Elijah answered, "I have not troubled Israel; but thou, and thy father's house, in that ye have forsaken the commandments of the Lord, and thou hast followed Baalim." I Kings 18:18.

Sometimes the reaction goes beyond apathy or words and breaks into open persecution. You remember Cain killed Abel for representing the plan of salvation with a blood sacrifice pointing to Jesus Christ and his shed blood. So we should not allow others' attitudes to make us discouraged when our confession is

not received as it should be. The Lord Jesus didn't give up, but went ahead to present the plan of salvation to Adam and Eve. If our testimony is spurned, we must not become discouraged, but just keep on representing the Lord Jesus Christ in our total life, continually meeting the great need we see all around us for a manifestation of the love of Jesus Christ.
