Youth Magazine Name Sought

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Editors of the new Seventh-day Adventist youth magazine have announced a "Help the Happening" contest.

Aimed at finding a name for the new magazine, the contest invites suggestions from anyone between the ages of 16 and 30. One name to an entry blank is permitted. Contest closes December 15.

Describing the new magazine as weekly magazine for Seventh-day Adventist youth," the editors urge contestants to think in terms of a name that will fit the bright new format and content of the publication.

The person submitting the name selected will receive a first prize of \$100. Second and third prizes of \$50 and \$25 will also be awarded. In event of a tie, the entry bearing the earliest postmark will receive the award so an early response is indicated.

Contestants may use either cards provided by youth leaders of the church or entry blanks published in church periodicals. Entries should be mailed to Help the Happening, Review and Herald Publishing Association, Washington, D. C. 20012.

Planning for the new publication is progressing, with the first issue scheduled for May, 1970.

The editors urge young writers to submit manuscripts or article and story queries. "It's a senior youth publication," they say, "and we want

thinking young people to consider this a platform from which they can share their thoughts and experiences and research. Articles may be secular or religious, but all must be written from the standpoint of Biblical Christianity."

Good News

Just recently the Northern Union Sabbath School secretary, W. H. Elder, Jr., placed on my desk the financial attainment of the Sabbath Schools in the four conferences comprising the Northern Union. It is a good report, brethren, and we rejoice in the continuing liberality of our people in their Sabbath School offerings.

The Northern Union stands second in the North America unions in per capita giving to the mission fund through the Sabbath School, We look for the usual large amount to be turned in from the Investment activities of the Sabbath School during the closing weeks of 1969.

Our per capita giving is .469. This is an increase of just over one cent per week per member over that contributed to date last year. Let us remember, brethren, that inflation is moving ever upward and to keep pace with inflation we must continue to increase our offerings. If our offerings were to increase in direct proportion to inflation for this year, we would be giving about 2 cents per week per member more than we gave last year. We are not quite up to that, brethren, so this note is to encourage the readers of the OUTLOOK to increase their Sabbath School offerings at least to the amount of that needed to keep pace with inflation.

Surely the work of the Lord is going forward and our offerings in support of this work must be in direct proportion to the hastening on of this message.




1970 IOWA INGATHERING



Bismarck Church Dedication

October 25, 1969, was a high day for the Bismarck Seventh-day Adventist Church. The new sanctuary and church school were dedicated free of debt. Dignitaries present for the dedication included the mayor of Bismarck, E. V. Lahr; the lieutenant-governor of North Dakota, Richard F. Larsen; Ben Trout, president of the North Dakota Conference; J. L. Dittberner, president of the Northern Union Conference; A. T. Bidwell, pastor; John Jones, associate pastor; Don Hensel, former associate pastor.

The nucleus of the present developed at Hampton, church North Dakota, in Emmons County. The exact date is unknown but the group was fully organized and functioning in 1869. In the spring of 1897, Elder Ells moved with his family to Bismarck where he labored until 1901, Andrew Christian pastored the flock for a short time following this, and a brother by the name of Watt held a series of meetings and contributed much toward building up and strengthening the church. For a number of years after these brethren left, no worker made his headquarters at Bismarck. A number of members moved away. and for a time no church officers were elected.

In 1921 Elder Schuster moved his family to Bismarck and began work in this district, followed by Elder Dirksen in 1923. On June 3, 1923, he re-organized this company of believers into the present Bismarck Church, From that time to this it has continued to function with regular Sabbath school, worship service, and the regular election of officers.

Construction of the present building began in July, 1963, under the direction of A. J. Iseminger who was pastor at that time. By January, 1964, the two school rooms and auditorium were completed. The first

Sabbath school and worship service were held on the first Sabbath of 1964.

In December Edmond Gienger became the pastor and carried on the building program. With several carpenters and bricklayers among the members and other volunteer help even among the children and ladies, the church building was soon finished. On May 7, 1967, open house was held with many of the people of the city attending.

Over the period of years from 1897 to the present, credit should be given to the following workers for their part in sowing the seeds of truth and helping to garner in the sheaves: Elders Ells, Watson, Andrew Christian, Watt, W. A. Alway, Burke, Schuster, A. A. Dirksen, F. F. Schwindt, Rankin Wentland, Sam Reile, C. Renfro, R. R. Bietz, Scheller, McCelland, G. E. Gaede, G. F. Theise, M. F. Grau, W. R. Archbold, A. W. Bauer, Kurt Kurz, E. Kungel, R. Cash, Willard Beamon, George Sherbondy, Neil Hadley, Adrian Zytkoskee, A. J. Iseminger, E. R. Gienger, L. S. Harbeson, and the present pastor, A. T. Bidwell.

Of the members who were reorganized in 1923 into the present body, two charter members are still living in Bismarck and are active in the church, Brother and Sister Christ Oster. At present the membership is 194.

It has been aptly said, "The past belongs to the historians, the future to the dreamers, but the present to us." Contrary to this we quote from the pen of inspiration, "If the church will put on the robe of Christ's righteousness, withdrawing from all allegiance with the world, there is before her the dawn of a bright and glorious day." Acts of the Apostles, p. 601. "We have nothing to fear for the future except as we shall forget the way the Lord has led us and our past history." Life Sketches, p. 196.


